

Literatures and Criticism Checklist

Major Requirements for students declaring the major after February 19, 2021 42 credits (including ENGL 220)

The Literatures and Criticism concentration provides students with a strong foundation in literary history, theory, and interpretation. Students in this concentration are well prepared for the challenges of graduate or professional school. The critical thinking and writing skills acquired in this concentration are also excellent preparation for careers in the arts, communications, social advocacy, law, business, urban planning, and a range of other professions.

REQUIRED COURSES

These courses introduce students to a broad range of literatures and questions fundamental to further study. As such, they should be taken in the early semesters of students' pursuit of the major.

D. ELECTIVE COURSES 15 Credits

Students in this major are required to take fifteen credits of elective courses. One elective course must be a 400-level advanced seminar, which can only be taken after achieving 24 credits in the major (see below). The remaining courses must be at the 300-level or above (with the exception of ENGL 28000 and ENGL 28500) or possibly a class from another department - see next paragraph below.

_____ 3 (400 level) _____ 3 (Course from an optional department)

*All English majors also have the option to take **one** of their elective courses in another department. In order to do this, students must meet all of that department's prerequisites for the course. This elective course must be on the "list of approved courses in another department" on the English Department website.* Students with double majors may apply the course to one of those majors, but not both. For example, someone majoring in English and History who takes HIST 34251 Britain Since 1689 may count that course toward either the English or History major, not both.*

*Note: To take a course that is not on the list, or in another department, students must have **prior** written permission from an English advisor and, in some cases, from the Department that offers the course. Students must meet all of that department's prerequisites for the course.

400-level Advanced Seminar

All English majors must take a 400-level Advanced Seminar as one of their electives. In order to be eligible for the course, students must first complete at least 24 credits in the major and meet the prerequisites for the specific Seminar (listed below).

ENGL 49000 Advanced Seminar in Literature and Criticism (Prerequisites: ENGL 22000; ENGL 25200; ENGL 30400; ENGL 30600; ENGL 30700; one of ENGL 31700, 31800, 32000, 32100, 32300, 32400, 32500, 32600, 32700, or 32900)

ENGL 49200 Advanced Seminar in Linguistics and/or Rhetoric (Prerequisites: ENGL 22000; ENGL 25200; ENGL 28000; ENGL 30100; and at least at least one of ENGL 34000, ENGL 34100, ENGL 34200, or ENGL 34300; and at least one of ENGL 33000, ENGL 33200, ENGL 33300, ENGL 34600, ENGL 34700, ENGL 34800)

ENGL 48400 Advanced Seminar in Creative Writing (Prerequisites: ENGL 22000; ENGL 25200; ENGL 28500; ENGL 30400; ENGL 30700; and both a level 1 and 2 workshop in the student's chosen genre)

Students may take any Advanced Seminar for which they meet the prerequisites. Students who maintain a 3.5 GPA in the major through at least 24 credits and a 2.8 overall GPA are eligible to take the Honors Seminar (ENGL 49400) in place of **or** in addition to one of the Advanced Seminars. In rare cases, students may take ENGL 48500 Individual Tutorial Project instead of an Advanced Seminar, but only by permission of an advisor and the professor supervising the project.

FAQs

When and how should I see an English Department Advisor?

You should see an Advisor (at least) once a semester just to check in and see that you're moving in the right direction to earn your degree. Check the English Department webpage, or the list outside the English Department Office for names and office hours of Advisors

Can I change my concentration after I declare the major?

Yes. Talk to any advisor about this, so you can learn the details.

If I'm concentrating in Literature and Criticism, can I take a creative writing workshop class?

Yes. You are welcome to take one or more creative writing classes as electives. Just note that ENGL 285: Introduction to Creative Writing is the prerequisite for all other Creative Writing workshops. Students must earn a grade of B or better in ENGL 285 to take more advanced creative writing workshops.
