E. ELECTIVES (12 credits)

Students may choose four electives from among 300- or 400-level English courses (with the exception of ENGL 285, or possibly a class from another dept. – see ** below). One elective must be a 400-level Advanced Seminar (49000, 48400, or 49200). Students who maintain a 3.5 GPA in the major through at least 24 credits and a 2.8 overall GPA are eligible to take the Honors Seminar, ENGL 494. (See below.)

*It is strongly recommended that students choose at least one Modern/Contemporary literature, language, or linguistics elective. ** Students have the option to take one approved course in another department to satisfy one of their elective requirements. For a complete list of approved courses, see the English Department website. To take a course in another department that is not on the list, students must obtain prior written approval from an English advisor and, in some cases, from the Department that offers the course. Students must meet all of that department's prerequisites.

400-LEVEL ADVANCED SEMINAR REQUIREMENT: All English majors must take a 400-level Advanced Seminar as one of their electives. In order to be eligible for the course, students must first complete at least 24 credits in the major and meet the prerequisites listed below.

ENGL 484 Advanced Seminar in Creative Writing

Prerequisites: ENGL 220, ENGL 252, ENGL 285, ENGL 304, ENGL 307 and both a level 1 and 2 workshop in the student's chosen genre

ENGL 490 Advanced Seminar in Literature and Criticism

ENGL 22000, ENGL 25200, ENGL 30400, **ENGL 30600**, ENGL 30700, and one of the following courses: ENGL 31700, 31800, 32000, 32100, 32300, 32400, 32500, 32600, 322700, 32900.

ENGL 492 Advanced Seminar in Linguistics and/or Rhetoric and Composition

Prerequisites: ENGL 220, ENGL 252, ENGL 280, AND ENGL 301 AT LEAST ONE OF ENGL 340, ENGL 341, ENGL 342, OR ENGL 343 AT LEAST ONE OF ENGL 330, ENGL 332, ENGL 333, ENGL 346, ENGL 347, OR ENGL 348

If eligible, students may take the Honors Seminar (ENGL 49400) in place of or in addition to the Advanced Seminars. In rare cases, students may take ENGL 48500 Individual Tutorial Project instead of the Advanced Seminar, but only by permission of a Department advisor and the professor supervising the project.

SPECIAL NOTE FOR QUEST STUDENTS: Students also enrolled in the QUEST major may satisfy one of their ELA elective requirements by taking any Art History, Music History, Theatre, or Dance History course. Taking one of these courses will also satisfy 3 credits of the QUEST Arts Distribution requirement. This option is available only to ELA majors who are also majoring in QUEST.

RECOMMENDED COURSE OF STUDY: In addition to taking ENGL 252 no later than the first semester (after declaring the major), the English Department strongly recommends that English Language Arts students take ENGL 280, ENGL 301, ENGL 304, and ENGL 307 in their first two semesters as majors. If you choose to take fewer than three English courses per semester, as many students do, it is still important to take ENGL 280 and 301 early in your course of study. Students should also plan ahead to take Engl 306 if they wish to take Engl 490 as their Advanced Seminar.

FAQs

When and how should I see an English Department Advisor?

You should see an Advisor (at least) once a semester just to check in and see that you're moving in the right direction to earn your degree. Check the English Department webpage, or the list outside the English Department Office for names and office hours of Advisors.

Can I change my concentration after I declare the major?

Yes. Talk to any advisor about this, so you can learn the details.
