- **\*\*\***Students have the option to take an approved 300-level course in another department to satisfy one of their elective requirements. For a complete list of approved courses, see the English Department website. To take a 300-level course in another department that is not on the list, students must obtain prior written approval from an English advisor and, in some cases, from the Department that offers the course. Students must meet all of that department's prerequisites.

**RECOMMENDED COURSE OF STUDY:** In addition to taking ENGL 252 no later than the first semester after declaring the major, the English Department strongly recommends that Linguistics and Rhetoric students take ENGL 301 and ENGL 280 in their first semester as majors, and that they take ENGL 304, ENGL 307, 396, or 397, and the first of their required Linguistics and Rhetoric courses early in their course of study. If you choose to take fewer than three English courses per semester, as many students do, it is still important to take ENGL 301, 280, 304, 307, 396 or 397, and your first Linguistics and Rhetoric courses early in your course of study.
