The Africana & Puerto Rican/Latino Studies Minor

The Minor concentration consists of 12 credits chosen from Africana and Puerto Rican/Latino sequence courses as follows: 2 at the 100/200 and 2 at the 300/400 levels.

Learning outcomes

The Department of Africana and Puerto Rican/Latino Studies Learning Outcomes are embodied in its broader Assessment Plan. Minor in Art History

Catalogue description

The Art History minor requires students to take 12 credits in Art History as follows: Art History 111 Introduction to the History of Art, followed by 9 credits selected from the other department offerings. No more than 6 credits transferred from another institution may be applied to the minor.

DEPARTMENT OF BIOLOGICAL SCIENCES:

Minor in Biological Sciences

Catalog Description:

The minor in Biological Sciences gives students a basic understanding of biology from the molecular and cellular to the organismal and population level. This includes both theoretical aspects presented in lecture as well as practical aspects presented in lab. Flexibility is built into the minor to allow students to select courses corresponding to their interests.

In order to minor in Biological Sciences a student must pass four courses resulting in a minor GPA of 2.0 or higher. All students who want a Minor in Biological Sciences must take:

- a) Principles of Biology I and II (BIOL 100-102 or 100-160) or the equivalent.
- b) two additional courses in Biological Sciences, one of which must be at the 200 level or higher

<u>Number of Credits:</u> A minimum of 12 credits. Transfer credits may be applied. At least 2 courses must be taken at Hunter College.

DEPARTMENT OF CHEMISTRY:

Minor in Chemistry

Catalog Description:

A minor in Chemistry consists of a pre-requisite year of General Chemistry with laboratory (CHEM 102 through 106 or equivalent, 9 credits), and a minimum of 14 credits of coursework. Note that MATH 125 is a co-requisite to General Chemistry. The minimum of 14 credits include the following required courses:

Chem 222 (3 credits, 4-6 hours) Organic Chemistry Lecture I Chem 224 (3 credits, 4-6 hours) Organic Chemistry Lecture II

Chem 223 (2.5 credits, 5 hours) Organic Chemistry Laboratory I

In addition, students will be required to take at least 5.5 credits of electives selected from Chemistry offerings numbered 200 or above, excluding Chemistry 291.

DEPARTMENT OF CLASSICAL & ORIENTAL STUDIES:

Minor in Chinese

The Minor in Chinese consists of 12 credits. Students must take four courses at or above CHIN 200-level taught in Chinese. Course prerequisites must be satisfied. Internships and independent studies do not count towards the minor.

Minor in Arabic

Catalog Description:

12 credits

The completion of ARB 201, 202, 301 and 302 or their equivalent as determined by the Arabic Program Head. ARB 149 can be taken in lieu of ARB 302.

Prerequisites: 101 and 102 or equivalent (part of GER language requirement)

Minor in Arabic Studies

Catalog Description:

The Arabic Studies minor comprises 12 credits.

Prerequisite for the minor: ARB 101-102 or equivalent (8 credits, part of FL requirement).

The Arabic Studies minor requires the successful completion of 4 ARB courses on cultural or literary topics taught in English or in Arabic. Up to two Arabic language courses may be used to fulfill the minor requirements in lieu of two culture or literature courses.

Minor In Hebrew

12 credits

The Hebrew minor requires the successful completion of 12 credits at the 200-level or above. Courses counted toward the Hebrew minor must be either language courses or have Hebrew as their language of instruction.

Minor In Hebraic Studies

12 credits

The Hebraic Studies minor requires the successful completion of four HEBR literature and/or culture courses on the 200-level or above, taught in English or in Hebrew. Two Hebrew language courses on 300-level or above may be used toward the minor requirement in lieu of two literature or culture courses.

Minor in Russian Language and Minor in Russian Literature and Culture

Catalog Description:

The Program will encourage students to take the Russian minor. The minor consists of minimum of 12 credits. Students wishing to minor in Russian should either pass a proficiency test or take the language sequence of Russ-101—Russ-102; Russ-201—202. Courses taken toward the Russian minor could follow two tracks:

Track I: Russian Language Minor

Pre-requisite: RUSS 202 or equivalent. Students are expected to take: Russ 301-302; Russ-317 or Russ-318 or Russ-319; plus one literature course taught in Russian.

Track II: Russian Literature and Culture Minor

Pre-requisite: RUSS 202 or equivalent. Students are expected to take: Russ 301-302 and two literature or culture courses conducted either in Russian or in English. Literature courses may be substituted for language courses in the Literature and Culture Minor with permission by the head of the program.

DEPARTMENT OF COMPUTER SCIENCE:

Minor in Computer Science

Catalog Description:

A minor in Computer Science consists of 13-14 credits of coursework. These credits include the following required courses – note that MATH 125 is a prerequisite course to CSCI 127 however MATH 125 does **not** count towards the Computer Science Minor:

CSCI 127 (3 credits, 3 hours) Introduction to Computer Science.

CSCI 133 (3 credits, 3 hours) Programming for Everyone.

CSCI 232 (3 credits, 3 hours) Relational Databases and SQL Programming (for non-majors)

CSCI 233 (1 credit, 2 hours) Programming Projects Seminar for Minors

In addition, students will be required to take at least one 3 credit elective selected from Computer Science offerings numbered 135 or above. Although you may take any Computer Science course numbered 135 or above, courses that require only one or more of the above courses as prerequisites include:

DEPARTMENT OF ECONOMICS:

Minor in Economics

Catalog Description

The economics minor consists of a minimum of 12 credits, including Economics 200 (Principles of Microeconomics), 201 (Principles of Macroeconomics) and two other courses in economics. Accounting and business law courses do not count towards the economics minor.

Minor in Accounting

Catalog Description:

We would like to offer an Accounting minor to students who are not majoring in Economics or Accounting. The minor will consist of 15 credits with the following required courses:

DEPARTMENT OF ENGLISH:

Minor in English

CATALOG DESCRIPTION:

The English Department offers a 12-credit minor that provides students with an opportunity to pursue interests in literature, language, rhetoric, composition, and creative writing at the intermediate and advanced levels. The prerequisite to declare a minor is ENGL 220, Introduction to Literature. Students minoring in English may choose four courses (12 cr.) from among 200- and 300-level literature, language, or writing offerings, with a minimum of two 300-level courses necessary to satisfy the Minor requirements. Students who wish to take Creative Writing workshops in any of the three genres offered (Fiction, Poetry, and Creative Non-Fiction) must first pass ENGL 300, Introduction to Creative Writing, with a minimum grade of B.

NOTE: No course below English 220 counts towards fulfillment of the Minor except English 218, Advanced Expository Writing. English minors may not take 400-level courses.

DEPARTMENT OF FILM & MEDIA STUDIES:

Minor in Film

Catalogue Description

Students who wish to minor in Film must complete a total of 15 credits in addition to Film 101, which is a prerequisite for all Film courses.

- 1) Prior to declaring a Film Minor, students must take Film 101.
- 2) Film Minors must then enroll in either Film 211 (Film History I; 3 cr.) or Film 212 (Film History II; 3 cr.); Film 101 is the prerequisite for both courses.
- 3) Once Film Minors complete this film history requirement, they must take two classes from the 200-level (6 crs. total) and two classes from the 300-level (6 crs. total). No film production classes (designated FilmP) are available to Film Minors, with the exception of Screenwriting I (FilmP 276) and Screenwriting II (FilmP 377). Film Minors must satisfy all other course prerequisites.

Minor in Media Studies

Catalogue Description

The Minor in Media Studies consists of five courses for a total of 15 credits. At least one 200-level course and at least one 300-level course are required.

The other three courses can be at any level. Course prerequisites must be satisfied. Internships and independent studies do not count towards the minor.

DEPARTMENT OF GEOGRAPHY:

Minor in Geography

<u>Catalog Description:</u> A minor in geography consists of a minimum of 12 credits chosen from undergraduate courses that have a GEOG, PGEO or GTEC prefix. Prerequisites may apply. Thoughtful selection of courses may result in a minor program of study that will enhance the student's major. It is recommended that prospective geography minors consult with the geography undergraduate adviser concerning course selection.

Minor in Geology

<u>Catalog Description:</u> A minor in geology consists of a minimum of 12 credits selected from courses with a GEOL prefix, or PGEO 231, or PGEO 334, or GTEC 350. Prerequisites may apply. It is recommended that prospective geology minors consult with an undergraduate adviser from the Department of Geography.

Minor in Environmental Studies

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Catalog Description:

A minor in environmental studies consists of a minimum of 12 credits as follows:

- one course selected from PGEO 130, GEOL 101, GEOL 105, GEOL 180; and
- at least one course (minimum of 3 credits) selected from PGEO 250, PGEO 251*, GEOG 226, GEOL 280, or GTEC 201; and
- at least one course (minimum of 3 credits) from the 300-level approved electives listed in the college catalog under either the environmental studies program's Concentration A (Environmental Earth Science) or Concentration B (Environmental Management and Policy).

*PGEO 250 is a prerequisite for PGEO 251

DEPARTMENT OF GERMAN:

Minor in German

Catalog description

The German minor requires that students take 12 credits in language and/or literature taught in German at the 300-level or above (GRMN 301-359, 381-444). Students who begin their study of German in college may count GRMN 201 and GRMN 202 (or GRMN 203) towards the minor and will need to take at least two courses at the 300-level.

Number of credits: 12

Prerequisites: 6 credits (GRMN 101 and 102, part of GER), or equivalent

DEPARTMENT OF HISTORY:

Minor in History

Catalog Description:

Students majoring in disciplines other than history may elect a minor in history. The history minor consists of 12 credits. The minor in History is flexible and thus it can provide depth to a variety of majors; students can tailor the minor to suit best their individual interests.

Requirements:

- 1) Four history courses of 3 credits each (or 12 credits total) taken for a letter grade (C or better. Courses taken for a grade of Credit/No Credit will not count toward the minor.)
- 2) Courses must be distributed in at least two geographic fields, i.e. at least one course (3 credits) must be taken in a geographic area different from the other three. (Currently, the geographic areas are defined as U.S., European and World/Non-Western.)
- 3) At least two courses (6 credits) must be at the 300-level or above. Internships do not count toward completion of the minor, although students completing the minor may elect to include an internship as an additional course. Independent studies (tutorials) and HIST300 are available only to History Majors and, thus, do not count toward the minor.
- 4) At least two of the courses (or 6 credits) must be taken in the History Department at Hunter College. Courses taken in other disciplines will not count toward the minor unless cross-listed and taken under the appropriate HIST course code. Transfer courses must be approved by the History Undergraduate Advisor.
- 5) There are no prerequisites for the minor, although certain courses may have their own prerequisites.

Declaring a Minor in History:

Students are advised to declare their minor by the beginning of the upper junior semester, but must do it prior to their final semester (that of graduation). Declaration requires a planning

session with the History Undergraduate Advisor and completion of the Major/Minor Declaration Form (to be obtained from the OASIS).

DEPARTMENT OF MATHEMATICS & STATISTICS:

Minor in Mathematics

Catalog Description:

A minor in mathematics consists of a minimum of 12 credits selected from the following courses offered by the Department:

MATH courses numbered 150 or above (with the exception of MATH 261W) STAT 311 STAT 312.

Mathematics minors are required to take all necessary prerequisites. Students should consult the catalog to determine prerequisites necessary for them to enroll in courses that count toward the minor. It is recommended that prospective mathematics minors consult with an undergraduate mathematics adviser concerning course selection.

Minor in Statistics

Catalog Description:

A minor in statistics consists of at least 12 credits selected from STAT courses offered by the Department.

Statistics minors are required to take all necessary prerequisites. Students should consult the catalog to determine prerequisites necessary for them to enroll in courses that count toward the minor.

It is recommended that prospective statistics minors consult with an undergraduate statistics adviser concerning course selection.

DEPARTMENT OF MUSIC:

Minor in Music

The music minor consists of 15 credits in music: MU-T 101; MU-H 101 or MU-H 107; one course with an MU-H prefix at the 200-level; and 6 credits of music electives, 3 of which must be at the 200-level or higher. Prospective minors who have already mastered the material taught in the required 100-level courses (MU-T 101 and/or MU-H 101 or 107) may be exempted from these courses by passing the same entrance examination that is required of prospective music majors (see above). Music minors must substitute more advanced courses in any area of music study, which may include private lessons and ensembles, for the courses from which they are exempt. PLEASE NOTE: Music minors who wish to take private lessons for credit (MU-P 401) must first pass both the performance audition and music theory portions of the entrance examination.

DEPARTMENT OF PHILOSOPHY:

Minor in Philosophy Standard and PPS Concentration

Catalog Description of Philosophy Minor in the Standard and in the PPS Concentration

The philosophy minor requires 12 credits at the 200-level and above with no fewer than 3 credits at the 300-level. Exceptions: PHILO 171 may count toward the minor at the 200-level. PHILO 203 and 204 shall **not** count.

Students seeking to minor in the Philosophy, Politics, Society (PPS) concentration must select from the approved list of philosophy courses (i.e., non-philosophy courses may not be applied).

A student must pass a minor in philosophy with a minimum GPA of 3.00.

Pre-requisite to the minor: one of 6 introductory philosophy courses (PHILO 101, 103, 104, 106, 203, or 204) and ENGL 120.

N.B.: When constructing a philosophy minor in either the standard or the PPS concentration, a student should always consult with a philosophy department advisor beforehand.

DEPARTMENT OF PHYSICS & ASTRONOMY:

Minor in Physics

Catalog Description:

A minor in Physics consists of a minimum of 12 credits of PHYS courses, including two courses numbered above 200 or one course numbered above 300.

Students who wish to enroll in the Physics Minor must have completed MATH 150 and 155. The prerequisites for the 300-level courses include MATH 250 and/or 254.

DEPARTMENT OF POLITICAL SCIENCE:

Minor in Political Science

The minor in Political Science is designed to provide students with solid grounding in political science and to encourage them to develop depth in the discipline in an area that will complement their major or develop expertise in an area of particular interest to them. To complete a minor in Political Science, students must complete 12 credits in Political Science with no more than 3 credits at the 100 level. Students may apply up to 3 credits of independent study in Political Science (PLSC 290); however, internship credit may not be applied to the minor.

The minor in Political Science is designed to permit students considerable flexibility in designing a minor that will best serve their academic goals. Students may, for instance, wish to focus on courses dealing with European politics and foreign policy to complement a major in a European language and culture. Other students may wish to emphasize courses in international and public law in preparation for law school. Students may concentrate their courses in one field of political science, or spread them

across several fields. Students may consult an advisor in the Department of Political Science about their goals as they choose courses to satisfy the minor.

DEPARTMENT OF PSYCHOLOGY:

Minor in Psychology

Catalog description of the minor program

The minor in psychology is designed to expose students to a variety of content areas in the field of psychology and to provide the student with the ability to evaluate psychology research as a consumer.

To declare a psychology minor, the student must have completed any 100-level psychology course with a minimum grade of C and a required mathematics course with a minimum grade of C or CR. The mathematics requirement may be satisfied by STAT 113 or MATH 125, or by an appropriate score on the mathematics placement test.

The minor in Psychology consists of 15 credits in Psychology, as follows: PSYC 100 and any other 3 cr. PSYC course; PSYC 215; and any 2 200-level PSYC courses below PSYC 248.

The total number of credits to fulfill all minor requirements, including credits for all prerequisites, is 18: 15 credits in PSYC course and 3 credits in STAT 113 or MATH 125.

DEPARTMENT OF ROMANCE LANGUAGES:

Proposal for French Minors:

The French minor consists of 15 credits and will be offered in 4 different concentrations.

Students may use transfer credits and credits from the Hunter programs in Paris and Compiègne up to a maximum of 6 credits. At least 9 credits of the minor must be completed in residence at Hunter.

Minor in French Language & Culture

The French minor consists of 15 credits:

The prerequisite for this minor consists of either Fren 202 or 203 or equivalent proficiency.

3 Language courses to be chosen from: Fren 211, Fren 220, Fren 311, and Fren 312.

2 Culture & Civilization courses to be chosen from: Fren 335, Fren 336, and Fren 337.

Minor in French Literature

The French minor consists of 15 credits:

The prerequisite for this minor consists of French 211 or equivalent proficiency.

Requirements: Students must first complete French 341 and French 342 (6 credits), and then choose 3 courses from the following selection: Fren 343, Fren 344, Fren 346, Fren 348, Fren 349, Fren 350, Fren 351, Fren 360, Fren 361, Fren 362, Fren 363, Fren 364, Fren 365.

Minor in French Culture & Literature in Translation

The French minor consists of 15 credits:

The courses in this minor are to be chosen from a selection of 200-level courses, taught in English, such as Fren 241, Fren 242, Fren 251, French 252, Fren 253, Fren 254, Fren 255, Fren 256, Fren 257, Fren 258, Fren 259, Fren 260, Fren 261, Fren 262.

Minor in Italian

<u>Catalog Description</u>:

12 credits Prerequisite Ital 202 or Ital 221 or placement test.

This minor of 12 credits utilizes four existing courses all taught in Italian: They are:

Ital 311 Advanced Italian Grammar 3 credits

Ital 312 Advanced Italian Composition 3 credits Prerequisite Ital 202

Ital 321 Italian Translation 3 credits Prerequisite Ital 202

Ital 331 Italian Phonetics and Diction 3 credits Prerequisite Ital 202 or 311

Spanish Minor

Catalog Description:

The Spanish minor consists of 15 credits of courses that are taught entirely in Spanish and combines language, civilization, and literature. The prerequisite for a Spanish minor consists of either Span 202 (non-heritage speakers) or Span 208 (heritage speakers) or equivalent proficiency. Students who begin their study of Spanish in college need a total of 12 credits in prerequisites, or the completion of the foreign language requirement in Spanish.

Minor in Spanish Cultures and Literatures.

Catalog Description:

The following courses are required for a minor in Spanish Cultures and Literatures:

- <u>Two language courses</u> (6 credits) above the Span 202 (non-heritage speakers) or Span 208 (heritage speakers) level, at least one of which must be a 300-level course. Recommended courses are Span 211, Span 221, Span 270, Span 311, and Span 312.
- <u>One civilization course</u> (3 credits) on chosen from Span 335 Spanish Civilization or Span 336 Latin American Civilization.
- <u>Two literature courses</u> (6 credits) on Spanish or Latin American literature. Recommended courses include Span 275 (Readings in Modern Spanish Literature) and Span 276 (Readings in Modern Latin American Literature). Alternatively, students may take 300-level Spanish and Latin American literature courses from the following list by special permission of advisor (Span 343, Span 345, Span 346, Span 349, Span 350, Span 353, Span 355, Span 357, Span 358, Span 360, Span 362, Span 364, Span 365, Span 366, Span 367, Span 368, Span 370 and Span 371.)

Students may use transfer credits and credits from the Hunter programs in Spain and Argentina up to a maximum of 6 credits. At least 9 credits of the minor must be completed in residence at Hunter.

DEPARTMENT OF SOCIOLOGY:

Minor in Sociology

Catalog Description

The minor in Sociology requires four courses with 12 credits which students have to pass with a GPA of at least 2.0. Students minoring in Sociology must take SOC 101, Introduction to Sociology, the prerequisite for all other sociology courses, SOC 221 Classical Sociological Theory, and two additional

courses selected from those offered on a regular basis. It is recommended but not required that one sociology course on the 300 or higher level be included.

Number of Credits: 12 credits

The minor in Sociology is sufficiently structured to give students a basic understanding of the sociological approach and the principal theories informing sociological analysis. Yet there is sufficient flexibility for the student to select courses corresponding to their interests and/or future occupational orientations.

DEPARTMENT OF THEATRE:

Minor in Theatre

Catalog Description:

A Minor in Theatre requires a minimum of 12 credits in the Department of Theatre at the 200-level or higher of which at least 3 credits must be at the 300-level (these are usually at least 3 credits). Minors are required to take all necessary prerequisites for these courses. Minors have access to all courses offered by the Department of Theatre. Minors are encouraged to participate in departmental and student productions. Interested students must meet with the undergraduate advisor in the Department of Theatre to declare a minor and to define their course of study.

DANCE PROGRAM:

Minor in Dance

The following 2 courses must be taken prior to declaration of the minor:

DAN 101 Fundamentals of Contemporary Dance (can be waived by program permission)

DAN 102 Dance, Dancers and the Audience

Other Required courses (5 credits minimum):

- DAN 210 Contemporary Dance Technique 1
- DAN 221 Improvisation as Creative Process, and
- 1 course in dance technique, chosen from the following:

DAN 245/345 Ballet 1/II

DAN 252.00 Special Topics: Traditional Dance I

DAN 352.00 Special Topics: Traditional Dance II

A minimum of 6 additional credits in Dance (choices must be approved by Dance Faculty Advisor):
 Any DAN course at the 200 level or above

At least one of these must be a 3-credit course

Courses repeated for credit will not be counted toward the Dance Minor.

Extra-Curricular requirement:

Serve on one crew team for a fully-produced Dance Program concert

Placement in technique courses above the Fundamentals level is by placement audition, recommendation of instructor, or department permission. Repeated courses may not be counted in these requirements.

ASIAN AMERICAN STUDIES PROGRAM:

Minor in Asian American Studies

Catalog Description of the Minor Program

The interdisciplinary Asian American Studies Minor provides students with focused competence in the histories and contemporary experiences of diverse Asian diasporic communities, including but not limited to those of North America.

A Minor consists of a minimum of 12 credits and can be made up of any courses offered by—or cross-listed with—the Asian American Studies Program, *excluding* ASIAN 360.02 (East Asia to 1600) and ASIAN 360.03 (China since 1800). No more than 6 Minor credits may be transferred from another institution.

Minor in Jewish Social Studies

The minor in Jewish Social Studies consists of 12 credits in courses in Jewish studies of which at least 3 credits must be on topics in the history of the Jews or Judaism and at least 3 credits in Jewish literature, thought, religion, or one of the social sciences (sociology, anthropology, or political science). Students can apply to the minor up to 6 credits in Independent Studies (JSS 300 or 400) or fieldwork (JSS 310). Up to six credits in Jewish studies taken at other institutions of higher learning may be applied to the minor. Jewish Social Studies minors cannot apply any 100-level courses to the minor.

RELIGION PROGRAM:

Minor in Religion

Catalogue Description

The Minor in Religion consists in four courses for a total of 12 credits.

The following two courses are required:

REL 110 Nature of Religion
REL 111 Approaches to Religion

Also required for the Minor in Religion:

- a) one course to be chosen from those listed under the category "Religious Traditions"; and
- b) one course from the category "Issues in Religion" reflecting a theme central to the religious tradition in which the student has chosen to focus, to be selected in consultation with a Religion Program advisor.

At least one course presented in satisfaction of the minor must be a 300-level course.

HUMAN RIGHTS PROGRAM:

Minor in Human Rights

15-credit minor in human rights:

Students in majors such as Anthropology, History, Political Science, Sociology, Urban Affairs and Planning, etc. could select Human Rights as a minor. The minor consists of the following courses:

Introduction to Human Rights (HR 200) (new course) Internship in Human Rights (HR 250) (new course)

3 Cognate courses. Cognate courses draw on traditional disciplinary perspectives to examine claims about, e.g., the universal nature of human rights, their historical origins, social and cultural contexts that affect the understanding and status of human rights, and the relation of human rights to political conflicts and the presence or absence of economic well-being.

PUBLIC POLICY PROGRAM:

Minor in Public Policy

18-credit minor in public policy:

Students in majors such as Anthropology, History, Political Science, Sociology, Urban Affairs and Planning, etc. could select Public Policy as a minor, if approved by the major department. The minor consists of the following courses:

WOMEN AND GENDER STUDIES:

Minor in Women and Gender Studies

The Minor in Women and Gender Studies requires students to take 12 credits: *Introduction to Gender and Sexuality Studies* (WGS 100), *Classics in Feminist Thought* (WGS 201), *Transnational Feminisms* (WGS 244) and one elective course from one of the six areas of concentration.

WGS 100 Introduction to Gender and Sexuality Studies, must be completed before WGS 201 Classics in Feminist Thought and WGS 244 Transnational Feminisms.
