Report by the President:	A summary statement of President Blank's report to the Senate is as follows:	8
i l'esquent.	Announcements: She said: "First there are a couple of announcements. Most surprisingly and unexpected, there is now a hiring freeze. The State of New York has mandated a freeze that will become operative on a campus-by-campus basis on Monday morning. A copy of the two-page document just received from the Chancellor's Office is being distributed. The "Firing Line" debate has been cancelled for now. It would have cost \$30,000 to soundproof the gym and that discouraged them a little bit. Re: Restructuring of the Department of Academic Skills I know how concerned, worried, and uncomfortable the members of the department are. I am offering you the following thought. I am asking the Provost to immediately create a working group, including the deans and chairs of all the affected departments, to work out a detailed implementation plan that will deal with student and faculty concerns. This will be done immediately. The basic ideas in the plan are known to you all, and I did send out an Open Line yesterday with letters to the faculty and the students of the Department of Academic Skills reprinted. I have asked our Ombudsman, and he has been gracious enough to accept this role: i.e. to be a special monitor for this group. It is his particular duty to see to it not only that everybody is equitably treated, but that there be a genuine, warm, and gracious acceptance of all people in all departments. That is his role. He will be there to listen, to monitor, and to be proactive if need be. Decision to Restructure Academic Skills

The decision to segregate remedial and the developmental courses for SEEK students in a separate department with its own faculty and course numbers long predates my coming to Hunter. I understand from those who were here at the time that it was not a decision which received strong support in all quarters. While most CUNY colleges started programs similar to Hunter's Academic Skills, ours is the only program which has remained totally separated from the other academic departments. Since my arrival at Hunter in September of 1989 I was made aware of a strong suggestion from the prior year's visiting team from Middle States to look into the duplication of effort caused by parallel developmental programs for SEEK and non-SEEK students. I took that request seriously and spent my first year here reviewing many prior studies compiled by SEEK institutional researchers, Cobb and Pereira, and others compiled by Liz Beaujour and still others from 80th St. These reports made it clear to me that despite the good intentions of many faculty and the increasing amount of money spent on remediation we were not making gains in the retention of students to graduation. Too often students who began in remediation had no access to college level work before they dropped out. This was especially true for SEEK students who despite smaller classes and more hours of remediation per course and more tutoring and counseling were failing in large numbers, larger than other students requiring remediation.

In September of 1990 I requested Dean Scott to chair a task force on remediation which included faculty from each of the developmental programs in the College. The deliberations of this committee which included testimony from many faculty and from students and from graduates of the SEEK program were factored into a preliminary report which was submitted in May 1991 and a final report submitted May 1992. Those reports concluded, despite prior faculty misconceptions to the contrary, that each of the programs were well-intentioned and eager to help students. It also pointed to the low retention rates and urged the need for a systematic review by external evaluators of the entire developmental program at Hunter.

During the academic year 1993-94 the departments of Math, English and Academic Skills were all evaluated. The reviewers were asked to comment on the parallel programs and to make recommendations. Each of the external teams referred to the possibility and indeed to the wisdom of removing the parallel structure.

In September 1994 I had discussions with each of the three departments and reviewed with them the need to implement the recommendation for restructuring implicit in each of the reports. These departmental meetings were followed by meetings with Lucille Croom (academic skills chair) and Richard Churchill (math chair) on September 9th, and Lucille Croom and Allan Brick (English chair) on September 12th. Vice Chancellor Nuñez was consulted on September 20th. A meeting was held with all instructional faculty in developmental areas on the 28th of September urging them to come up with better ways to deliver instruction to students to improve poor retention rates. Subsequent meetings were held by the developmental math faculty. I met again on October 24th with Lucille Croom and on October 25th with Hugh Scott to inform them of my decision to take action. I spoke with Sarah Aronson of the PSC on the 31th of October; Lucille Croom on November 1th and Arnold Cantor of the PSC on November 2th. I net with the faculty of Academic Skills to inform them on November 2th.
