Regular Meeting of the Hunter College Senate 11 April 1984

The 169th meeting of the Hunter College Senate was convened at 4:35 pm in Room W714. 2 Presiding: Richard Stapleford, Chairperson 3 The elected members of the Senate with the exception of those listed in 4 Attendance: Appendix I. 5 Minutes: The Minutes of March 14th and March 28th were approved as distributed. 6 Report by the 7 The following is a summary statement of President Shalala's report to President: the Senate: 8 The President congratulated the Departments of Political Science and 9 Urban Affairs for pulling the coup of the year by getting all three 10 presidential candidates to Hunter. It was a wonderful event and very 11 substantive for the 2500 students, faculty and staff who attended. 12 It was a terrific day for the college, and we made the front page 13 of the Washington Post, had a good story in the New York Times, and 14 in general received excellent national coverage. 15 Re: Budget--President Shalala reported that the budget had been passed 16 by the legislature. It is not a happy budget. 350 lines were returned17 to CUNY, which should give 44 lines back to Hunter. Those are the 18 lines that were cut last August. But restoring these cuts does not 19 solve the problem of the lines needed to maintain our facilities, as 20 well as the shortage on faculty lines. We are still underfunded and 21 have a decline in the number of lines. It is also not clear yet that 22 all 44 lines will be restored to us. The President said that she had 23 recently found out from the Chancellor that the legislature and the 24 State may be including in the 350 lines the lines for the new law 25 school. This is the first example that a new entity is going to drain 26 off positions when there is a stable budget situation from other 27 established institutions. The President said that on the issue of 28 establishing new institutions within CUNY, she has been a watch dog 29 because of her concern that they may take lines from existing institu-30 tions. In the case of the law school, which may be as many as 22 31 lines, this may have happened, and we have to be particularly alert 32 with discussions beginning about the possibility of a medical school 33 34 for CUNY. The allocation of the 350 lines is spread out in four quarters, which will restrict the university from hiring the positions 35 immediately. We will try to hire or reappoint on as many lines as we 36

By doubling our space we also increased the number of students that are 47 staying at Hunter, because there are now places to work and to study. 48 We are jammed again. Although we dreamed of this, it puts a demand 49 on services that we are not reimbursed for—from food services to 50 student services, library services, and support services of all kinds. 51 We have a huge increase on those services and we are simply stretched 52 thin. The clear message from Albany and the Governor is that there 53 is little hope that we will get an increase in lines. We have to look 54 for ways to squeeze money out of the budget for ongoing operating 55

expenses. 4-day work week--Within the context of the budgetary problems we have to understand the proposal for a 4-day work week. The President 58 said that we have been requested to go on a 4-day work week, and other CUNY institutions already have a 4-day work week. In particular there 60 have been requests from the unions. President Shalala said that 61 academic considerations are always uppermost in her mind, and if not 62 the Senate would make sure that they are. To meet the academic con-63 cerns that have been voiced regarding the 4-day work week, classrooms 64 would be made available to departments that need 5 days to teach 65 courses. Access to the buildings and offices would be assured. 66 (Fridays would be treated like Saturdays and Sundays.) Security 6.7 will be present and maintenance services. All support services, 68 69 including the Library, would be closed on Fridays during the summer. The President said that the marginal resources we would get from this 70 are desperately needed for imporvement of services, particularly the 71 Library, in the Fall and Spring. There should be some energy savings 72 which would go to central administration, and we will argue hard for 73 those to come back to us. 74 President Shalala concluded her report by answering questions from 75 the floor. 76 The following is a summary statement of Prof. Korn's report regarding Report by the 77 some "non-routine" matters that have been dealt with by the Office 78 Ombudsman: of the Ombudsman: 79 The Undergraduate Academic Requirements Committee should act on requirements for ABS or INC grades. According to Hunter College students must receive a grade of "C" or better. According to 80 81 the Board of Trustees, the criterion is a passing grade rather 82 than "C." 83 A screening problem exists with some students who register for 84 more than one class that meet at the same time. Nothing prohibits 85 it. Only one rule that may apply is that students must be in 86 attendance during the first week of classes, but no sanctions 87 88 are indicated. 89 3. Regarding the change of grade forms, instructors can keep one copy of the form when the change request is submitted. Another 90 copy will be returned by the Registrar's Office. 91 CR/NCR: The framework should be reviewed. It may only be limited 92 93 by departments for majors and courses required for majors. 94 Report by the Prof. Stapleford thanked the Nominating Committee for creating a 95 Administrative brochure describing student opportunities for participating in the Hunter College Senate and its Committees. The brochure will be 96 Committee: 97 distributed at various places. Approved Curriculum Changes 98 The following changes, as listed in the Report dated April 11th, were 99 approved as per Senate resolution and were submitted for the Senate's 100 information: Items (GS-211) (School of Nursing), US-541 (German), US-548 (Music), US-549 (Dance/Music). 101 102 Committee Calendar Committee Reports: Re: 4-day summer session 103 Prof. Barickman, Chairperson of the Committee, summarized the 104 deliberations and academic concerns raised at the last Senate 105 106 meeting. He informed the Senate that the Calendar Committee had met and considered Senate debate and discussion, and that the 107 108 Committee proposed the following resolution: 109 BE IT RESOLVED, that the issue of changing to a 4-day summer bell schedule be considered further, but that for this summer 110 of 1984 the current schedule of 5 days be held in place. 111 After discussion Prof. Bennick moved that the motion be amended 112 by substituting the following motion: 113

	"that the Senate accept the 4-day schedule, provided that space be made available for classes that need to meet 5 days a week."	114 115
