The floor was open for nominations for Secretary of the Hunter College Senate. 45 Prof. Ken Sherrill (Political Science) was nominated. 46 Prof. Sherrill was elected Secretary of the Senate by acclamation. 47 Senate Meeting Schedule 48 The Senate Meeting Schedule for the following Wednesdays from 4:20 to 5:50 49 P.M. was approved by voice vote: 50 For Fall 1991 Spring 1992 51 September 11 and 25 February 5 and 19 52 October 9 and 23 March 4 and 18 53 November 6 and 20 April 1 and 15 54 December 4 and 11 55 May 6, 13, 20 Approved Curriculum Changes 56 The following curriculum changes, as listed in the three-part report dated 15 May 57 1991, were approved as per Senate resolution and were submitted for the Senate's 58 information: Items US-768, US-769, US-770, US-771 (Mathematics & Statistics), 59 US-786 (Romance Languages), GS-320 (School of Health Sciences/Nutrition), 60 GS-329 (School of Health Sciences/Communications Sciences), GS-330 (Art), 61 62 GS-331 (Theatre & Film), GS-332 (School of Health Sciences/Environmental and Occupational Health Sciences), GS-333 (Educational Foundations/Rehabilitation 63 Counseling). 64 Prof. Korn suggested that in an effort to save money the full curriculum packa-65 66 ges not be widely distributed, but that they be made available in the Senate Of-67 fice upon request. 68 After discussion the following motion was made: 69 The first distribution of proposed curriculum changes with a deadline for challenges and/or corrections (i.e., curriculum proposals under consideration 70 by divisional curriculum committees) shall be mailed to senators and 71 72 department chairs as is current practice. However, the second distribution 73 for approved curriculum changes shall consist of only the cover sheet listing the approved changes, but the complete package will be available in the 74 75 Senate Office upon request. After discussion the question was called and carried. 76 77 The motion was approved by voice vote with 3 abstentions and no opposition. 78 Election results for Vice-Chair Prof. Kirsch announced the results of voting by written ballot for Vice Chair of 79 the Senate, as follows: 80 Richard Baldwin: 81 47 votes Zachary Morgan: 43 votes 82 1 abstention 83

Statement by the Chair:

Prof. Kirsch said:

Mr. Baldwin was elected Vice Chair of the Senate.

"I would like to offer my congratulations to all of you, and I wish you a very productive year. I must say that for myself I believe that the Senate is the most vital structure in this college for shared governance. I urge all of the constituencies who have seats on the Senate to take their Senate representation extremely seriously. I urge departments to fill their seats to be represented, to send people to meetings, and I urge Senators to become as involved as you possibly can. This is the place for all kinds of debate to take place, and it is the place where all of the academic policies and curriculum issues of this college will be resolved. I wish you all very good fortune in the next year in accomplishing that."

Statement by Prof. Carter:

Prof. Robert Carter, Affirmative Action Officer and Special Assistant to the President, requested that the following statement be recorded in the Minutes. He said:

"Madam Chair, I am not certain but it sounds like your remarks may portend the adjournment of the Senate. But I may be wrong, and I wish to be on the record of the Senate and I speak, if you permit, as one having the privilege since I am not a Senator here. A number of events that have transpired on this campus in the course of the last few weeks have gone a long ways to upset what was, I think, an emerging interest in balancing diverse concerns and interests here, and I am disturbed by one or two things. One of which I take some responsibility for, and I want to put it in the record rather honestly, since what you just said is I think exactly apropos. This is the body that deliberates, that legislates, for this college, and I want this in the record. I am disturbed first that the appearance with respect to a disciplinary hearing two weeks ago this coming Friday-I have forgotten what date it was—it was nothing but an appearance really, but seemed to suggest some administrative malfeasance, some misdoings on the part of the administration. That one I know because I was involved in the decision-making, and what happened is that effectively we managed to inform a committee duly constituted in this college on our decision to postpone, and entirely too late. I take some responsibility for that, and so the appearance was there that indeed we had attempted to railroad some people. I would like to be on the record to say that the appearance is totally false, but I know that the realities often look more like the appearances than otherwise. And I want to say that there were no improprieties. I recognize the appearance, and I am disturbed by it, and I participated in it.

There is another appearance that right now bothers me and I want it in the records. And I preface this one by saying initially that I have known and worked with you for a number of years and I have the highest respect. This is not gobbledygook. I am very serious about what I am saying. I hope, and I think that you extend that same respect to me. I say this with respect to Liz Beaujour as well. I have known her since I came here. I have sat on different committees with her. I have served as a faculty member as she has served as acting provost. And so I mean to cast no aspersion on the decision that has been taken here with respect to her chairing this body. I hope I can risk saying that she has equally respected me. But I am disturbed that the appearance again is one in which the technical impropriety of procedure has happened. And insofar as I take seriously the work that I am called to do, I need to say to you that I take note of these things. I really do agonize over whether we are proceeding properly with respect to what we do as an administration sometimes, and also with respect to what has transpired here today. I am not certain it is illegitimate. I am not certain I have any authority with respect to it. But I am certain that it disturbs me that there is the appearance with respect to the balloting that some improprieties because of either tradition or oversight transpired. And I wish to say that if I should have, or find that I have any authority, I will use it in that respect. And I would like those remarks in the Minutes."

Prof. Polsky suggested that a timely 'Point of Order' would have been the appropriate technique for objecting to a procedure in a legislative body.

Prof. Kirsch responded as follows:

"As Chair of the Senate I would just like to say that finding a candidate for a new Chair is no small job and no mean feat. I have been canvassing for the last year, and certainly very heavily for the last six months, for interested senior faculty members who understand the mission of the College and who could give the time that is needed to devote themselves to the position. Senate Chair is a very time-consuming commitment for a faculty member. It is not something that you just do along with your other teaching assignments. It is virtually a full-time job. Therefore, the person who is planning to be Chair, and is willing to run for Chair, is usually evident some

Prof. Beaujour stated that she would be happy to have a sense of the body taken, as she did not wish to chair this body if there were some serious doubt as to whether or not her chairing this body is appropriate.			
After discussion the Chair asked for a ruling by the Parliamentarian as to whether such a motion would be in order at this time.			
The Parliamentarian ruled that a motion to reconsider the election was in order.			
A motion was made to reconsider the election. The motion carried by hand vote.			
Blank ballots were distributed for the election of Chair.
