Professor Frank Kirkland presented the progress report dated May 19, 1999, with the following correction. The last two sentences of the first paragraph under Item IA are revised to read,

However, a little more than 47% of the graduating students surveyed "strongly disagreed" or "disagreed" with the claim that "advisers suggested ways for me to satisfy the requirement with as few courses as possible." Thus a little more than 47% of the graduating students surveyed expressed difficulty satisfying the requirement, because advisers did not offer them suggestions to satisfy the P&D Requirement in the most minimal way possible.
