President Wexler then addressed the Senate as follows:

Before I turn this meeting over to the Chair of the Senate, I would like to take this opportunity of celebrating in every way the continuing life and good health of this institution, both Hunter College and the Hunter College Senate. I suppose if we looked over the past seven years that we have lived through together in this Senate and in this College, it would have been very difficult to write a scenario 10 11 fraught with as many problems as we have faced together. I must admit that I have never managed to stay up with the television on for 12 13 either one of those late night soaps--I forget the names. But in our own way I am sure that we have been buffeted by as many outside forces 14 15 and internal problems as are reflected in those kinds of journeys. 16 This Senate came into being out of controversy and out of difference of opinion, difference of opinion that were occasionally rational and often irrational in the beginning. I believe that it is to the credit 18 19 of the health of this institution and the good will of this institution, both before 1970 and since that time that a significant number 20 21 of persons in the faculty and in the student body cared through thick and thin, through rationality and irrationality and meta-rationality, that they have stuck with the issues that were involved and with each other, and have forged a way of operating that is a fused Senate which 24 25 has continued to address the major problems of the college one by one 26 and tried to invent procedures for dealing with those problems. 27 know that it has often been wearing, frustrating, for each member of the Senate and for the Senate as Senate. But I have some conviction 28 29 that the process that we went through, largely against the wills of each of us at some time at least, that it was that process that perhaps 30 both toughened us and gave us a sensitivity. Perhaps most of all, it 31 forced us to create patience that helped the institution to deal with 32 33 each other inside and with the outside in the problems that came in 34 the latter part of this decade which were much more severe than the ones we faced in the beginning. I am grateful to those who have 35 36 exercised such good will, such skepticism, such creative dialogue, such difference of opinion, and most of all such really human patience with the institution of the Senate, with the institution of the College 38 39 with each other, and even with the Administration. I wish you very 40 good speed and good life for this institution and for our Hunter College. I believe it has been worth it and it will continue to be worth it. With this I shall call back your Chair with felicitations 41 42 and with gratitude, and with all kinds of good wishes for another 43 44 100 meetings.

President Wexler turned the Chair over to Prof. Rena Gropper, present Chair of the Senate.

Prof. Gropper, in celebration of the 100th meeting, introduced the first Chairman of the Senate--Professor Louis Massa, and the second Chairman of the Senate--Professor Charles Sherover.

Report by the Administrative Committee:

In keeping with the 100th meeting, Prof. Sylvia Fishman, Secretary of the 50 Senate, presented item "a--100 notes." The 100 notes (or more) were sung 51 by Matthew Murray and Robert McPherson, who were accompanied on the piano 52 53 by Miss Kannika Ariyaprakai.

Item "b--100 words" were presented by Professor Margaret Magnus, former Secretary of the Senate and Chairman of the Undergraduate Course of Study 56 Committee. Professor Magnus presented the body with a history of the Hunter College Senate. (Copies are on file in the Senate Office.) 57

Prof. Fishman then moved for ceremonial adoption of item "c--200th Agenda,58 59 for which the question was ceremonially divided.

APPENDIX II

GUIDELINES FOR OAS ADMISSIONS FOR SPRING 1978 ENTRANTS*

<u>Discretionary Criteria - Transfers</u>

- 1. Students in their first semester of college who have a 75 CAA and are at least 3 years out of high school or 21 years old or over. (The credits during the first semester are courses in progress and not considered attempted until the semester has been completed.)
- 2. Students who are at least three years out of high school or who are at least 22 years old who have 0 credits attempted or a 2.0 GPA.
- 3. Students who have been out of college for 5 years or more. (This is already an approved internal policy.)
- 4. Students who have been out of college for 6 months or more who have a 2.0 GPA.
- 5. Students who have been out of college at least one year, who have less than 70 credits attempted with a 1.5 GPA or above. (Admission will be on probation and under contract, as is currently done.)

^{*} Please note: These Discretionary Criteria would only apply to students who indicate Hunter as their first choice, and they would only be applied if we do not fill our quota through application of our regular criteria.

Further note: If we do not give OAS any Discretionary Criteria, the students will automatically be allocated to their next choice; since our policies are still the highest in CUNY, we will lose them permanently. There will no longer be an unallocated pool for later referral and possible admission.
