	*4.	For students who continue a language studied for two years in high school, three credits in the foreign language and three credits in either conversation, reading for research, literature, or civilization.  6 credits		
	*5.	For students who continue a language studied for one year in high school, six credits in the foreign language and three credits in either conversation, reading for research, literature, or civilization.  9 credit	43 44	
	6.	For students who begin a new language, nine credits in the foreign language and three credits in either conver-	46 47

*Students who would fall in categories 3, 4, and 5 would be given a placement examination. Students would get credit for the college course or courses they are made to take as a result of this examination, theoretical high school level not withstanding.
