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APPENDIX II

"Good afternoon. Thank you, Chair Acampora, for inviting me to make a presentation to the assembled Senate on the progress so far accomplished by the Committee on Charter Review.

As many of you know, this Committee was charged last year with reviewing the current Governance of the Hunter College Senate and recommending amendments deemed appropriate for improving the Governance. I was elected to be Chair of the committee, and over the past year its membership has included:

Professors Victor Bobetsky of Music, Jill Gross of Urban Affairs and Planning, Daniel Herman of the School of Social Work, Benjamin Hett of History, David Keepnews of the School of Nursing; ex officio members Brian Duffy and Laura Hertzog, our College Counsel, from Hunter's administration,\; students Elie Chaudrie and Abdul Rad, and, finally but hardly insignificantly, with unerringly skillful assistance, Lara Miranda from the Senate itself.

Everyone has worked hard and well, and we have come far over the past year.

As some of you may recall from the brief remarks I made last March, we have understood our task as not only to review the Governance of the Senate but to enhance the Senate as an institution that facilitates public discourse and communication about those aspects of College life which warrant attention by Hunter College as a whole. In this vein, we operated not as a mini-Constitutional Convention but as a vehicle for reasonable reform, as this committee has done in previous years when the Governance ultimately was amended – viz., 1979, 1981, 1985, 1987, 1992, 1998, and 2006.

For us, we have taken as points of departure, not warranting amendment, the following Article 1, Section 1 and Article 1, Section 2 of the current Governance – which were authorized by the Senate and the Board of Trustees in 1970, 1979, 1980, 1981, 1985, 1987, 1992, 1998, and 2006:

Article 1, Section 1

The Hunter College Senate shall be established as the legislative body of the College with authority to determine College policy on all matters not reserved now or hereafter by Education Law or Board of Trustees Bylaws to the President of Hunter College, to other officers or duly constituted bodies of the College or The City University, or the Board of Trustees.

Article 1I, Section 1

As the College legislative agency, the Senate shall have policy making powers in the following areas:

- A. Curriculum and related education matters.
- B. Academic requirements and standards of academic standing.
- C. College development, review and forward planning of facilities, staff, & fiscal requirements.
- D. Instruction and the evaluation of teaching.
- E. Safeguarding the academic freedom of ALL members of the Hunter community.
- F. Other matters which may be subsequently assigned to the legislative prerogatives of Hunter College.

Having heard me spell out the powers of the Senate as the College's legislative agency in Art. II, Sect. 1, you make think that the Hunter administration serves at the mercy of the Senate. But if you recall Art. I, Sect. I, the Hunter College Senate serves at the mercy of the President (who serves at the mercy of the Board of Trustees and Education Law of the State of New York). In other words, Hunter College operates under the principle of shared governance, and this principle has animated every action our committee has taken.

So far, our actions have been provisional – other than establishing an email address for comments and suggestions from all areas of the Hunter College community, namely: charter@hunter.cuny.edu. But our provisional actions indicate what we may well offer in legislative language next February as amendments to the current Governance – although what we actually offer is not limited by what I mention below. In any event, Chair Acampora suggested that it would be useful for us to indicate to you at this juncture what our current thoughts are. I agreed that her suggestion was both reasonable and prudent, especially as almost all of us have nothing better to do during Winter Break...

We have been thinking that it would be worthwhile the amend the Governance in the following ways: (i) Add the following responsibility of the Chair of the Senate: attend meetings of the College FP&B when appropriate.

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(ii) Abolish Committees on (a) the Evening Council, and (b) the Calendar.

(iii) Reduce student membership on committees to enable more reliable and effective student representation; eliminate student membership in the Evening Council.

(iv) Reconstitute norms for membership in Senate committees to enhance effective representation, to complement (iii) above.

(v) Reconfigure language of the two extant Planning committees to indicate division of responsibilities: (a) Master Plan – long-term policy planning; (b) Facilities and Food Services – physical plant and services, utilization of college space.

(vi) Require reports and evaluations of Centers and Institutes to Senate, as well as the Office of the Provost (in accord with CUNY By-Laws, 1.09).

(vii) Require annual reports to Senate by Deans of Schools of new School initiatives and plans.

(viii) Provide representation for interdisciplinary programs in the Senate (e.g. Asian-American Studies, Public Policy, Human Rights). =

(ix) Recommend establishment of the current Select Committee on Honors and Select Committee on Academic Freedom as Standing Committees (pending consultation with current Chairs of Select Committees; reconfigure responsibilities of current Roosevelt House Advisory Committee to become a Standing Committee that facilitates integration of Roosevelt House planning with College mission and Senate authority. =

(x) Recommend changes, where advisable, to representation of Lecturers, Part-time Lecturers, and Adjuncts in Senate.

(xi) Review responsibilities of all committees to make sure that they conform with the Governance, are necessary, and promote the well-being of the College – particularly the Budget Committee and Appeals committees.

Our committee is scheduled to meet during Winter Break to hammer out (philosophically) language for each of these items. We plan to offer our considered judgment to the Senate as a whole in February, at which time the Senate will need to approve any changes to the Governance three times before they become part of the Governance."
