	BE IT RESOLVED, t hat the language in the current <i>Hunter College Grade Appeals Procedures</i> be changed to read as follows:
	 <u>I.B. paragraph 5</u>: FROM: Within three weeks of its appointment, after considering all the evidence, the Department/School Grade Appeals Committee will render its decision and prepare a written report of its findings, and submit it to the Department Chair. TO: Within three weeks of its appointment, after considering all the evidence, the Department/School Grade Appeals Committee will <u>meet in closed session</u> and render its decision and prepare a written report of its findings, and submit it to the Department Chair. <u>All proceedings are confidential</u>

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II. D. paragraph 2:

FROM:

After considering all the evidence within the grading standards previously established for the class, the Committee will meet and reach a decision by majority vote...

TO:

After considering all the evidence within the grading standards previously established for the class, the Committee will meet <u>in closed session</u> and reach a decision by majority vote. <u>All proceedings are confidential</u>... AND,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the phrase "all proceedings are confidential" does not apply to information that is legally required or to information that is required to implement CUNY or Hunter policies.

After discussion, Professor Sherrill moved that the motion be amended by requesting the Administrative Committee to look at the wording vis-à-vis the AAUP Guidelines. The motion to amend carried by voice vote.

The resolution, as amended, was approved by voice vote.

Committee Undergraduate Academic Requirements Committee Re: E-Permits

Reports:

Professor Anne Ediger, Chair of the Committee, presented the following report for the Senate's information:

The Undergraduate Academic Requirements Committee of the Hunter College Senate notes with some alarm, that based upon a recent Board of Trustees resolution, grades for courses taken on permit at another CUNY institution with Hunter College approval now appear on the student's academic record and therefore are included in the computation of the student's grade-point average (GPA). As a result, all items dependent upon a student's GPA – including graduation with general college honors, academic standing, and the Dean's List – are affected for those students who take courses on permit.

This suggests the beginning of a slippery slope towards the loss of the Hunter College identity. Departments should note this change in policy when reviewing their Departmental Honors criteria and when approving or denying permit requests. Departments may want to review their arrangements with the registrar on how E-Permits are presently approved. Also, all major and professional advisors should discuss the implications of this new policy with their advisees.

The UARC recognizes that the Senate had already taken this issue up previously, but now that its implications are clear, strongly recommends that the Senate Chair alert all departments and faculty to the implications of this policy change.

After discussion it was moved that the Senate refer to the UARC the matter of e-permits and determine whether a college-wide policy, including the possibility of limiting the number of permits, is necessary.

Professor Sherrill moved that with regard to the number of e-permits a student may take the motion be amended as follows: "Nothing in this resolution is meant to affect the ability of departments to make academic judgments about permit and transfer."

After discussion, Professor Sherrill's amendment was defeated by voice vote.

The motion to refer to committee was approved by voice vote.
