FINGERPRINT CLEARANCE IMPORTANT UPDATE



For all current students in teacher preparation and school counseling programs who do not yet have fingerprint clearance from both the New York State Education Department (NYSED)

and the NYCDOE, the School of Education is requiring that all steps of the fingerprinting process be completed by <u>January 31, 2021.</u>

Failure to meet this deadline will impact your ability to register for summer and fall courses.

Temporarily, the NYCDOE is allowing the OSPRA 103 (a form that transfers fingerprint clearance from the State to the City) to be submitted via email until December 31, 2020. If you are unsure of your status or need support with the process, please contact the Office of Clinical Experiences at Oce@hunter.cuny.edu.

Tracing the development of tap dancing from ancient India to the Broadway stage in 1903, when the word "Tap" was first used in publicity to describe this new American style of dance, this text separates the cultural, societal and historical events that influenced the development of Tap dancing. Section One covers primary influences such as Irish step dancing, English clog dancing and African dancing.

Section Two covers theatrical influences (early theatrical developments, "Daddy" Rice, the Virginia Minstrels) and Section Three covers various other influences (Native American, German and Shaker). Also included are accounts of the people present at tap's inception and how various styles of dance were mixed to create a new art form.

What was the culture like there and how doesit differ from the culture in the United States?

I enjoyed spending my entire childhood in Haiti. I had a very privileged and sheltered childhood which I now know plays an even bigger role in my perspective of how different the US and Haiti are from each other culturally. Despite the fact that Haiti is considered one of the poorest countries in the Western Hemisphere, it is filled with so much beauty, natural resources, and to be frank one of the best education systems that I have experienced thus far. There is something that needs to be said when analyzing education in underserved countries. Although, there are many factors as to why I think both the U.S. and the education system in Haiti are quite different, it is my opinion that the economic status of both countries severely impacts the turnout. In my experience, I have observed that students in Haiti and/or those who are first generation in the U.S. and other European countries tend to highly prioritize the value of their education. Whereas, some students who are being offered the quality education tend to not value their experiences and/or the

When did you move to the United States?

I moved to the U.S. when I turned 16 years old, finishing high school in the States

For your undergraduate degree, where did you study and what did you study?

I completed my undergraduate career at the SUNY New Paltz. I was fortunate to study business; majoring in International Business with double minors in French and Political Science. My undergraduate allowed me to understand the business and realistic side of what it entails to pursue a career within the art field. So, I made it my goal to sustain myself even while pursuing what I loved.

Did you go immediately after to grad school?

Yes! I was lucky to have been accepted into one of my top choices for graduate school.

Where did you study for your graduate degree and what did you study?

Upon completion of my Bachelor of Science, I was fortunate enough to begin studying at New York University. I was accepted into the Tisch School of the Arts where I completed my first Master of Arts in Performance Studies. I then proceeded to receive a second Master of Arts in Education at Hunter College, in the AGDEP program. I did not plan to pursue two Masters. I wanted to create artwork that I find meaningful and at the time I found that NYU's Performance Studies program offered the theoretical knowledge that I sought to incorporate in my practice. To conclude, teaching dance education as a career made perfect sense. It allowed me to dig into my practice, be sustainable and still give me space to explore and find deeper meanings.

What classes in grad school would you say were most helpful to your career and which classes did you enjoy most? I know it is unfair to say I enjoyed all of them, but I did. Overall each class contributed

I know it is unfair to say I enjoyed all of them, but I did. Overall each class contributed to where I am today! I very much enjoyed some of the most theoretical based graduate classes that were offered at NYU. Although they were very challenging at times, they also pushed my research forward, ergo my understanding of social activism and its continuous relationship with dance. In fact, I think one of the courses that I could say provided me with a parallel experience from NYU is Professor Ipiotis's Dance History course. She would not accept anything mediocre from me nor any of her students and she also assisted me with my research for my Salon Series which really pushed me to further deepen the complexity of my research.

Do you have any advice for students transitioning out of grad school?

You matter, your work matters, and your ideas matter. I would start off by saying, surround yourself with like-minded individuals especially when it comes to your research and practice. Understand that establishing boundaries will be beneficial to your growth. Do not take others personally and in the words of one of my favorite speeches by Mary Schmich, "sometimes you're ahead, sometimes you're behind...the race is long and, in the end, it's only with yourself."

Could you describe a little bit more about your current work with choreopoems and how you got interested in the work?

I have forever been interested in Ntozake Shangés framework and her use of words to bring stories to life. During my time at NYU I based a lot of my research on her practice and how she eloquently uses storytelling to capture vulnerability, womanhood, and strength. So, during my time at Hunter, I thought it was a great opportunity to begin to dig into my own practice, using part of the theories I have studied over the years, Ntozake's framework to explore what it means to be a woman today in our time, in the Pan-Africanist community, an overall exploration of womanhood. Although I have thoroughly admired Ntozake's framework, I decided to re-shift my gaze using her framework to create a new paradigm that explores my own understanding and experience as a Haitian woman living in the U.S. Ntozake among many other women such as Toni Morrison, bell hooks, Assata Shakur, Zora Neale Hurston and many more have open doors for women like me to think, break boundaries and continuously challenge the definition of womanhood in our society. I only seek to share some of my findings, as always, my artwork is not for everyone, so I encourage the audience to take what they need

Do you have any current projects you are working on?

Yes, yes! I am currently working on developing a series of choreopoems titled khoreowords. Think of it as a collection, an assortment of sorts; vulnerable moments, chaos, and words all aligned to tell multiple stories through movements of what it is to be human today.

What is your current job and how long have you been working there?

First, I am an artist and a storyteller. I am also a high school Dance Education teacher at a charter school in the South Bronx. I've been teaching dance full-time in urban communities for about 5 years.

What do you teach in your curriculum and what do you most enjoy teaching in your curriculum?

I teach students to be open-minded through a series of different explorational concepts. My goal is to create a culturally responsive curriculum relevant to students' communities and their experiences. I hope that students leave my class feeling more inquisitive creatively and academically. I enjoy challenging students' thinking and my hope is that they find their artistic voices and create their own

Do you have any advice for Hunter AGDEP students when it comes to teaching in the school systems?

I have multiple pieces of advice for prospective and current AGDEP students. To start, I cannot stress enough how important class management is. Students are unable to fully learn if a teacher is incapable of managing the class. My second piece of advice is to have fun, it's okay to not know everything in your first year. We all learn as we get more accustomed. Lastly, remain as open-minded as possible.

Let your students teach you as much as you are eager to teach them.


