New Faculty Handbook in Preparation

Provost Laura Strumingher has asked the FDA to prepare a new faculty handbook to be ready by June 1990. The Handbook Committee, composed of Nancy Dean, Milagros Garcia, Michael Griffel, Mildred Kuner, and Margaret Magnus, has met twice, letters have been sent out, and replies are being received. The plan of procedure is to build on the past handbooks, to use texts authorized by offices involved, to complete the new text by February 1, then to check and confirm with offices again, with hopes of getting the whole manuscript to the printing office by March

The Committee invites faculty to submit suggestions of items that should be included, by December 10. Faculty members are urged not to refrain from making suggestions, supposing that surely the item has been thought of. If the suggested item or topic is already in the works, nothing is lost, but glaring omissions are always possible, even with excellent committees. As now planned the handbook is aimed to help new faculty orient themselves, but to provide as well a reference guide for "old" faculty. One segment of the handbook is planned to provide information about pragmatic operations, the what, where, how, when of things. The other segment will present an ethical or philosophical emphasis: faculty responsibilities and rights, Administration procedures, Union policies, with referral information if texts are not provided.

The aim is to provide a useful, straightforward document that is compact and attractive. The suggestions and contributions of the Hunter Community will be gratefully received. Please drop suggestions in the carry-all on the door of the FDA office 1414 East.
