Opportunities for Visiting Professorships and Research:University of Puerto Rico at Rio Piedras Full-time Visiting Appointments. The Program invites members of the CUNY faculty to apply for the 1990-91 period or later. Visiting CUNY faculty may teach at the graduate or undergraduate levels, and may pursue research interests. CUNY will pay faculty members visiting the UPR their full semester or yearly salary. The UPR will provide low-cost subsidized housing in its faculty residence area adjacent to the campus.

Special Projects and Events. In addition to the regular exchange of teaching faculty, the Program sponsors seminars, symposia, lectures, research, and other joint projects. CUNY faculty members are urged to present proposals for such activities.

JEWELL HUGHES BUSHEY 1896-1989

We have just learned of the death of Jewell Bushey on May 5, 1989 in Fayetteville, Arkansas. Professor Bushey is fondly remembered here as teacher of Mathematics and Chair of the Mathematics Department for 26 years. A charter member of the Mathematical Association of America, she was a Vice-President of the MAA and a member of its Board of Governors from 1957-1960. Born on March 13,1896 in Fayetteville, she received her BA with Honors in both Mathematics and Greek and Latin in 1915 when she was 19. She received an MA in Mathematics from the University of Missouri and her PhD in Mathematics from the University of Chicago, Magna Cum Laude. She served on the faculty of the University of Arkansas from 1918-1930 before coming to join Hunter's faculty. She chaired the Department of Mathematics from 1940-1966 when she retired. The University of Arkansas awarded her an honorary Doctor of Laws in 1949. She died at the age of 93, still clear headed and alert.
