Who Is My Advisor?

Each student is assigned a nursing advisor at the start of their program. School staff will provide this information to you.

This list is posted each semester outside of the Undergraduate Office on the 5th Floor at the Brookdale Campus.

You will also be enrolled in a Blackboard Organization based on program with your advisor, where information will be available to you.

If you are uncertain who your advisor is, please contact the Undergraduate Office at 212-481-7598.

It is likely your Nursing advisor will stay your Nursing advisor throughout your journey in the program. You will be notified if there are any changes.

The Role of an Advisor

The role of your advisor at the Hunter-Bellevue School of Nursing is to assist you with monitoring your academic progress, course selection and academic performance; to support you in your educational and career planning; and to direct you to opportunities and resources that can enrich your education. You are strongly encouraged to e-mail or plan visits with your advisor during the academic year.

Your advisor is expected to:

- 1. Be available. You will be able to speak to your advisor as needed throughout and prior to semesters. Your advisor is accessible through email and phone.
- 2. Be knowledgeable. You have the right to expect that your advisor provide you with accurate information about your program course requirements.
- **3. Care.** Every student has the right to be treated by their advisor in a respectful, caring, considerate manner.

Your Role as a Student

Ultimately, your role in the advising process is that of a planner, executor, and manager of your educational and professional pursuits in order to get the most from your education. It requires you to be proactive, to stay informed, and to seek help when you need it. You will need to develop and define realistic academic and career goals, be knowledgeable of university and school policies and procedures, continuously monitor your progress in meeting academic program requirements, stay on top of important deadlines, and plan for what's next after graduation. You are your own greatest advocate, but your advisor is here to help you along the way.

As an advisee, you are expected to:

- Learn as much as possible about your program requirements.
 Become familiar with <u>DegreeWorks</u> to track your academic progress and review academic planning resources available on <u>Hunter's website</u>.
- 2. Prepare for each visit with your advisor by making a list of questions on the courses or program you want to discuss.
- 3. Schedule a meeting with your advisor every semester for assistance with selecting your courses. The Office of Advising will assist you with non-nursing courses.
- 4. Keep a record of your academic progress and goals, including an up-to-date transcript, and bring this information with you to your advising appointments.

Meeting With Your Nursing Advisor

Before the Meeting

- If you have never met with your advisor before, introduce yourself by sending them a brief email.
- Ask them of their availability to meet for the first time.
- Bring a copy of your transcript(s), if any, and a list of current courses you are taking.
- Prepare a list of questions you have in advance.

During the Meeting

- Remind them of your educational and career goals.
- Don't be afraid to ask questions.
- Take detailed notes.
- · Be respectful of their time and thank them for meeting with you.
- Ask them when you should meet with them again.

After the Meeting

- Make a list of actionable items to complete, with dates that each item should be completed.
- Update your advisor on your progress periodically.

Preparing for Registration

Before Registration

- Meet with your nursing advisor at least 3 weeks before registration. Check the <u>academic calendar</u> for registration dates.
- Take stock of all the courses you have already taken or received transfer credit; check your progress in <u>DegreeWorks</u>.
- Review the <u>schedule of classes</u> for course offerings.
- Refer to the <u>undergraduate course catalog</u> to learn about course offerings. Check that you meet any prerequisites listed.
- Review tuition and fees, payment information, and other finances with <u>Bursar</u> and <u>Financial Aid</u>. Check CUNYfirst to ensure you do not have any <u>holds or stops</u> on your account.
- Make a note of your specific <u>enrollment appointment date</u> posted in CUNYfirst (Student Center > Enrollment Dates).

During Registration

- Register on-time to ensure the best chance of enrolling in the courses you want to take.
- Save a list/confirmation of your selections and take note of required textbooks for each course.

After Registration

 Review add/drop deadlines and other important dates for the upcoming term in the <u>academic calendar</u>.



Preparing for Your Final Year and Graduation

At Least 12 Months Before Graduation

- Review <u>how and when to apply for graduation</u>. Take note of important deadlines to ensure a timely degree audit process.
- Review your <u>CUNYfirst</u> and <u>DegreeWorks</u> records to ensure that all information is accurate, and your major/minors are listed properly.
- Review the <u>course catalog</u> of the year you entered the program for a list of all relevant courses and other requirements.
- Meet with Hunter <u>Advising</u> and your nursing advisor to review your progress in meeting all general education and major requirements.
- Register for your last year of classes.

During Your Last Year

- Meet with your advisor each term to review your progress and pending requirements. Register for your last term.
- Prepare for the <u>NCLEX-RN</u> (Generic BS and A2D students).
- Consider next steps in your career and/or explore graduate programs to advance your skills and knowledge. Seek faculty letters for references and prepare graduate school applications.
- Meet with <u>Career Development Services</u> as you prepare cover letters and resumes when applying for jobs.
- Review and RSVP for <u>Commencement</u>. Let the department know if you will be attending your commencement or convocation ceremony.
