57 c) **Faculty Nominees for Student Tech Fee Committee**

58 Chair Keating called on Provost Valeda Dent to provide a description of the Student Tech Fee
59 Committee.

60 Provost Dent said the following:

61
62 “Thank you, Laura. As you all are aware, the issues around the digital divide have become much
63 more pronounced during the pandemic. This is all across the New York City and across this
64 nation, so the idea of being mindful of the ways that we can leverage technology to support
65 student success and student progression becomes even more critical. The Student Technology
66 Fee Committee is a committee that is mandated by CUNY. It is essentially a way for us to provide
67 conversation and discussion around how the student technology fees that we collect are spent.
68 There are two faculty members from the Senate that are going to be presented as being members
69 of the Student Technology Fee Committee. Essentially, the student technology fee itself provides
70 funds that are specifically geared towards students, so the monies that we collect in this regard
71 have to be used for students’ improvements, students’ success, students’ progression, and so on.
72 This year, just as an FYI, the committee membership was reworked so that the group is a little
73 bit smaller and nimble, and assurances around graduate, undergraduate and representation by the
74 professional schools has also been paid attention to. So, faculty with relevant experience and
75 expertise in this area have been chosen to participate along with folks from student members and
76 members of the administration. So, that is just a very brief overview.”

96 **Committee on the Budget**

97 Chair Keating called on Professor Randall Filer, Chair of the Committee on the Budget, to present the
98 **Resolution for a Program Supplement Fee for PhD in Nursing Program.**

99 Professor Filer said the following:

100 “First of all, some of you may be very confused because we have never had something called a program
101 supplement fee come before the Budget Committee or the Senate in my time of service. We are used to
102 approving excellence fees, but excellence fees are supposed to be for add-ons for over and above the core
103 program. That is what originally we were discussing, but then CUNY Central said no. Because the fee
104 that we are asking the Senate to approve today is necessary in order to operate the program itself, it needs
105 to be called a program supplement fee. It is consistent with CUNY bylaws, CUNY charters, CUNY rules.
106 We have been instructed by CUNY Central to call it that if we approve it.

107
108 “This resolution is ready for the vote but we will discuss it first. The program has done its budget very
109 carefully. The Budget Committee has reviewed this budget very carefully. The program works only if it
110 charges \$1020 a credit. This is a Research PhD in Nursing. It will be the first standalone PhD at Hunter.
111 There has been a Nursing PhD at the Graduate Center. It is my understanding, and maybe Dean McCain
112 will speak about it, it has not been doing well, and CUNY has decided to phase that out and move the

117 entire Nursing Research PhD to Hunter which is clearly the logical place to put it. It is a 66.5 credit
118 program. So, with this extra fee - the total per credit \$1,020 - students will end up paying \$67,830 for the
119 PhD. I know that sounds like a large number, and the Budget Committee pushed and talked very carefully.
120 I have done some research that I want to share with you. According to the Health Resource Services
121 Administration at the Department of Health and Human Services, there is a shortage of over 1500 PhD
122 nurses for teaching in universities alone with starting salaries going up from \$100,000 a year well up into
123 the \$250,000 a year. So, it is a shortage desperately needed to train the health care workers that we have
124 realized that we need over the last year. I have also discovered that for people who do do a PhD in Nursing,
125 there is a Nurse Faculty Loan Program run by the Department of Health and Human Services that will
126 forgive 85% of the cost of the program up to \$35,000 a year. So effectively, we are asking for a program
127 fee of \$67,000 and the net cost to people who actually complete the program will be more like \$6,000 or
128 \$7,000 for a job that is an incredible need, where Hunter can do an incredible job of serving the
129 community. The Budget Committee has looked at it. It looks like the program will not detract from other
130 areas of the college. It will not require resources that reduce anything else in the college. We see no reason
131 why not, and we were unanimously endorsing it.

137 **WHEREAS, as of Fall 2020** the CUNY Graduate Center no longer accepts applicants into the Ph.D. in
138 Nursing program that allows graduates to apply for faculty positions in college and university nursing
139 programs;

141 **WHEREAS,** the degree granting authority of an existing program, the Ph.D. in Nursing, currently offered
142 by a consortium (Hunter College, Lehman College and the College of Staten Island) with the CUNY
143 Graduate Center as the granting institution (NYSED # 31082) will be transferred to Hunter College to
144 administer all aspects of the program and bear all the costs of the program.

148 **RESOLVED:** That the Board of Trustees of the City University of New York adopt a schedule of
149 Program Supplement Fees for Ph.D. students in Nursing at Hunter College, effective with the Summer
150 2022 semester and as detailed below:

153 Resident Full-time students:	\$460 per credit
154 Resident Part-time students:	\$460 per credit
155 Non-Resident students:	\$460 per credit

 187 one calendar day prior to the last day of classes as indicated in the Hunter College academic calendar (also
 188 one day prior to the deadline to officially withdraw from a class with a grade of W). Notification of the
 189 student's P/NC choice will be sent to the course instructor by the Office of the Registrar. Students may
 190 not elect the P/NC grading option after these deadlines and there are no appeals allowed for late election.

 195 **Undergraduate Course of Study Committee**

196 Chair Keating called on Professor Jeanne Weiler, co-chair of the Undergraduate Course of Study
 197 Committee to give an update on the Committee's work. Professor Weiler said the following:

198
 199 "Thank you, Laura. Hi everyone. I'd like to acknowledge my co-chair Stefan Schlussman who also is
 200 involved in this work. Kevin's task was to create the policy. Our task is now to implement the policy. So,
 201 I wanted to update everybody very briefly on where we are at in terms of that process. To refresh
 202 everyone's memory, the P/NC now includes the P that now includes the D. That is different from the
 203 Credit which was A through C. We were informed that the Hunter Registrar's Office was mandated to
 204 change Credit/No Credit prohibitions of courses to Pass/No Credit. Since this transition only pertains to
 205 courses, we have the task of identifying which majors, minors or programs would like to add the P/NC
 206 prohibition since the P now includes the letter grade of D. We also want to allow departments to opt out
 207 of this policy for individual courses. We have designed a process whereby we will survey departments on
 208 whether they would like to exclude specific courses applied to their majors, minors or programs from the
 209 P/NC designation, in other words prohibiting the use of P/NC in their majors, minors or programs. We
 210 plan to gather a list of these courses from a form that we designed and approved. The UCSC will collect
 211 the courses with the P/NC prohibition. We will review and approve them, and then we will pass it on to
 212 the Senate for the regular Senate curriculum vote on April 21. So, we will be seeking help from the Provost
 213 Office to meet this April 21 deadline. We will be meeting with Provost Dent the week after Spring break.
 214 Based on our conversations with CUNY Central, it seems like we will have to wait until Fall 21 to
 215 implement this policy in order for this to appear in the University Academic Report and to give the time
 216 to inform students of the policy. So that is where we are at. The process has not been fully completed yet
 217 but we are getting close to it. We will be working with the Provost Office to message out to departments
 218 what exactly we are looking for in terms of list of courses that we can approve very quickly."

APPENDIX II

Resolution on Hunter College Policy on Pass/No Credit

Resolved, Hunter College shall have the following policy regarding selection of the option of Pass/No Credit in lieu of letter grades. The policy shall be included in the section on Pass/No Credit Policy for Undergraduate Courses in all future Hunter College catalogs and on the Hunter College website.

From:

Pass/No Credit Policy for Undergraduate Courses

In some courses, it may be possible to elect to receive credit for the course without receiving a letter grade. If students decide to receive a grade based on this system, they will receive “Pass (P)” instead of A, B, C, or D and will receive “No Credit (NC)” instead of F. Students requesting grading according to this system must satisfy all requirements regarding attendance, assignments, and examinations set by the instructor. Course requirements and standards are the same as in the letter grading system, but P/NC grades are not counted when a student’s GPA is calculated by Hunter College. Students can choose whether they want to take a course for a letter grade or P/NC, but certain restrictions apply.

Restrictions for Pass/No Credit Grades:

1. Departments or programs may restrict a student’s choice in opting for Pass/No Credit. Some programs of study prohibit the use of Pass/No Credit grades in major courses. This applies especially to programs of study leading to outside certification or post-graduate study. Students should check with their departmental advisers for specific policies. Departments or majors that restrict student choice of the P/NC option must have this policy approved by the Senate.
2. Pass/No Credit grades are not allowed for students on academic probation.
3. A maximum of four courses (including repeated courses) taken at Hunter College may be assigned a Pass/No Credit grade (and/or the previous designation of Credit/No Credit) on the Hunter College transcript, excluding any courses with mandatory CR/NC grading.
4. The grade of P shall be used to replace the academic grades of A, B, C and D. The grade of NC shall be used to replace the academic grade of F. It shall not be used to replace the grade of WU.
5. If (as a result of a student’s request) a P/NC grade (and/or the previous designation of Credit/No Credit) is given where it is not an allowed grade according to existing college, departmental, or major regulations, it will be converted by the Registrar’s office to the underlying grade entered by the instructor.
6. If, after requesting P/NC grading (and/or the previous designation of Credit/No Credit), a student receives an INC, the P/NC grade is applied when and only when the instructor changes the INC (or FIN) to a letter grade. A student’s request for P/NC grading (and/or the previous designation of Credit/No Credit) will remain in place until a letter grade is earned.

Alert

Other colleges, graduate and professional schools, services, and employers may not favor Pass/No Credit grades. They may convert “Pass” to “D” and “No Credit” to “F” for their purposes. Such decisions are made by other institutions. Before opting for P/NC grades, students should consult with advisors in the Office of Advising, in their academic program(s), and in the Office of Financial Aid. They should also check the policies of external financial-aid agencies.

Rationale: This resolution revises Hunter's P/NC policy which was approved by the Hunter College Senate on March 10, 2021. We subsequently learned that CUNY policy requires that P/NC requests must be received by the Registrar prior to, rather than on the same day as, the deadline for students to withdraw from classes with a grade of W.
