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26 Interim Provost Pardasani said the following:

28 "Good afternoon, everyone. We are here to give you two updates. One is a very brief update on Middle
29 States which will be in a couple of minutes, but the first update is on Brookdale SPARC. Everyone knows
30 that Brookdale campus will be demolished in a year from now and then redeveloped. That will hopefully
31 take about five to six years. In the meantime, all the programs that will be at Brookdale SPARC have to
32 find a home somewhere else: on 68th Street and other campuses. So, there are renovations that will be
33 going on simultaneously at several facilities. Gustavo Ordonez who is our Vice President of Operations
34 and Associate Provost Chris Braun from the Provost's Office are leading the effort. I am going to yield
35 the lectern to them to give them the most recent update."

37 Interim Provost Pardasani yielded the floor to Christopher Braun, Associate Provost & Assistant Vice
38 President, Research and Gustavo Ordonez, Interim Vice President for Administration. Their presentation

42 **States:** Chair Chinn invited Dr. Geralyn Lederman, Provost Chief of Staff, to provide an update on Middle States.

44 Dr. Lederman said the following:

46 "As Provost Pardasani said, our site visit is scheduled for Fall 2027. It seems like it is a long way away,
47 but it is not. Time flies. We have steering committee co-chairs: Dean Erica Chito-Childs and Professor
48 Tom DeGloma. We will have a website up imminently which will be updated at regular intervals with
49 what is going on. There will also be a dedicated email for Middle States for you to reach out to us if you
50 would like to be involved. Of course, you can reach out to the Provost's Office directly, as well. If you
51 have any questions or want to be involved, just let us know. There are seven standards that we have to

Chair Chinn informed the body that Professor Roseanne Flores, Ombuds Officer, is on sabbatical leave this academic year. The Administrative Committee is accepting nominations for a temporary appointment for Ombuds Officer who will serve during the 2024-2025 academic year. The appointment will be announced at the 23 October meeting.

Committee on the Calendar

Chair Chinn invited Professor Zachary Shirkey, Chair of the Committee on the Calendar, to give a brief update.

Professor Shirkey said the following:

“There has not been any additional action per se. We will have a discussion on this over the course of the month of October. We are planning to bring this to a question on the 23rd of October. I am presenting at the next FP&B meeting, so chairs can discuss it with their departments at the October department meetings. Then, we could have presumably well-informed senators with department input for a robust discussion in October.”

Joint Report by Committee on General Education and Undergraduate Course of Study Committee

Chair Chinn invited Professor Christopher Mitchell, co-Chair of the Undergraduate Course of Study Committee, to give an update on the new Pluralism & Diversity requirement. The updated list of the approved Pluralism & Diversity courses is available in Appendix V.

Professor Mitchell said the following:

111 “First, I wanted to thank my fellow members of the UCSC for their hard work on this. This is a lot of
112 work, and we are really deliberating about these proposals. We have 94 proposals that have been fully
113 approved.

119 We have about twenty to thirty that are pending. A number of faculty members have also been contacted
120 about revisions. In the last meeting, we also decided as a committee that committee members would be
121 able to respond to their comments to proposals where we asked for specific revisions. I know there had
122 been questions from departments about how those comments were being made and what exactly we were
123 looking for. I would like to emphasize, please read. I know most of you are, and this will sound obnoxious.
124 But, please read the forms carefully when you submit, because some people are still submitting new P&D
125 proposals with the old framework in mind. The old framework is very content focused. The new
126 framework is really focused on learning outcomes. So, we are looking for learning goals that are reflected
127 in syllabi. We are looking for readings, and in some cases, we also are looking for assignments to
128 substantiate new P&D categories. I feel like we have done a lot of work, and we still have a lot of work
129 to do. The expedited process is still open, so if you want to be considered in an expedited way, please
130 submit by the end of this semester. It is possible that we might extend through the Spring, but we would
131 like to conclude this process sooner rather than later.”

APPENDIX II

“I will be brief. Last time I spoke about how we are all committed in this community to finding spaces to reflect on global issues that have such impact on so many different local communities, our families and friends and our neighborhoods even as we recognize and want to embrace the differences in perspectives, beliefs and experiences across our diverse community. I know that the Senate Ad Hoc Committee will be taking this on this year, as will the FDA, various student groups, faculty and staff across the college. We look forward to working together on this.

“In this regard, Manoj and I have been having conversations with various members of our Hunter community, Deans, faculty, staff, students. We think it will be useful to consider mounting a series, a variety of different conversations, panels, and events over the course of the year about broad topics: topics about pluralism, academic freedom, dialogue across difference, what healing spaces look like. We have begun to be in touch with potential speakers. One of the things I wanted to do today was, first of all, talk about one that we know will be coming, but then urge you all to make suggestions of people you know, both outside of Hunter and inside of Hunter, who might be good to think about holding different kinds of conversations, panels, events, arts, performances; whatever you think would really make sense with regard to the broad topic.

“So, speaking of broad topics, on November 18th as part of this series, Eboo Patel, who some of you may know runs Interfaith America, a nonprofit in Chicago, has had tremendous experience working across difference, thinking about bridging dialogues, thinking about how one creates a context where you recognize and acknowledge perspectives that differ, that clash even, but you bring them together in some broader sense of pluralism. So, Eboo is going to come on November 18th. He will do some small group discussions, and then he will give a public lecture that evening. I know that we will give more advance notice on this, but I hope everybody can think about coming to that. He also has colleagues in Interfaith America that do wonderful small group discussions, trainings, conversations. They possibly will come later after Eboo’s visit. And, any groups or student clubs who want to have that kind of conversation and training, they are really good at this. That is one thing I wanted to bring up.

“Then, in addition, AACU, the American Association of College and Universities, has a great set of resources that they are circulating and their title is “Advancing the Democratic Purposes of Higher Education.” It is guidebooks for free expression and inclusion, help desks for campuses to manage conflict in conversations, and just general readings on academic freedom and teachable moments. So, these resources will be widely available. The Provost’s Office will send a community wide email with links to these resources. I just wanted to make sure that you all are aware of those. So, the main point here is to start putting together a really robust set of conversations and taking different forms, different formats. I am really hoping that this can be robust, and a way of saying that we can recognize difference, the way John Inazu says: look, we are not all going to come to a single definition of what we view as common good, but we can maybe come to some common ground where we can be together. I think that is the basic aim here. So, that is one point.

“Then, let me give you a few other very specific updates from Academic Affairs. You know that Middle States is coming up again, and there will be, I think, some conversation here today, to update on that. CUNY is doing again its Faculty Fellowship Publication Program which we urge faculty to think about submitting for. The deadline is October 25th. You can talk to either Chris Braun or Niki Bennett for more information on that.

“Also, in terms of CUNY wide training sessions. You know that we have a big emphasis on smoothing the transfer process. It is very important. There are training sessions on October 16th and 24th about what is called the transfer explorer “T-REX”. Those would be helpful for chairs, faculty, staff as well as students to think about attending.

“Then, I want to point to something I am very excited about. Student Affairs has just opened the Immigrant Student Success Center at Thomas Hunter building, room 305. This is a wonderful project to really think about how we support our phenomenal immigrant students: undocumented and documented immigrant students. Raquel Torres is the head of the Student Success Program and has a wonderful program assistant Marco Betances. They are going to be hosting panels and meetings, working with the Dream Team and student group and professional advising panels. I can’t urge us all enough to really be excited about this. I do a lot of work nationally with the President’s Alliance on Higher Education and Immigration. This is just a really important thing for us to all be doing, and there is lots of resources. We are obviously in a time when this is not an easy time, to say the least, on questions of immigration, and whereas the narrative may have both swung to a narrative about borders. Let’s not forget that we are really talking about human beings here. We are talking about a talent pool. We are talking about the future of this country, and we need to stand forth in as strong and as supportive way as possible. So I’m very excited about that.

“I am also really pleased, in terms of the operations groups, to talk about the fact that we are teaming with CUNY Sustainability office. Hunter Sustainability Director Kelly Stevens has been working with them. We have a ten-year sustainability action plan that is looking at all kinds of retrofitting to really reduce carbonization and to think about sustainable procurement, waste, water, energy, transportation, and to look at a variety of our buildings and the ways in which we might reduce fossil fuel emissions and reliance on fossil fuels, etc. So, that is all happening. I think that is exciting.

“You will hear a bit about SPARC today, so I won't go on at length about that, except to say that there is a website that will keep everybody up to date on what is happening with SPARC both in terms of the movement to here and to other buildings around the city and in terms of SPARC itself going forward in the building and the planning. Speaking of buildings, the second floor of the Library is out for bid. We are bringing it to the CUNY Board of Trustees, we hope, for their October meeting.

“Then, two other really important things in Gustavo's very busy shop: one is that they have identified lactation rooms. We are really working hard on that. There is a great location in the West building, 7th floor, I am told, that needs some retrofitting and stuff, but we hope it will be ready by the Spring semester. We are looking for other ones in other buildings across the college. Then, very importantly, prayer rooms. We have been trying to identify spaces to allocate as a college prayer space on this campus. There are prayer spaces at Brookdale. We want to make sure that we are allocating up a large enough space here, and that MSA does not have to use its own club space for the prayer space. So, we are working hard on that, and we are going to make progress on that.

“One final thing from the ICIT group. The month of October is Cybersecurity Awareness Month. They are urging that everyone take the cybersecurity awareness course that is offered on the web. Then, talking about web. As we talked about at FP&B yesterday, there is a very strong program going on to do a migration of departmental and office websites and redesigns largely to make sure that we are doing ADA compliance, which is critically important, but also migrating to a new CMS WordPress, cloud-based CMS. So, department by department is going through it. I think there have been, I am told, 53 of 167 Hunter websites that are fully migrated. There are things to do in terms of making sure that once they are migrated, the department can then really rework it. That will require a second phase that we are trying to make sure gets done.”

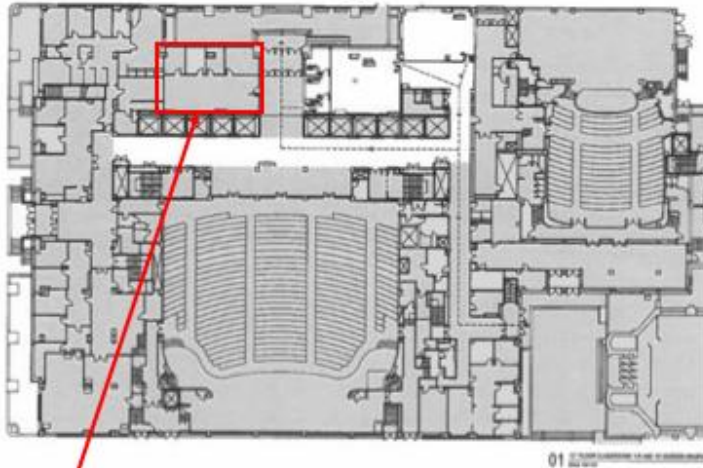

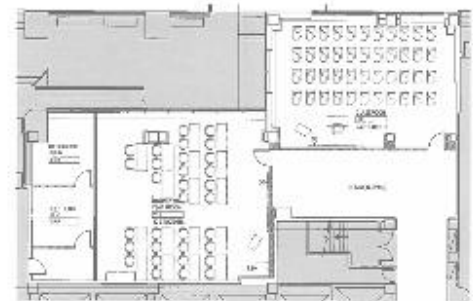

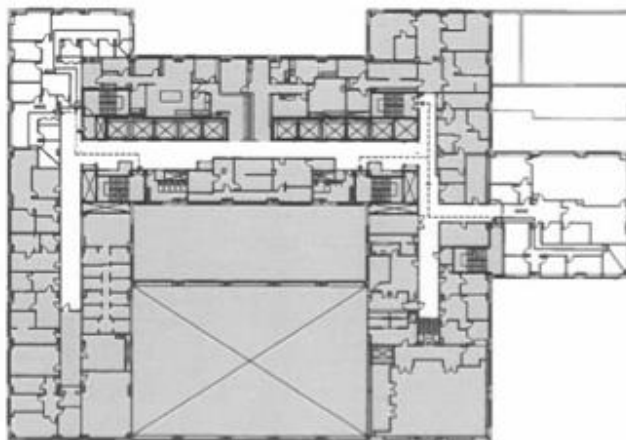


Redeployed as swing space

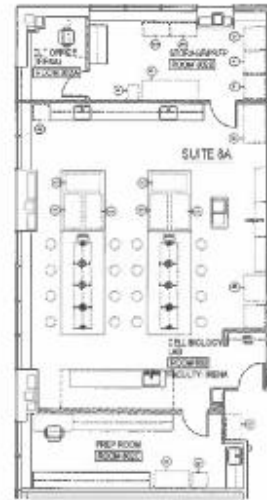

Faculty Research

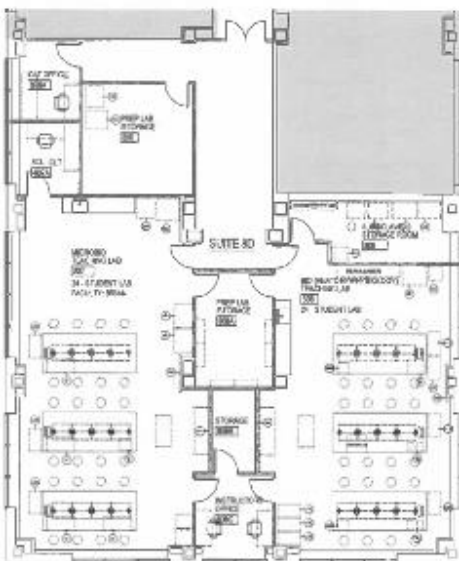


MLS offices and Bio Faculty Research

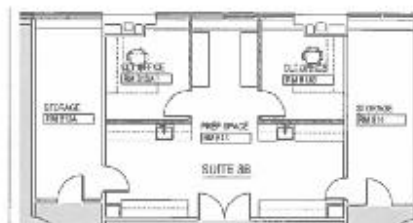


Cell Bio Classroom

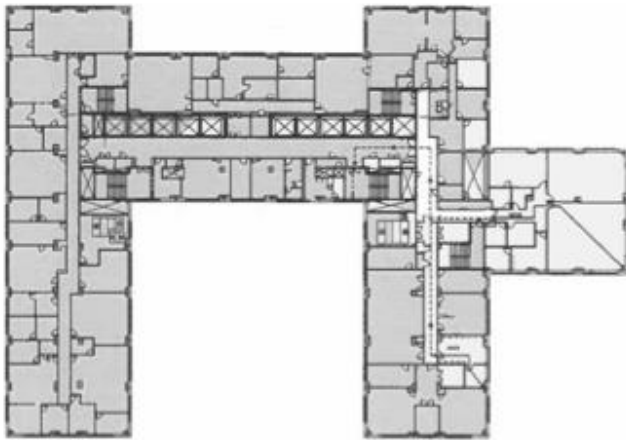


Two Teaching Labs and Prep spaces



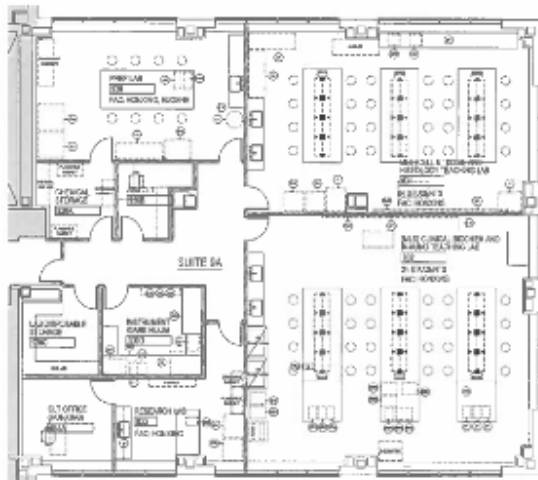

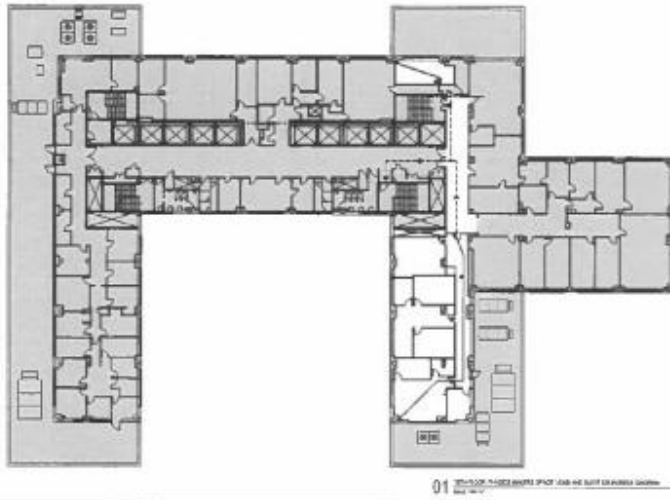

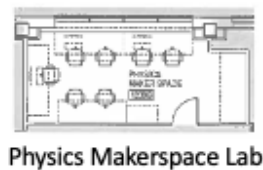

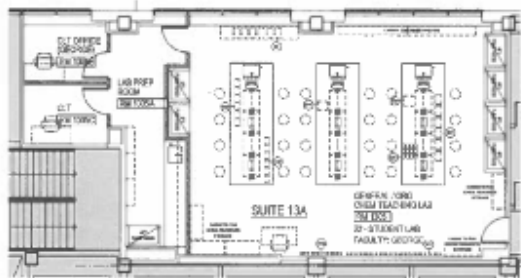

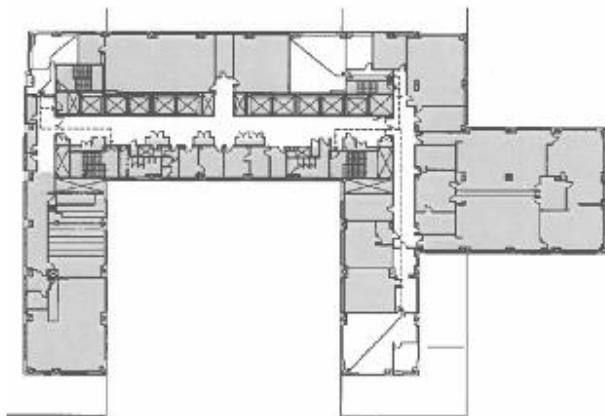

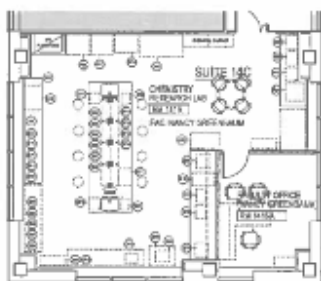

ESTABLISHMENT OF SEARCH COMMITTEE FOR PROVOST

President Cantor has asked the Hunter College Senate to begin the process of electing a **Search Committee for Vice President of Academic Affairs and Provost**. In accordance with the *College-wide Search Procedures* (see excerpt below), nominations for membership on the Search Committee will be conducted as follows:

Deadline for Submitting All Nominations:

All nominations must be received by the Senate Office, Room E1018, **NO LATER THAN 5:00 PM on Thursday, October 17**. This is an **absolute deadline**. (Election of the Search Committee will take place at the October 23 Senate meeting.) Please call the Senate Office at 772-4200 if you have any questions, or e-mail senate@hunter.cuny.edu.

Excerpt from the *College-wide Search Procedures*

3. Search Committees for College-wide Administrators:

A. Nomination and Election of Candidates for Membership:

Each department (or equivalent) may nominate one full-time faculty member by election among its full-time faculty members and one student by election among its student majors (or equivalent) for service on the search committee. Faculty (including part-time faculty) and students may be nominated at-large by petition of 25 members of their constituency.

The Hunter College Senate shall elect a panel of 8 faculty members and 6 students from the pool of nominees in such a manner as to achieve the widest possible distribution among the divisions*. From this panel, the President shall choose a search committee consisting of 4 faculty members and 3 students.

B. Nomination and Election of Candidates for Chairperson:

Any member of the Hunter community may submit nominations for Chairperson. The Senate shall elect a panel of 3 from among the Hunter community at-large from which the President shall choose a non-voting chairperson. The Chairperson shall function as the executive officer of the committee, sending out all correspondence, distributing information on candidates, arranging interviews, etc.

4. Search Committee Responsibilities:

The Search Committee shall be responsible for soliciting the best candidates for the particular job. It shall follow up on all recommendations made to the Committee, and it shall carefully review and consider all applications submitted to the committee, including those of an outside consultant, if the College President in consultation with the Senate Administrative Committee decides to employ such a consultant to widen the pool of applicants.

As a result of its search procedure, the search committee shall submit to the President a list containing the names of at least 3 qualified candidates. The President shall either appoint someone from this list or request that the committee re-open its search to produce a new list.
