### APPLYING TO HEALTH PROFESSIONS GRADUATE PROGRAMS

#### GUIDE FOR PRE-HEALTH DREAMERS STUDENTS Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals DACA or Dreamers

**Dreamers** or recipients of the **Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals** Policy (DACA) are students that are protected from deportation as a result of having immigrated to the United States at a young age without US government authorized papers. Students currently holding this classification are considered lawful members of society and are eligible to apply for a Social Security Number, work permits and driver's and professional licenses.

#### PLEASE NOTE:

The Supreme Court of the United States issued a decision on June 18, 2020, that found the Trump Administration's termination of DACA violated federal law. The United States Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) is still accepting DACA renewals; however, the National Immigration Law Center (NILC) recommends that renewal applicants seek legal representation from an attorney or an Office of Legal Access Programs-accredited representative before applying for renewal.

According to the NILC, USCIS should begin to accept first-time DACA applications; however, the National Immigration Law Center (NILC) recommends that renewal applicants seek legal representation from an attorney or an Office of Legal Access Programs-accredited representative before applying.

## General Questions for DACA students:

### Q: Can DACA students take the MCAT?

**Yes.** When registering for the MCAT, DACA students are eligible to receive a free placeholder social security number (SSN) to use for registration purposes. You may call the AAMC, who administers the MCAT (Phone: 202-828-0400) and let them know that you do not possess a SSN, and they will assign you an identification number (you do not need to reveal your status). This assigned identification number is also used with your AMCAS application:

#### Q: Are DACA students eligible for the AAMC's Fee Assistance Program?

A: Yes. Each fee assistance award includes access to the Medical School Admission Requirements website, reduced fees for MCAT registration, waived MCAT Official Prep product fees, waived AMCAS application fees for one application cycle, and more. ## Q: Which medical schools are currently accepting DACA students?

# Q: Can DACA students receive federal financial aid?

A: No. DACA students are not eligible to receive federal aid, including Pell Grants. *DACA students should not file the FAFSA*.

# Q: Can DACA students receive state aid from New York?

A: Yes. The New York State Tuition Assistance Program (TAP) is a grant and does not have to be repaid. TAP helps eligible New York residents pay tuition at approved schools in New York State. Depending on the academic year in which you begin study, an annual TAP award can be up to \$5,165. Again, because TAP is a grant, it does not have to be paid back. All information provided will be used ONLY for determining eligibility for and administering awards. If eligible, you can apply for one or more grants and scholarships.

## Q: Can DACA students receive private financial assistance.

A: Yes. Some private schools offer financial assistance. To be eligible for private financial aid, DACA students must complete and submit a *College Scholarship Service Profile*. A CSS profile may be used to apply for non-federal financial aid from the university. The fee for the initial application is \$25 and additional reports can be purchased for \$16.

## Q: As a DACA applicant, should I apply to private or public graduate programs?

A: Since New York State offers financial assistance to DACA students, applying to both public and private schools is acceptable. In general, private schools are less restricted to whom they can award scholarships and tend to have greater financial resources for low income students.
