 Rationale: The new description fixes typos in the old description, while being clearer about the kinds of questions the class will address, as opposed to listing themes. In addition, the new description

better reflects the themes emphasized in the course. In particular, the class has a greater emphasis on the politics of global migration, consistent with its provision of P&D (category 1) credit. The new description should emphasize that migration is an important theme of the class.
