APPENDIX II

Report by the President

The President stated that he would briefly talk about the budget situation. He said: "I will be brief because there is still a whole lot of uncertainty that surrounds the budget issue, which is of very direct concern to us. You know that the revenue shortfall has risen from \$900M to approximately \$2B, and that the State is near the end of its fiscal year. Even if all State agencies were to freeze all the vacant positions, that would still yield only about \$100M in revenue, leaving a very considerable gap between the size of the revenue shortfall and the budgetary needs of the State. The State will probably borrow money this fiscal year to make up for the loss in revenue. It means that the debt that is being incurred this year will roll over into next year, and that will be added onto projected shortfalls of anywhere from two to three billion dollars in the next fiscal year. It means as well that we will suffer a cut in our budget for the Spring semester. We don't know exactly how much that will be, but my belief is that it will be somewhere in the area of \$350,000 for the Spring semester, 1989.

The Governor is talking about a \$35 to 40M cut for the senior colleges of this system, which will directly affect us in the academic year 1989-90. Again, nothing is definite. That is a figure that is being put out, but it is dependent on a number of conditions that could change. The most significant of those conditions is of course the delay of a reduction in the State income tax. Were the Governor and the Legislature to postpone the latest round of income tax cuts in New York State, then revenue would be produced in greater abundance than is forecast. When you talk about this, you talk about New York State politics. As you probably saw in the Times, the Governor has proposed to the Legislature that he have sole budgetary authority to make cuts for the remainder of this fiscal year. It was curious that there was no response initially from either the leadership of the Assembly or the Senate. I believe if someone like Stanley Fink had been in charge of the Assembly, he would have immediately reacted to the Governor's proposition in a negative kind of way. Mel Miller is now in charge, and there is a change in the Senate leadership as well. Those individuals may wish to avoid any of the political backlash that might derive from making a priority listing on what should be cut and what should be retained within the State.

The Provost, the Vice President for Administration, the Deans, and I have been meeting on a regular basis to discuss this situation as it evolves. We can handle a \$350,000 decrease in our budget for the Spring semester with some pain, but not acute pain. If we have to handle a percentage of \$35M for 1989-90, then we are talking about something of considerable magnitude. My feelings are that we will not lay anybody off at this College, and that we will avoid in every way possible the curtailment of existing faculty and staff. I have told Department Chairs to go ahead with the recruiting season, and to bring in outstanding candidates to fill faculty positions at the College for the next academic year. Once we find out in a more precise kind of way what 1989-90 looks like--which we may not know for many months--then we will be able to put together a plan of action for meeting fiscal constraints for that academic year. Again, our priorities will always be to protect the academic integrity of the College and to protect positions at the College. I would ask every member of the Senate and every member of any collective bargaining agency at this college to be actively involved in lobbying efforts that the PSC and other unions will be mounting with regards to the Legislature and the Senate. Students at this University represent about 190,000 votes, faculty and staff about 40,000 votes. They are down-state votes, but they still count a lot. Intense lobbying will take place, and we should be very active partners, if not leaders, in such

President LeClerc opened the floor to questions, but none were asked. He concluded his report by wishing everyone a happy and healthy Thanksgiving.

APPENDIX III

Procedures for the Election of Search Committee for Dean of Social Sciences

A. ELECTION OF CHAIR-PANEL — Panel of 3 candidates:

Each voter must vote for three candidates.

B. ELECTION OF MEMBER-PANEL — Panel of 8 faculty and 6 students:

Each voter must vote for a minimum of 4 faculty members and 3 students up to a maximum of 8 faculty and 6 students. (A ballot containing the votes of <u>fewer</u> than 4 faculty or 3 students, or <u>more</u> than 8 faculty or 6 students, will be <u>declared</u> invalid.)

C. PROCEDURE FOR COUNTING VOTES:

The highest vote getter in each department is declared elected in the order of the highest number of votes each achieved. If there are still vacancies to be filled, the second highest vote getter in each department is declared elected in the order of the number of votes each achieved. The process terminates when all vacancies are filled.

Note: This procedure guarantees that all Departments are represented on the panel with no more than 2 candidates from each Department.

D. Listing of Departments for Election of Member-Panel for Search Committee for Dean of Social Sciences:

Anthropology Economics History Political Science Psychology Sociology Urban Affairs

From the two panels, the President will choose a Search Committee of 4 faculty, 3 students, and a Chair.
