Report by the President:	The following is a summary statement of President Shalala's report to the Senate:	7 8
	Re: Budget: President Shalala reported that there are no major increases or decreases in the CUNY budget that would affect Hunter. The budget includes a special allocation for remedial courses, and we are planning to use Hunter's portion to increase the number of remedial courses offered in the summer to eliminate some of the backlog. We also received some money for Roosevelt House. The capital budget is excellent. We received both the construction money and new planning money in almost all areas that we requested. This will alow us to continue renovations at Hunter North at a fairly quick rate. In our next budget request we will move beyond the 695 requirements and add some work for Brookdale, and we expect to have a major recommendation for the School of Social Work. The governor gave the College a matching grant of \$600,000 for the renovation of the Playhouse. We are the first college to receive this kind of challenge grant, which has to be matched one to one. Report by the Ombudsman:	The following is a summary statement of Ombudsman Korn's report to the Senate:	32 33
	Prof. Korn's report focused on campus safety and security. The concern is for personal security, the security of equipment, and the quality of life here at Hunter College. There is a growing impression that the security system and personnel are at best minimally adequate and that at times security staff is part of problem. Security personnel carry very noisy equipment, lock toilets without indications of where other facilities will be available, and lock stairwell doors without indicating that reentry is limited or where re-entry is possible. This can create panic and a very frightening atmosphere. He recommended that the Administrative Committee form a committee of faculty and students to attend to these issues and to monitor progress toward solutions.	34 35 36 37 38 39 40 41 42 43 44
