During this time, by my own calculation, I have handled approximately 76 to 80 cases, dealing with every variety of problems: from assisting in tuition refunds, grade appeals, resolution of incompletes, conflict of personalities—between faculty and student, faculty and chair, student and supervisor—to dismissal from programs, alleged bias, harassment, counselling. The overwhelming number of cases involved students, then faculty, none from staff. I am, therefore, appealing to members of the staff present here to urge their fellow-workers to use the office of the Ombuds Officer. 	1. Faculty shall use the plus/minus system for the ink portion of all grade sheets beginning with the fall 1992 semester so that grading patterns may be studied. 	2. The Administrative Committee of the Senate shall, as soon as possible, name a Special Committee on Research Dealing with the Consequences of Plus/Minus grading, to be approved by the Senate.	78 79 80
	The Committee shall consult all relevant constituencies, both faculty and students, and determine the questions to be answered by the research. It will then oversee the conduct of the research and prepare a final report to be submitted to the Senate.	81 82 83 84
