



**Regular Meeting of the Hunter College Senate  
10 April 1985**

	The <sup>192</sup> 179th meeting of the Hunter College Senate was convened at 4:40 p.m. in Room W714.	1 2
<b>Presiding:</b>	Richard Stapleford, Chairperson	3

<b>Report by the President:</b>	Prof. Stapleford informed the Senate that Provost LeMelle would report for the President, and that President Shalala is planning to address the Senate at the next meeting.	6 7 8
	The following is a summary statement of Provost LeMelle's Report to the Senate:	9 10
	<b>Re: Budget:</b> The news on the budget situation is mostly good. The Legislature in Albany has approved \$13M more than had been proposed in the Governor's budget. \$1.2M of the \$1.8M requested in temporary service money was restored. Also restored were 97 of the 127 teaching and support positions. This allows the Chancellor to make some reallocations of lines throughout CUNY. Of the \$250,000 requested for Child Care, \$100,000 were restored. \$2.9M have been appropriated for what is called the School/College Partnership Program, and \$300,000 will be given to organized research. Regarding the capital budget, Hunter will receive the \$6M for renovation, and we will be moving forward on this. The matching grant for the renovation of the Playhouse was also approved.	11 12 13 14 15 16 17 18 19 20 21
	<b>Re: College Calendar:</b> Provost LeMelle informed the Senate that the College Calendar for 1985-1986 will include scheduling of Tuesday evening classes on Election Day evening, Tuesday, November 8.	22 23 24

	b. <b>Security &amp; Safety</b> Prof. Stapleford informed the Senate that in accordance with recommendations made at the February 27th Senate meeting, the Administrative Committee has met with the Ombudsman and the Director of Security. At that meeting Mr. Eaton, Director of Security, indicated that the establishment of a Senate Committee on Security would be helpful. 	<b>BE IT RESOLVED,</b> that the Hunter College Senate establish an "Advisory Committee on Campus Safety and Security." The Committee shall consist of 5 faculty members and 5 students; the Ombudsman, the	45 46 47

Director of Security, and the Director of the Residence Hall at Brookdale shall serve ex-officio.	48 49
The purpose of this Committee shall be to improve communications between the College community and Campus Safety & Security. The Committee shall review procedures and make recommendations to improve the safety and well-being of the Hunter community, and it shall monitor security conditions at the College and report back to the Senate at least once a year.	50 51 52 53 54 55
Prof. Stapleford informed the Senate that the Administrative Committee would submit nominees for membership on the Committee for Senate approval at the next meeting, and asked that anyone who is interested in serving on this Committee should contact the Senate Office promptly.	56 57 58 59
He then suggested that a vote on the resolution be taken after Mr. Eaton had presented his report and had answered questions from the floor. There having been no objection, it was so ordered.	60 61 62
Prof. Stapleford introduced Mr. Desmond Eaton, Director of Campus Safety and Security, and opened the floor for discussion.	63 64
During discussion, Mr. Eaton informed the Senate that the annual Report for 1984 is now available in the Reserve Room of the Library. The report lists all incidents that occurred during 1984 and the first three months of 1985, and describes problems and achievements.
