	Report by the Budget Committee  Prof. Peter Basquin, Chair of the Committee, informed the Senate that the Senate Budget Committee is working toward having the Senate take an active part in the budgetary overview and planning process. During the past few months the Committee started deliberations on some aspects of the budget. The budget process is very complex and the Committee has elected to begin with the portion of the budget that involves the budgetary process itself—the overview from the point of view of State allocations, allocations to Hunter, the way they are lined out into the different areas of spending at Hunter, and the way in which the budget compares from one year to the next. Several members of the Administration are members of the Committee without vote. Among these and especially important to the Committee is Vice President Anthony Picciano who will speak today	33 34 35 36 37 38 39 40 41 42 43 44 45

as a member of the Committee and will handle the bulk of the report. Prof. Basquin said that the Budget Committee is very interested in receiving any suggestions, either structural suggestions, which indicate in which way the Committee should take an active role or what sorts of things it should look into, or budget initiatives for the College as a whole. One thing the Committee can clearly do is to make recommendations to the President and members of the Administration concerning initiatives that should be taken and appeals for funds for specific needs that might be met.

He then yielded the floor to Vice President Anthony G. Picciano.

Vice President Picciano said that the Adminsitration welcomes more input from the various constituencies in the budget process. This report is a starting point and the Committee is planning to line out an agenda over the next year or so. The Committee had expressed a need on the part of the College community and the Senate to understand the budget process more clearly. He then led the Senate item by item through the material that was distributed and which had been endorsed by the Committee, explaining the definition of terms, such as the distinction between Operating Budget and Capital Budget; and College Allocations vs. CUNY Lump Sum Allocations. The "Operating Budget" includes items like salaries, supplies, equipment; the "Capital Budget" is for major renovations. Over the last few years there has been a movement on the part of the State Budget Division and CUNY to move away from direct allocations to individual colleges, and instead put more funds into lump sum allocations which would then be redistributed to the various colleges by the Central Office of CUNY.

#### Definition of terms:

"Line Item Budget"—The State allocates a sum of money, which has to be spent in a particular fashion that is lined out in detail. The basic categories of line items are the "Major Objects of Expenditure" and the "Major Purposes of Expenditure." The "Major Objects" are how we can spend the money; they are broken down into two broad categories, "Personal Services" and "Other Than Personal Services." Under "Personal Services" we have full-time salaries (instructional as well as non-instructional), adjunct monies (instructional, Lab Technicians, etc.) Temporary Service monies (administrative college assistant type functions). For "Other Than Personal Services" we have line items such as equipment, supplies, and contracts. For "Major Purposes" the broad categories are  $I\ \&\ DR$  (Instructional and Departmental Research), which are basically academic programs. "Extension and Public Service" includes Brookdale Center, where we provide public services. "Organized Activities" includes the Art Gallery and Audio Visual Center. "Maintenance & Operation" is Buildings & Grounds. "General Administration" are the Offices of the President, Vice President and Business Office. "General Institutional Services" include Security, Mail & Messenger Service, Administrative Computer Services, etc.

Vice President Picciano answered questions from the floor, and concluded his presentation by highlighting some of the changes that were made in the 1986-1987 Budget.

### 1986–87 Budget Policy Issues (CUNY)

Mr. Picciano then informed the Senate that in reviewing the CUNY Budget some major decisions were made under policy issues: (a) there was no consideration of tuition increase. (b) the State Division of the Budget has requested that a new revenue account must be established specifically for the operation of a Dormitory, which must be self-sufficient. (c) for the first time all adjunct monies have been pulled out from the College budget as a College allocation, and have instead been established as a Central CUNY Lump Sum allocation. This means that we have to develop a process by which we request our adjunct funds from CUNY; (d) the concept of a flexibility legislation was passed and this will give the President some flexibility, about 5%, to make shifts in the budget from one line item to another line item.

In the area of full-time positions, Hunter College was allocated an additional 15 positions for the coming year as a result of redistribution of the early
