"Exceptions to these Guidelines: Special situations may occur when, for example, there is a candidate of proven distinction within the University, former University executive, or a candidate of national prominence from outside the University, or an exceptional candidate from a recent CUNY presidential search. Under such circumstances the Board Chair and the Chancellor, after full consultation with the leadership of campus constituencies, may decide to suspend these guidelines for a specific presidential search and substitute a shortened process."	142 143 144 145 146 147 148 149
