## Meeting of the Hunter College Senate 21 May 1986

Report by the President:	The following is a summary statement of President Shalala's report to the Senate:	7 8
	President Shalala informed the Senate of a major gift in memory of Mary Dolciani. Mary Dolciani was a very distinguished member of the Math department, who started the Math Learning Center, and who has sold more textbooks than any other person. Her family has given the Math Learning Center an outright gift of \$ 50,000 with a promise of another \$ 50,000 if we match it. This we intend to do, and we are pleased with the gift and even more pleased that we will be dedicating the Math Learning Center to the memory of Mary Dolciani.	9 10 11 12 13 14 15 16
	We have finished one round of consultations on the new budget initiatives for 1987-1988. Early in June we will be putting together the Hunter budget request. The Senate Budget Committee, student leaders, and a variety of other groups will make recommendations. Regarding the existing budget, we still have not heard about the adjunct monies. We do have a good sense that our enrollments are holding very well, and we are going to be in good shape in relationship to enrollments. We are planning to hold enrollments to what our budget numbers are, and will try not to overadmit this year. Going hat in hand to the Chancellor for more adjunct money does not solve the problem of over-used facilities and not enough support staff. Staying within our budget numbers combined with the determination to spread classes more evenly across the day, should give us more relief in the Fall.  President Shalala informed the Senate that the Trustees have decided to evaluate her next spring. Her scheduled review is not until Fall 1987/Spring 1988, but she had volunteered so that her evaluation would take place at the same time as the Middle States review. This way we do not have to generate two sets of data. The Trustees have a procedure as well as a consultation process that involves faculty, students, and staff, and they will be in touch with the appropriate governance bodies about how they intend to organize themselves.	18 19 20 21 22 23 24 25 26 27 28 29 30 31 32 33 34 35 36 37 38 39 40
