

# MINUTES

## Meeting of the Hunter College Senate 24 February 2021

The 649<sup>th</sup> meeting of the Hunter College Senate convened at 3:40 PM via Zoom.

**Presiding:** Laura S. Keating, Chair

**Attendance:** The elected members of the Senate with the exception of those marked absent in Appendix I.

Alternate Senators were formally seated consistent with the procedures approved by the Senate for in-person meetings, and they were enabled to vote using iClicker.

**Agenda** Chair Keating informed the body that the Undergraduate Academic Requirements Committee and the President would not report today. The UARC slot time was given to the Committee on the Budget. There were no objections. The agenda was adopted as revised.

**Minutes** The minutes of 22 April and 13 May were approved as distributed.

**c) Senate Assembly Rules for Meetings Held Remotely**

Chair Keating reported that no comments were received on the draft Rules distributed on January 29 and asked the body for permission to proceed in accordance with consideration by paragraph procedure. She explained that the Senate would consider one rule for debate and amendment at a time. There would be no vote on the adoption of the rules until all rules had been considered, and a vote on any motion to amend had occurred. The vote to adopt would be on the whole set as amended at the end. There were no objections to proceeding in the manner described.

57 **Resolved that the following Rules be adopted for Remote Senate Meetings**  
58

59 **1. Seating of attendees**

60 **a. Joining information:**

61 The Senate Office shall send by e-mail with the call of the meeting the Zoom log-  
62 information and meeting link and, as an alternative and backup to the audio  
63 connection included with Zoom, the phone number and access code(s) for the  
64 meeting.  
65

66 **b. Meeting availability time:**

67 The Senate Office shall schedule the Zoom meeting availability to begin at least 45  
68 minutes before the start of each meeting.  
69

70 **c. Joining requirements for all Senate members:**

71 All Senate members must display first and last name when they join the Zoom  
72 meeting so that they may be identified and logged in by the Senate Office staff for the  
73 purpose of recording attendance.  
74

75 There were no debate or amendments to Rule 1.  
76

77 **2. Assigning a Senate member voting privileges at a meeting**

78 **a. To be able to vote and count toward a quorum, a Senate member must**

- 79 i. join with the ability to be viewed via video at the meeting if requested by
- 80 the Senate staff or the chair; and
- 81 ii. have an iClicker account and be able to access that account during the
- 82 meeting via the iClicker app or on iClicker.com.  
83

84 **b. When Senate members join and are logged into the meeting, the Senate Office**  
85 **records the order in which members arrive.**

86 **c. Senate members are given voting privileges at a meeting by means of the Senate**  
87 **Office staff activating their iClicker account for that meeting.**  
88

89 **d. Senators arriving prior to the scheduled start of the meeting are logged in as having**  
90 **voting privileges at the meeting.**  
91

92 **e. If fewer than 100 Senators have joined by the scheduled meeting time, Alternates**  
93 **are logged in as having voting privileges in the order in which they arrived, up to a**  
94 **number of 100 total voting members.**  
95

96 **f. Once 100 is reached, Senate members shall still be logged into the meeting as they**  
97 **join for the purpose of recording meeting attendance, but they will not be eligible to**  
98 **vote during the meeting.**  
99

100 **g. Senate members assigned voting privileges at a meeting shall maintain voting**  
101 **privileges throughout the meeting, even if they are disconnected for some time during**  
102 **the meeting and have to rejoin, but to participate in a vote, they must be present in the**  
103 **Zoom session while the vote is going on.**  
104

105  
106 There were no debate or amendments to Rule 2.  
107

108 **3. Announcing a Quorum & Quorum calls**

109 **a. At the start of the meeting, the presence of a quorum shall be established by**  
110 **number of iClickers activated.**  
111  
112

117                   b. Thereafter, if there is a call for a quorum count, it shall be ascertained by use of  
118 iClicker, or if necessary, by a roll call carried out with voting members viewable by  
119 video.

120  
121 There were no debate or amendments to Rule 3.

122  
123 **4. Technical requirements and malfunctions:**

124 Each Senate member is responsible for his or her audio and Internet connections. No  
125 action of the assembly shall be invalidated on the grounds that the loss of, or poor  
126 quality of, a Senate member's individual connection prevented participation in the  
127 meeting, assuming a quorum is maintained in the case of the loss of a member's  
128 connection.

129  
130 There were no debate or amendments to Rule 4.

131  
132 **5. Forced removal or muting:**

133                   a. The chair may cause or direct the removal of attendees to the waiting room or the  
134 muting of their microphones if they are causing undue interference with the meeting.  
135 The chair's decision to do so, which is subject to an undebatable appeal that can be  
136 made by any Senate member, shall be announced during the meeting and recorded in  
137 the minutes.

138  
139                   b. Without direction from the chair, the Senate staff may mute attendees' microphones  
140 or turn off their video if noise or visuals are disruptive to the meeting.

141  
142 There were no debate or amendments to Rule 5.

143  
144 **6. Time management**

145                   **a. When the meeting will be called to order:**

146 The chair shall call the meeting to order no later than 5 minutes after a quorum has  
147 been achieved.

148  
149                   **b. Limitations on length of reports and presentations:**

150 Reports and presentations shall be limited to 25 minutes not including Q&A or debate  
151 on resulting motions. Exceptions may be granted at a meeting by a 2/3 vote of voting  
152 members present at the meeting.

153  
154                   **c. Extending time past the scheduled meeting end time:**

155 Extensions may only be made for 10 minutes at a time and may only be made if a  
156 quorum is present and by a 2/3 vote of voting members present at the meeting.

157  
158 There were no debate or amendments to Rule 6.

159  
160 **7. Assignment of the floor**

161                   a. To seek recognition by the chair, when not interrupting a person who has the floor,  
162 a member shall use the "Raise hand" function on the Participants panel on Zoom.

163  
164                   b. In the usual order of business, the chair will call upon members in the order in  
165 which their hands were raised. If a preference is to be given to those speaking to or for  
166 or against a point, the chair may recognize the member for the limited purpose of  
167 determining whether that member is entitled to preference in recognition.

168  
169                   c. Once recognized by the chair, to speak, the person assigned the floor may unmute  
170 him or herself or write in the Chat.

171  
172 There were no debate or amendments to Rule 7.

177 **8. Interrupting a member**

178 A member who intends to make a motion or a request that under the rules may  
179 interrupt a speaker shall use the Chat for so indicating and shall thereafter wait a  
180 reasonable time for the chair's instructions before attempting to interrupt the speaker  
181 by voice or by writing further in the Chat.  
182

183 There were no debate or amendments to Rule 8.  
184

185 **9. Making motions in writing**

186 The Zoom share screen function shall not be available to Senate members for the  
187 making of motions. A member intending to make a main motion, to offer an  
188 amendment, or to propose instructions to a committee that cannot be quickly  
189 transcribed by the Recording Secretary, should be prepared to post the motion in the  
190 Chat box when recognized by the Chair. Alternatively, the member should e-mail the  
191 motion to the Recording Secretary at least two days in advance of the meeting.  
192

193 There were no debate or amendments to Rule 9.  
194

195 **10. Voting**

196 **a. means of voting:**

197 Votes shall occur using iClicker or, if necessary, by audible and viewable roll call.  
198 Business may also be conducted by unanimous consent.  
199

200 **b. time limit:**

201 When voting using iClicker, after two minutes, the vote will be closed once a majority  
202 or 2/3 decision, as required, is obtained, or if that does not occur, after four minutes,  
203 by the direction of the chair.  
204

205 **c. announcing the vote:**

206 The Recording Secretary will display the vote tally using the Zoom screen share  
207 function, and the chair shall announce the result.  
208

209 There were no debate or amendments to Rule 10.  
210

211  
212 Debate on the set of the rules as a whole followed.  
213

214 There was a motion to amend Rule 10, Point b as follows:  
215

216 "When voting using iClicker, after two minutes, the vote will be closed once a decision of 2/3  
217 of those present and voting is obtained, or if that does not occur, after four minutes, by the  
218 direction of the chair. "  
219

220 Due to limited time allocated to this item on the agenda, it was decided that the discussion on  
221 the proposed amendment would continue at the next meeting.  
222

- 223  
224 **d) Resolution on Shared Governance & Budgetary Impacts on Academic Policy & Practice**  
225 Chair Keating yielded the floor to Vice-Chair Nibras Ahmed to chair the meeting until 5PM.  
226 Chair Keating read the Resolution into the record. Discussion and debate followed.  
227  
228  
229  
230  
231  
232

238 Whereas, student success is dependent on the effectiveness of faculty, departments, and programs  
239 in carrying out their primary responsibility for academic matters<sup>1</sup>, effectiveness that is sensitive  
240 to what is prioritized in budgetary decision-making, and

241  
242 Whereas, the practice of shared governance involves “communication and decision-making,  
243 which permits each group of participants to feel that it can influence that institution as a matter  
244 of right and responsibility” (CUNY Manual of General Policy, 2.08 Governance of the  
245 University), and

246  
247 Whereas, the Senate, as the legislative body of the college, has the responsibility to foster shared  
248 governance at Hunter College, thus

249  
250 Resolved that the Senate affirms

- 251 • That communications and negotiations between the administration and departments and  
252 programs be timed so that the priorities of departments and programs inform budget and  
253 resource allocation deliberations before final decisions are made by the administration;  
254
- 255 • That any accommodations in academic practices accepted by departments and programs  
256 to help meet budget shortfalls<sup>2</sup> which they believe are not in the best interests of their  
257 educational mission be implemented only provisionally, on a semesterly basis, and so  
258 renegotiated each semester, and
- 259 • That by the end of Fall 2021, the Senate Administrative Committee survey departments  
260 and programs on what they take to be significant budget-related academic issues that  
261 have risen since February 2020 and report that to the Senate and make any  
262 recommendations to the Senate as appropriate.  
263

264  
265 <sup>1</sup>The CUNY Manual of General Policy (2.08, 3.2 The Faculty), states, “Subject to the Board of  
266 Trustees, the faculty is primarily responsible for academic matters, including the criteria for  
267 admission and retention of students, promulgation of rules concerning attendance, the awarding  
268 of credit and degrees, the quality of teaching, research and the guidance of students, and the  
269 general quality and advancement of the academic program of the college.” The CUNY Bylaws  
270 state that “Each college shall have a faculty or academic council, which shall be the primary  
271 body responsible for formulating policy on academic matters. The composition of a college’s  
272 faculty or academic council shall be set forth in its governance plan approved by the board of  
273 trustees” (Art. 8.6); and that “Each department, subject to the approval of the faculty or faculty  
274 council, where existent, and subject to the provisions of other sections of these bylaws, shall have  
275 control of the educational policies of the department” (Art. 9.1.a).

297 There was a motion to make Footnote 2 a separate resolution and add it after the third bullet of the first  
 298 Resolution:  
 299

300 “Being further resolved that examples of the first Resolution might include the following:

- 301 • Course section enrollment caps or minimum enrollment levels,
- 302 • Grader or TA support for large lecture classes,
- 303 • Duties required for a grader or TA (e.g., to attend lecture or meet with faculty  
 304 instructor),
- 305 • Number or type of course offerings (e.g. regular vs large lecture, major courses versus  
 306 gen ed and service courses, day vs evening/weekend, undergrad vs graduate courses),
- 307 • Advising practices,
- 308 • Release time for advising and department or program service,
- 309 • Support of library resources.”

311 There was a motion to amend the amendment by deleting the separation into two resolutions.  
 312

313 There was a motion to withdraw the amendment to the amendment. The motion carried by unanimous  
 314 consent.  
 315

316 The iClicker voting to adopt the amendment produced the following results: 32 in favor, 35 against and  
 317 eight abstentions.  
 318 The motion failed.  
 319

320 At 5PM Vice-Chair Nibras Ahmed yielded the floor back to Professor Keating.

 357 **Committee on General Education**

358  
 359 Chair Keating called on Professor Lawrence Kowerski to report. There was an unintended misstatement  
 360 in the Resolution on Revising the Name of Hunter's Foreign Language Requirement that was presented  
 361 and adopted at the February 10 meeting. The corrected resolution was then presented.  
 362

363  
 364 **Resolution on Revising the Name of Hunter's Foreign Language Requirement**

365  
 366 Be it resolved that the Foreign Language Requirement now be called the Language Proficiency  
 367 Requirement **where the proficiency is, requiring fourth semester proficiency** in a natural language other  
 368 than English (LOTE).  
 369

370 The motion carried by unanimous consent.  
 371

372  
 373 **Committee on the Budget**

374 Chair Keating called on Professor Randall Filer, Chair of the Committee on the Budget to report.  
 375 Professor Filer said the following:  
 376

377 There is good news and bad news. The good news is things are not nearly as bad as they were in the Fall.  
 378 You may have seen that the Governor's executive budget called for level funding of CUNY. This is a bit  
 379 disingenuous because it is level funding at a level that incorporates the 5% cut that we have been asked to  
 380 take in State support this year. There is therefore a 5% shortfall there from our 2019 budget. It also does  
 381 not make any provisions for increase cost of health insurance, fuel or hopefully contractual wage  
 382 increases. Also, we have somewhat run down our none State budget cash reserves from the Hunter College  
 383 Foundation, drawing more than a sustainable level to meet emergencies this Fall. So, things are not  
 384 perfectly rosy. There is, on the other hand, some good news that we are waiting to hear more about. My  
 385 impression is that the executive budget is subject to change and, hopefully, upward revision. State tax  
 386 revenues are running significantly stronger than was projected at the last revision of the State budget. The  
 387 State may have some flexibility. The CUNY Board of Trustees has not yet made a decision about tuition  
 388 increases next year which may also offset some of the projected shortfalls. Finally, I want to correct some  
 389 misinformation floating around. There is federal money. We know that Hunter is targeted for such federal  
 390 money but this is not a simple process. The federal money is not a check that is deposited in our account.  
 391 That money is reimbursable money which means we have to find the cash to spend first. The Department  
 392 of Education has to set priorities what it can be used for and what is cannot be used for. We then make a  
 393 proposal to CUNY which goes for clearance from the Department of Education, then it comes back to  
 394 CUNY that can appropriate for some money that is earmarked for Hunter for its own use. Then, we can  
 395 spend it for things that the Department of Education allows us to spend it on. We have not yet collected  
 396 the majority of the money in the CARES Act in the Spring. Hopefully, it will be coming at some point  
 397 and the money from the appropriations bill in December will also be coming at some point. But it is very  
 398 difficult to spend it yet because we do not have any definite word on when we will receive it and how we  
 399 will be allowed to spend it. In other words, the situation is still tight but not as grievously tight as it was  
 400 in the Fall. I will keep the Senate informed as we learn more information. We are always happy to take  
 401 questions. The Budget Office has been very good at responding to our questions. If the Senate or any  
 402 individual senator has questions about the financial situation, please feel free to write me.  
 403

404  
 405 **Old**  
 406 **Business**

407 Chair Keating asked for permission to return to discussing the proposed amendment to Rule 10, Point b  
 408 of the Senate Assembly Rules for Meetings Held Remotely. There were no objections.  
 409

410 The proposed amendment:

411 "When voting using iClicker, after two minutes, the vote will be closed once a decision of 2/3 of those  
 412 present and voting is obtained, or if that does not occur, after four minutes, by the direction of the chair."
