100 **Report:**

Committee on the Calendar

101 Chair Chinn invited Professor Zachary Shirkey, Chair of the Committee on the Calendar, to present an
102 updated proposal on the revised Bell Schedule. Debate followed.
103

104 **Senate Committee on the Calendar Bell Schedule Proposal**

105
106 RATIONALE: The Revisions to the Bell Schedule, passed by the Hunter College Senate on 9 December
107 2020 and implemented in Fall 2021, require that “the impacts of the new schedule will be reported to the
108 Senate within three years following implementation.” Therefore, the Senate Committee on the Calendar
109 has collected information on the effects of those revisions through a survey of Hunter College students, a
110 survey of department chairs and program directors, and data on room usage supplied by the Registrar.
111

112 In light of this information, and to better align the schedule with student, faculty and staffing needs, as

116
117 well as better use the limited available instructional space at Hunter College, the Committee has voted to
118 propose the following revisions to the Bell Schedule to take effect beginning in the Spring 2026 semester:

120 BE IT RESOLVED that Hunter College adopt the schedule as proposed by the Senate Committee on the
121 Calendar Committee that groups time periods into 150-, 75-, and 50- minute time blocks beginning at
122 7:00am through 9:50pm each weekday.
123

124 Appendix 1 displays time blocks for 75-minute class periods. Appendix 2 displays time blocks for 150-
125 minute class periods. Appendix 3 displays time blocks for 50-minute class periods. These proposed
126 changes do not affect Saturday and Sunday course offerings, which will continue to be governed by prior
127 Senate resolutions.
128

129 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Hunter College adopt a Community Period on Friday from 12:00pm
130 to 2:00pm.
131

132 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that classes offered two days a week will be paired Monday- Wednesday
133 or Tuesday-Thursday. Classes offered three days a week will be Monday- Wednesday-Friday or Tuesday-
134 Thursday-Friday.
135

136 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that there will be exceptions to the proposed time schedule, for example
137 but not limited to, courses in the Schools of Education, Nursing, and Health Professions, courses at
138 Silberman, 63 Madison, & Hudson Street campuses, courses that meet for longer than 3 hours, (e.g.,
139 studios, labs, rehearsals), and courses that meet after 9:30PM Monday through Thursday.
140

141 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Department Chairs and Program Directors will plan schedules,
142 including requests for exceptions, in consultation with school Deans. If the Registrar cannot accommodate
143 particular schedule requests, the issue will be referred to Department Chairs, Program Directors, Dean(s)
144 and/or the Provost to resolve the conflict.

146 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the impacts of the new schedule will be reported to the Senate within
147 three years following implementation.

150 iClicker voting produced the following results: 48 in favor, nine against, and two abstentions.
151 The Resolution failed.

APPENDIX II

“Thank you, Sarah. I will be very brief. First of all, I just want to remind people that November 18th Eboo Patel from Interfaith America is talking at 4pm at Roosevelt House. You should have gotten a memo about it. I really encourage you all to come: staff, students, faculty. It would be really great to see you.

“I wanted to very briefly say a little update on the kinds of listening sessions that Manoj and I have been doing. We have started with faculty and staff in each school. We have gone to Silberman, to Nursing, to the School of Education, to the STEM faculty in Arts and Sciences, to the Social Science faculty in Arts and Sciences. Tomorrow, we will go to the School of Health Professions, then to Arts and Sciences Humanities and Arts, and then the Library. So, it will all be staggered so that we can do a whole bunch of sessions with college-wide staff. We have been meeting with student groups, but then, we are going to figure out some way to do it with multiple student groups, which maybe Daniel will help me figure out, so that it is not too large, so people feel they can speak, but we are still comprehensive. That is kind of an on ramp, if you will, to feed into the strategic planning. So, once all that is done, we are going to send out to everybody a very short survey asking about your dreams for Hunter. Then, we will do a steering committee and some working groups based on a qualitative analysis of the survey. We are open to suggestions about strategic planning and about these listening sessions from anybody. You can always email me or Manoj.

“This is now going to be a little bit down to the nitty gritty, but our lives are in the nitty gritty. I want to talk about elevators and escalators. As you know, Gustavo and his staff are just absolutely up to here with the decamping from Brookdale and all of those renovations. At the same time, I want to assure everybody that we are working on the elevators and escalators. We are going to do a twofold approach here. At the moment, we have one vendor who deals with maintenance on escalators and elevators. That means if multiple things go out, it is hard to get them in time to do stuff quickly. So, we are working on procurement for two more vendors. Procurement takes a little bit of time, as you know, but hopefully that will happen relatively soon. That means that we can at least address ongoing issues as they happen. Then, the bigger issue is, which will take considerably more time but we are starting on the design phase of those already in the North building and West building: the modernization of these elevators, which really will require a staggered approach of taking some offline and then wait on other ones and making sure again that we have multiple vendors, so they do not go out. I have pages and pages (of information on facilities projects) here, but I am not going to give you all the details other than to say if you do have very specific suggestions or questions, please bother Gustavo.

“Then, at the same time as all the big projects are going on in terms of the detail and renovations, and such, there are some very high-profile things that we care a lot about that we are trying to figure out how to get enough staff to get it done. One is lactation rooms. We have identified some space in the West building. Over time, we will also probably add space in the North building for a good lactation room which involves sinks and electrical work, and things like that. Hopefully, it will happen during the winter break and then be ready by the spring.

“Then, a prayer room. That is very important to us. We are working on locating it in the West building B level, and it requires some renovations and some athletic spaces. Again, we are hoping that that is going to be completed early Spring semester.

“Then, gender neutral bathrooms. We are going to do a pilot program to start that so that we can start it quickly. We are going to take the bathrooms on the 3rd floor, 5th floor, and 7th floor of the North building as the pilot program, and then hopefully extend that over time. It involves some fixtures, partitions and stalls, but hopefully it will be ready late Spring for sure, possibly even early Spring.”
