39 40 41 42 43	Committee Reports:	Academic Freedom Committee: Professor Jill Simone Gross, Chair of the Academic Freedom Committee, presented the report. She said:
44 45 46 47 48 49 50 51		"This is going to be a very brief report because there aren't actually any documents to bring you today. I am here today to report on behalf of the committee on Academic Freedom. That committee is currently made up of the following members: Pat Burke from Mathematics & Statistics, myself, Jill Gross from Urban Affairs and Planning, Hall Grossman and John Carry from the Library, Dana Reimer from Geography, Ingrid Bandai Joseph from the Library, and Eamond Picard, our students representative. I am reading you that list because I am going to make a plea because we really need representation from the faculty from Education, from Health Professions and Social Work. The committee is currently working on procedures

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through which we can start to handle concerns and issues with academic freedom. So for those of you that are not familiar with the committee, in December 2004 the Hunter College Senate voted to create a Select Committee on Academic Freedom. That committee was formed at a time when the traditions of academic freedom were under attack nationally and concerns were voiced across CUNY regarding the importance of maintaining a healthy academic environment in which the free exchange of ideas was fostered. In response a Select Committee on Academic Freedom was convinced at Hunter College in the spring of 2005, that was made up of ten members, broadly representative of faculty and students across the college. The role of that committee at the time was to examine and report back to the Senate of the state of academic freedom at Hunter Colleges. Shortly after the committee convened, CUNY also began to take a stance on this. In the fall of 2005, Chancellor Goldstein signed a statement in support of academy freedom in which it was defined as "the freedom to conduct scholarly research, teach, speak and publish subject to the norms and standards of scholarly inquiry without interference or penalty where ever the search for truth and understanding may lead". In February 2006, the select committee fulfilled its charge and produced a report that was released. That report is available if you do a search on the Hunter College website. Amongst its recommendations were that the committee should be established as a more permanent part of the Senate. And, from that meeting there was a Standing Committee of Academic Freedom that was created. That committee was established in September 2006 and the charge for that committee was to monitor, examine and report annually on the status of academic freedom at the college and also to make appropriate recommendations regarding policies and practices through the Senate. Of course before they could fulfill that charge they needed a clear mission and a set of procedures, and that's really what this committee has been working on ever since. At the end of last semester the committee had produced a mission statement but for a variety of reasons there wasn't actually time to release it. The committee has met this year several times and it has decided that before we could release that mission we needed to release that mission in condition with a set of procedures which we are now currently working through. So since that time the committee has been working both on a mission statement and again the more difficult task of establishing procedures for handling issues related to academic freedom without stepping on the toes of other committees that manage similar concerns such as grade appeals, ombudsman, sexual harassment, and P&B. So that's a process that we are continuing through the next coming semester. Thus far the committee has met three times this year and we have largely focused on the mission statement that you should be exited to know we will be bringing to you shortly into the new term. Alongside of that this committee is also working to revise a set of precludes that were established in 2007 that were set up for handling academic freedom complaints. Legal Council reviewed it in 2008 and the committee is currently trying to work with the recommendations of Legal Council alongside those preliminary procedures to make sure that they are appropriate and will work effectively. So the committee intends to revisit this document in the spring and then report back to the Senate with both a mission statement and proposed procedures for discussion and deliberation with this body. Thus far the committee has also met with the ombudsman and other committees are likely to hear from us in the coming semesters. We anticipate that we will have a series of meetings in the coming semester and we will complete the meeting and procedures in the coming year."

107	ACERT:	Professor Lisa Marie Anderson presented the report for ACERT. She said:
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109		"I am here today as a member of the steering committee for ACERT. In case you don't yet know
110		what ACERT stands for, we are the Academic Center for Excellence in Research and Teaching. In
111		creating ACERT and getting it off the grounds our vision was to be a thriving teaching and learning
112		center for Hunter College, certainly but also to be more than that. Our mission now that we are
113		operational is to serve as a kind of umbrella for the various faculty development opportunities that
114		are offered at Hunter. So to reach out to different constituencies in the college so that we can

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provide the varied kinds of assistance that faculty need in their professional lives. That might mean faculty development in terms of pedagogy, instructional technologies, course of program level assessment. It might also mean mentorship in research, whether in a particular field or in the scholarship of teaching and learning. You may have noticed that events like assessment, breakfasts, teaching Tuesdays, tech Thursdays, which have been around for sometime, are now being coordinated and planned by ACERT together with our partners across the college. This kind of coordination is possible because ACERT is a collaboration for the office of academic Affairs, Assessment and ICIT. That brings me to the opportunity that I am here to speak to you about today. Because this year ACERT is working with ICIT to administer the FITT program, another faculty recourse that has been around for some time. As you probably know, the President had established the fit program to provide small grants for faculty who spend the summer developing innovation in their teaching. The call for proposals for FITT 2013 will be announced within the next week or two, with proposals due in early February. Please be watching your inbox for that. We recognize that it's a time of year where things can slip through the crack so we wanted to take this opportunity to tell you in person to keep an eye out for that call for proposals. I would also like to let you know who your contact people are while thinking about a proposal. Anyone of our educational technologists would be happy to talk with you. Siochain Hughes, Nancy Guerrero and Gina Cherry. On behalf of ACERT, I invite you to carefully consider the call for proposals when you receive it and to send us your proposals because we are here to support to the innovations that you envision for your teaching."

It was moved that the meeting be adjourned. The motion carried and the meeting adjourned at 4:33 PM.


