# MINUTES <br> Meeting of the Hunter College Senate 7 December 2022 

The $673^{\text {rd }}$ meeting of the Hunter College Senate convened at 4:00 PM in HW 714.
Presiding: Laura S. Keating, Chair
Attendance: The elected members of the Senate with the exception of those marked absent in Appendix I.
Alternate Senators were formally seated in accordance with the procedures approved by the Senate for inperson meetings, and they were enabled to vote using iClicker.

## Chair

Remarks: Chair Keating said the following:
"First, as opening remarks, I would like to ask the Senate to join me in thanking Professor Tony Doyle for serving 3.5 years as Parliamentarian. He will be stepping down after this meeting. Tony has been a great help in thinking through issues and processes before the pandemic emergency, during the pandemic Zoom era, and now moving out of the pandemic. Tony also has recruited his replacement starting in Spring, Professor John Pell, also from the Library. Please join me in thanking Tony for his service these last 3.5 years.

Also, regardless of how the voting goes today, I would like to ask the Senate to join me in thanking Professor Kevin Sachs for his work as chair of the Undergraduate Academic Requirements Committee, also for around the last 3.5-4 years. Kevin not only helped us to move from our decades old CR/NC system to the CUNY compliant P/NC system, but also to attempt to work through difficult, persistent issues like double-counting, multiple majors, and military credit. Thank you, Kevin!"

Agenda: $\quad$ Chair Keating informed the body that the meeting minutes would be postponed to the first meeting in Spring. The President would not be reporting, and the Budget Committee report and the Report on the Senate Rules and Record Project would be postponed to Spring. Also, an announcement on ADA accommodations was added under the Administrative Committee report. Finally, the committee of the whole was moved after the UARC report. The agenda was adopted as revised.

a) Approved Curriculum Changes

## b) Information from Hunter Legal on ADA Accommodations

Chair Keating announced that Hunter Legal informed the Administrative Committee that Senate and committee members approved under the Americans with Disabilities Act for remote work count toward a quorum even if participating from a private location. The accommodation must, however, have been documented and approved by Human Resources. Without HR approval, the member cannot be counted toward a quorum. A follow-up e-mail on this will be sent to Senate committee chairs.

## c) Announcement about accepting nominations for Search Committee for Vice President for Administration

Chair Keating announced that the Senate Office will accept nominations for Search Committee for Vice President for Administration no later than 5:00 PM on Thursday, 6 February, 2023. The "College-wide Search Procedures" are in Appendix II.

Report:

## Undergraduate Academic Requirements Committee

Chair Keating reminded the body that the Senate voted on the Resolution on Multiple Majors at Hunter
College at the last meeting. The Resolution failed to pass (iClicker voting results: 45 in favor, one against, and four abstentions). In such situations, Robert's Rules allows the motion to be made again at a following meeting. Chair Keating called on Professor Kevin Sachs, Chair of the Undergraduate Academic Requirements Committee, to reintroduce the Resolution. Questions and debate followed.

## RESOLUTION ON MULTIPLE MAJORS AT HUNTER COLLEGE

## RESOLVED, that as of the Fall 2023 semester, the policy regarding multiple majors shall be revised as follows and reflected in the Hunter College Undergraduate Catalog:

## From:

BA students have the option of declaring up to 3 majors. Students must complete the Hunter Core requirement and satisfy the sequence for all declared majors. If the same courses are required for two (or three) majors, the student must take additional courses as approved by the major department to reach the required number of credits in each major. Regardless of major(s), BA students must complete at least 90 Liberal Arts credits to graduate. Students are urged to meet frequently with an adviser to help them make good course selections.

To:

## Multiple Majors

Before you declare multiple majors, please consider the following...
Declaration of more than one major may have significant implications for a student; for example, regarding additional time to graduation, professional certification, and/or issues concerning financial aid eligibility. Students are urged to meet frequently with academic advisors, faculty advisors in each major, and financial aid/scholarship advisors before they choose to pursue more than one major.

## More than One B.A. Major

BA students have the option of declaring more than one major. Students must complete the Hunter General Education requirements as well as the requirements for all declared majors. BA students must complete at least 90 Liberal Arts credits to graduate regardless of which major(s) are selected.

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## Declaring Up to Two Majors between Different Undergraduate Degree Awards

Undergraduate students may declare up to two majors between different undergraduate degree awards (for example, combining a B.A. major with a B.S. major). Students who wish to complete the requirements for two majors from different degree awards have two options to achieve this.

One-degree option: In cases where a student completes the requirements for two declared majors from different award designations, the student may be awarded the degree associated with one of the two majors. Only one degree with one major will be awarded. For the identification of the second major, a notation of completion of all of the requirements of the second major will reside in the transcript permanent comment section. This is a minimum 120-credit option.

Two-degree option: Students who complete the requirements for two declared majors from different degree awards may opt to receive two undergraduate degrees and two diplomas. In order to be awarded two degrees, such as a B.A. and B.S., students must complete at least an additional 30 credits in residence beyond the standard 120 total credits required for a bachelor's degree. This is a minimum 150-credit option. It may take students five or more years to complete this option.

## Important considerations

With either option, students must complete the Hunter General Education requirements as well as the requirements for all declared majors and complete all degree requirements from both degree awards.

Degree award requirements may differ with respect to number of required liberal arts credits or minimum required cumulative grade point average. For students with majors in two different degree awards (e.g., B.A. and B.S.) the following applies:

- If the degree awards have a different number of required liberal arts credits, the student must complete the higher number of required liberal arts credits.
- If the degree awards have different requirements for minimum cumulative grade point average, the student must earn the higher required minimum cumulative grade point average.


## Double Counting of Courses Between or Among Majors:

Note: Students enrolled in the Thomas Hunter Honors Program may declare up to two majors between different undergraduate degree awards, at least one in a BA field, in addition to the Special Honors Curriculum major.

The motion carried by unanimous consent.

There was a motion to amend as follows:

## More than One B.S. Major

BS students have the option of declaring up to two BS majors. Students must complete the Hunter General Education requirements as well as the requirements for all declared majors. BS students must complete at least 60 Liberal Arts credits to graduate regardless of which major(s) are selected.

The motion carried by unanimous consent.

Voting by iClicker to adopt the Resolution as amended produced the following results: 60 in favor, three against, and zero abstentions.

Chair Keating called on Professor Kevin Sachs, Chair of the Undergraduate Academic Requirement Committee, to present the Resolution on Double Counting of Courses between Majors and Minors. Debate followed.


## RESOLUTION ON DOUBLE COUNTING OF COURSES BETWEEN MAJORS and MINORS

## RESOLVED, that as of the Fall 2023 semester, the following policy shall be implemented:

"Policy on Double Counting Between Majors and Minors
Courses may satisfy the requirements of both a major and a minor. Double counting occurs when departments allow a course or courses to count towards the credit requirements of both a major and a minor. When double counting is allowed, the student does not need to take additional courses to reach the required number of credits in the program.

After approval through curricular governance procedures of the Hunter College Senate, departments may allow double counting in their minor programs. This means that a department or program may permit courses already allowed in the minor program to count towards the minor's credit requirements when a student declared in the minor is also counting those courses towards the credit requirements of a major.

A student is allowed to double count courses between majors and minors if such double counting is allowed by the minor program, except when such courses are also used to fulfill the Hunter Focus requirement.

If a minor program does not have an approved policy that allows double counting of courses between majors and minors, then double counting is not allowed."

Voting by iClicker to adopt the Resolution produced the following results: 61 in favor, three against, and zero abstentions.
The Resolution passed.

## Old Business:

## Undergraduate Academic Requirements Committee

Chair Keating called on Professor Kevin Sachs, Chair of the Undergraduate Academic Requirements Committee, to introduce the Resolution Regarding Transfer of Military Credits. Discussion and debate followed.

## RESOLUTION REGARDING TRANSFER OF MILITARY CREDITS

WHEREAS, Hunter College and The City University of New York (CUNY) recognize that students entering or returning to college come from a variety of backgrounds and experiences, including many that involve the equivalent of college-level learning;

WHEREAS, CUNY policy requires all CUNY colleges to award some number of college credits for applicable military service credits;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: that Hunter College may award up to fifteen (15) college credits, based on review of students' military transcripts. The exact number of credits will be determined by a committee appointed by the Hunter College Senate, taking into account credit recommendations from the American Council on Education (ACE). All credits will be awarded as general elective credits. Students may apply to departments or programs to obtain specific course equivalencies; and

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BE IT RESOLVED: that the Hunter College catalogue will include the above language; and
BE IT RESOLVED: that a sub-committee of the Hunter College Senate Undergraduate Academic Requirements Committee will initially serve as the Senate committee to evaluate military service credits.

There was a motion to amend as follows:
All credits will be awarded as general elective non-liberal arts credits.
The motion was withdrawn.

Voting by iClicker to adopt the Resolution produced the following results: 55 in favor, two against, and one abstention.
The Resolution passed.

## Committee of the Whole on Extraordinary Circumstances and Remote Participation

By unanimous consent, the Senate moved into quasi-committee of the whole to discuss whether to adopt extraordinary circumstances remote participation (see Appendix III).

The chair reported that majorities opposed remote participation for extraordinary circumstances, both for the assembly and for committees, and thus that the Administrative Committee would not be forwarding any resolution for adoption of extraordinary circumstances remote participation in February.

Due to the late hour, the meeting was adjourned at 5:22 PM.

## APPENDIX II

## SENATE NEEYSBUKHETIN

## Establishment of Search Committee for Vice President for Administration

President Raab has asked the Hunter College Senate to begin the process of electing a Search Committee for Vice President for Administration. In accordance with the "College-wide Search Procedures" (below), nominations for membership on the Search Committees will be conducted as follows:

Nominations of Faculty, Staff, and Students for Member-Panel:
Hunter College Senate shall elect a panel of 4 students and 6 faculty members in such a manner as to achieve the widest possible distribution among the divisions, and 6 members of the staff. Nominations of members of the staff shall be made by petition to the Senate Office of at least 25 signatures by members of the staff. The panel shall include at least two faculty/staff members primarily based at the 68th Street Campus, and at least two faculty/staff members not primarily based at the 68th Street Campus.

## Nominations for Chair:

Any member of the Hunter community may submit nominations for Chairperson. The Senate shall elect a panel of 3 from among the Hunter community at-large.

All nominations must be received by the Senate Office, Room E1018, NO LATER THAN 5:00 p.m. on Tuesday, 6 December 2022. This is an absolute deadline. (Election of the Search Committee will take place at the December 7 Senate meeting.) Please call the Senate Office at 772-4200 if you have any questions, or e-mail lmiran@hunter.cuny.edu

## Excerpt from College-wide Search Procedures for Search Committees for College-wide Administrators:

(September 2021)
3. A. Nomination and Election of Candidates for Membership:

Each department (or equivalent) may nominate one full-time faculty member by election among its full-time faculty members and one student by election among its student majors (or equivalent) for service on the search committee. Faculty (including part-time faculty) and students may be nominated at-large by petition of 25 members of their constituency........

In the case of a search for Vice President for Administration, the Hunter College Senate shall elect a panel of 4 students and 6 faculty members in such a manner as to achieve the widest possible distribution among the divisions, and 6 members of the staff. Nominations of members of the staff shall be made by petition to the Senate Office of at least 25 signatures by members of the staff. The panel shall include at least two faculty/staff members primarily based at the 68th Street Campus, and at least two faculty/staff members not primarily based at the $68^{\text {th }}$ Street Campus. From this panel the President shall choose 2 students, 3 faculty members, and 3 members of the staff -- at least one of the 6 members of the faculty and staff shall be from a campus other than the 68th Street campus.
B. Nomination and Election of Candidates for Chairperson:

Any member of the Hunter community may submit nominations for Chairperson. The Senate shall elect a panel of 3 from among the Hunter community at-large from which the President shall choose a non-voting chairperson. The Chairperson shall function as the executive officer of the committee, sending out all correspondence, distributing information on candidates, arranging interviews, etc.

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## 4. Search Committee Responsibilities:

The Search Committee shall be responsible for soliciting the best candidates for the particular job. It shall follow up on all recommendations made to the Committee, and it shall carefully review and consider all applications submitted to the committee, including those of an outside consultant, if the College President in consultation with the Senate Administrative Committee decides to employ such a consultant to widen the pool of applicants.

As a result of its search procedure, the search committee shall submit to the President a list containing the names of at least 3 qualified candidates. The President shall either appoint someone from this list or request that the committee re- opens its search to produce a new list.

## APPENDIX III

## On Extraordinary Circumstances (EC) videoconferencing (ECV) - see Policy 2.20 below - for the Senate Committee of the Whole discussion on Nov. 30, 2022

The BOT resolution passed on October 24 requires us to use the Policy 2.20 below if we choose to use videoconferencing to allow members who cannot be physical present (at one of our three campus locations) due to extraordinary circumstances to participate remotely.

## A. Some issues for us to consider in deciding whether to use ECV

1) Members joining remotely due to EC cannot count toward the quorum. Will this undermine our ability to get a quorum for either Senate assembly or committee meetings?

Note:
a) The Policy 2.20 (below) does not otherwise constrain the number of members who may join remotely due to extraordinary circumstances.
b) According to the Policy 2.20, paragraph 3, when a Senate member notifies the Senate Administrative Secretary that they have extraordinary circumstances that prevent them from attending, "a determination" has to be "made by the [Senate Chair] that such extraordinary circumstances exist." Nothing in the policy says how it is done. We will have to agree on the procedure.

A starting policy is that the Senate chair determines that EC exists for a member simply by the fact that the member indicated that they had a "disability, illness, caregiving responsibilities, or any other significant or unexpected factor or event with precludes them member's physical attendance at such a meeting." So, this would be a kind of minimally invasive honor system.

Will this result in too many people not coming in person and so in a lack of quorum?
2) Given Policy 2.20, paragraph 5, more visibility is required of members joining remotely in ECV than was required on Zoom. Members joining remotely due to EC must be visible to all and so have their camera on during the entire meeting and their full name visible on the screen.
3) By the Policy 2.20, paragraph 8, all meetings using EVC must be recorded "and such recordings posted or linked on the [Senate] website with five business days following the meeting and shall remain so available for a minimum of five years thereafter." So, all participating members at a meeting must be willing to participate on film during a meeting, either Senate assembly or committee meeting. Will this limit open debate? Will it prevent some from participating in committees?
4) Do we want to allow for EVC for both Senate Assembly meetings and Senate Committee meetings?

## B. BOT approved POLICY 2.20

As said above, the procedures we use to govern member and public attendance must follow BOT established Policy 2.20. Below is the policy with '[Senate]' replacing ‘Board', ‘[Administrative Secretary of the Senate]' replaying 'Secretary of the Board', ‘[Senate Chair]' replacing 'Chair of the Board.' Other additions are also in brackets.

## Policy 2.20

## Procedures for Member Videoconferencing Pursuant to Public Officers Law 103-a

The following procedures are hereby established to satisfy the requirement of Public Officers Law 103-a(2)(b) that any public body which in its discretion wishes to permit its member to participate in meetings by videoconferencing from private locations - under extraordinary circumstances - must establish written procedures governing member and public attendance.

1. [Senate] members shall be physically present at any meeting of the [Senate] unless such member is unable to be physically present at one of the designated public meeting locations [ 714 HW , Room xxx at Brookdale, Room xxx at Silberman] due to extraordinary circumstances.
2. For purposes of these procedures, the term "extraordinary circumstances" includes disability, illness, caregiving responsibilities, or any other significant or unexpected factor or event which precludes the member's physical attendance at such meeting.
3. [a] If a member is unable to be physically present at one of the designated public meeting locations and wishes to participate by videoconferencing from a private location due to extraordinary circumstances, the member must notify [the Administrative Secretary of the Senate] and/or the [Senate Chair] no later than four business days prior to the scheduled meeting in order for proper notice of the public to be given [See number 7 below.]
[b] If a determination has been made by the [Senate Chair] that such extraordinary circumstances exist, then the [Administrative Secretary of the Senate] shall take the necessary steps to convene an extraordinary-circumstances videoconferencing meeting.
[c] If extraordinary circumstances present themselves on an emergent basis within four days of a meeting, the [Senate] shall update its notice as soon as practicable to include that information. If it is not practicable, as determined by the [Senate Chair] and the [Administrative Secretary of the Senate], for the [Senate] to update its notice, the [Senate] may reschedule its meeting.
4. [a] If there is a quorum of members participating at a physical location(s) open to the public [that is, at 714 HW, Room xxx at Brookdale, Room xxx at Silberman], the [Senate] may properly convene a meeting.
[b] A member who is participating from a remote location that is not open to in-person physical attendance by the public shall not count toward a quorum of the [Senate] but may participate and vote if there is a quorum of members at a physical location(s) open to the public.
5. Except in the case of Executive Sessions conducted pursuant to Public Officers Law 105, the [Senate] shall ensure that its members can be heard, seen, and identified while the meeting is being conducted, including but not limited to any motions, proposals, resolutions, and any other matter formally discussed or voted upon. This shall include the use of first and last name placards physically placed in front of the member or, for members participating by videoconferencing from private locations due to extraordinary circumstances, such members must ensure that their full first and last name appears on their videoconferencing screen.
6. The minutes of the meetings involving videoconferencing based on extraordinary circumstances pursuant to Public Officers Law 103-a shall include which, if any, members participated by videoconferencing from a private location due to such extraordinary circumstances.
7. The public notice for the meeting shall inform the public: (i) that extraordinary-circumstances videoconferencing will (or may) be used, (ii) where the public can view and/or participate in such meeting, (iii) where required documents and records will be posted or available, and (iv) the physical location(s) for the meeting where the public can attend.
8. The [Senate] shall provide that each open portion of any meeting conducted using extraordinary-circumstances videoconferencing shall be recorded and such recordings posted or linked on the [Senate] website with five business days following the meeting and shall remain so available for a minimum of five years thereafter. Such recordings shall be transcribed upon request.
9. If members of the [Senate] are authorized to participate by videoconferencing from a private location due to extraordinary circumstances, the [Senate] shall provide the opportunity for members of the public to view such meeting by video, and to participate in proceedings by videoconference in real time where public comment or participation is authorized. The [Senate] shall ensure that where extraordinary-circumstances videoconferencing is used, it authorizes the same public participation or testimony as in person participation or testimony.
10. Open meetings of the Board of Trustees of the City University of New York and all its constituent entities conducted using extraordinary-circumstances videoconferencing pursuant to the provisions of POL 103-a shall be broadcast pursuant to the requirements of POL 103(f) and shall utilize technology to permit access by members of the public with disabilities consistent with the 1990 Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), as amended, and corresponding guidelines. For the purposes of this guideline, "disability" shall have the meaning defined in Executive Law 292.
11. The in-person participation requirements of POL $103 \mathrm{a}(2)$ (c) shall not apply during a state disaster emergency declared by the governor pursuant to Executive Law 28 or a local state of emergency proclaimed by the chief executive of a county, city, village or town pursuant to 24 of the Executive Law if the [Senate] determines that the circumstances necessitating the emergency declaration would affect or impair the ability of the [Senate] to hold an in-person meeting.
12. These procedures shall be conspicuously posted on the [Senate's] website.
