## Meeting of the Hunter College Senate 6 March 2013

Below is a summary 38 of what Prof. Kuhn-Osius said. 39 40 "As far as the departments are concerned Pathways is not going to be more difficult. When the 41 student comes to us, our departmental requirements are not affected. The Hunter Core 42 requirements consist of two parts. One part is the CUNY Common Core, which are the 30 credits from Pathways. The other part is the Focused Core comprising 12 credits. These 12 43 44 credits will either be spent on learning a language or focusing on other subjects other than their 45 majors. There will be Writing Intensive courses as well as Pluralism & Diversity. Please make 46 sure that on the schedule of classes, courses under the various Pathways categories have the

"W" Writing Intensive and P & D designations. Leave Pathways to student services. No one

knows how this will affect our program and our enrollments. There is a very strong chance that

language enrollments will be affected. There will be a change in the way languages are

handled. Historically, 1 year of high school equals 1 semester of college. If the students have had 4 years of high school language then they are exempted. If the students had 3 years of

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high school then they should register for the 4th semester. If they had 2 years of language they should register for the 3rd semester. The problem is that someone who has had 2 years of high school language most likely hasn't taken that language in the next 2 years. Therefore, they are not really ready for the 3rd semester. To avoid any problems we have said that if they have 4 years they are exempted (or if they meet any of the other prerequisites for exemptions). Anyone who is not fully exempted will have to see the department for placement."

Report by the President:

The following is a summary statement of President Raab's report to the Senate. She said:

"I wanted to thank everyone for the incredible work in Pathways, and all of your work with 80th Street. We feel that you deserve a round of applause. We are very proud of the work that we have done. We really want all of the freshmen and the transfers to have the ability to choose what they want. The students that are coming in September will only be able to take classes in a block that have been approved by the Senate for Pathways. We will have a lot of incentive to keep this program going. Vita and I are willing to help departments, and people that need support. We have ideas for course conversions that need some change in course objectives. We would be happy to underwrite and support and continue with the work. We cannot stop now because we need more classes to be in the buckets so students will have choices. This has been quite a year especially with Brookdale campus and the dormitories. This semester, we are continuing with Pathways and rushing to meet the requirements of CUNYfirst. So I want to spend a minute thanking Manfred Kuechler, Mitch Ahlbaum, and Leonard Zinnanti. The team has converted approximately 40 % of faculty to CUNY first. On the less positive note, 60 % of our faculty still hasn't. In March and April you can view your class rosters, verify attendance, and post textbooks needed for registration. However, you also must have CUNYfirst accounts. Even though there are many things going on with CUNYfirst and Pathways, we need to encourage people and as a community we need to keep moving forward.

On a happier note, construction on the third floor of the library should be completed by the end of the semester. We would like to thank everyone for their continued patience walking through the construction site. To those who are here in the summer and coming back in September, they should be able to enjoy the extraordinary new space. Thereafter, we will begin the work on the 6th and 7th floor. We have raised the money for both floors. Upon completion there will be a floor dedicated to the library of education. The 7th floor is dedicated to a 21<sup>st</sup>-century students' assistance learning center. We are working very closely with Barbara Barone to move to the new space in the library. The Writing Center will be moving from Thomas Hunter Hall. Moreover, the various science centers will be combined into a science learning center. It will be state of the art. We have been working with a number of the faculty departments and anyone who is interested regarding the next stages of the library. It is going to be an extraordinary information commons. It was one of the first things the committee really focused on and it was something we have not had in the school. It is a really beautiful reading room, which will have windows on the south and east side of the building. Moving on to major capital campaign, we believe the project will cost at least 45 million dollars. We have raised about 18 million dollars. Our board's foundation is engaged. It is moving ahead to bring more funding and makes it a top priority project. In terms of other physical moves, I am going to be meeting with the Master Plan Committee next month and then we will have a better report. We are working very closely with the residents of the Brookdale campus regarding their move. Currently, we are planning to close the Brookdale campus at the end of the spring 2015 semester. Moreover, we are planning to move Nursing and Physical Therapy to a space that has been made available to us by LaGuardia Community College campus. Therefore, we have been working closely with them to ensure that classrooms, office space, research support, and technology is ready in the interim period before they can move to their new home on 74th St. Furthermore, we are working with CUNY regarding the new building on 74th St. The remaining programs at the Brookdale campus such as Speech Pathology, Audiology, and Medical Lab will be moving to the 68th St. Other science programs will be moving in January 2014 to the new space at Weiss Cornell. We are actively looking for new dorm space for Hunter College. Currently, we have 3 spaces in the city. The first space is on 97th St, where we have 100 rooms in the facility run by the educational housing service. The second space is on 87th and 3rd Ave. The third space is about 80

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119	rooms in the 92nd street Y. We are working very hard in finding different people that are interested
