	Because of a lack of a voting quorum, as stipulated by Article Seven, Section Three of the Charter, we could not proceed with the business at hand. This is the most serious kind of problem the Senate can face because we cannot do our work. It has been repeatedly stated to the Senate that the Standing Committees do the principal work of the body. In view of this and the fact that the Divisional Committees have done their work in preparation for presentation to the Graduate Course of Study Committee, it is even more disturbing that we cannot fulfill our obligations. This is not a new problem.
