MINIMUM PROGRESS REQUIREMENT REPORT

Effective February 1976:

- B. For part-time matriculated students (evening session) not requiring remediation the minimum allowable rate of progress toward the Bachelor's degree shall be in accordance with the following schedule: 1

- Students failing to earn sufficient credits by the end of any year shall be placed on probation, and required to make up the deficiency within the following year. Students failing to make up the deficiency within this period shall be subject to dismissal. (Student leaves and other periods spent wholly in absentia shall not count, provided the College is notified in advance of plans for absence.) 18

- C. 1. Students requiring remediation shall be assigned to groups, according to the total number of credits in remedial courses required at the time of their entrance to Hunter College. 24

- C. 2. For full-time, day session students: 31
- Required minimum progress for students in Group I shall be the same as for incoming students not needing remedial work: in their first year, they must complete 18 credits including all remedial work. 32

- For Group II, 18 credits must be completed in 1½ years including all remedial work. 35

- For Group III, 18 credits must be completed in 2 years including all remedial work. 37

- C. 3. For SGS matriculated students: 39
- Required minimum progress for students in Group I shall be the same as for incoming students not needing remedial work: 40

In their first year, they must complete 11 credits including all remedial work.	42 43
For Group II--11 credits completed in 2 years including all remedial work.	44
For Group III--11 credits completed in 3 years including all remedial work.	45 46
C.4. At the end of the remedial period allotted, the student will enter into the normal rate-of-progress-requirement as if beginning his second year; except for students with advanced standing (see Paragraph H).	47 48 49 50
D. The normal appeal process may be used by students notified of dismissal for failure to achieve normal progress.	51 52
E. A student may normally drop a course for the purpose of enrolling in a different course only during the first week of the term.	53 54
F. A student may accumulate 12 credits of W's (official course withdrawals after Add/Drop week each semester) during the course of completing the degree; additional W's will count toward the number of tuition-free credits allowed each student, except for W's resulting from a complete withdrawal from the college officially approved by a College Counselor or advisor.	55 56 57 58 59 60
G. The Student who has been dropped from matriculation for slow progress will not be allowed to apply and register as a non-matriculated student until a term has elapsed; he will not be accepted for re-admission to matriculated status until the missing credits are completed.	61 62 63 64
H. Advanced standing students who do not need remedial work must proceed according to the equivalent credits granted by Hunter College. For advanced standing students who need remedial work, the remedial plan (Paragraph C) takes precedence until remedial courses are complete. In such cases the credit that would be carried by the remedial course shall be counted in determining the minimum rate of progress but not as credit toward the degree.
