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APPENDIX II

The following is a summary statement of President Wexler's Report to the Senate:

President Wexler announced the search committee results and the appointments of Doctor Hugh Scott to the post of Dean of Programs in Education and Doctor Margaret Tyson to the post of Dean of the School of Nursing. Doctor Scott is a tenured full professor of Educational Administration at Howard University. He was formerly Superintendent of Schools for Detroit, Michigan. Doctor Tyson is Director of Graduate Programs in Nursing at Teachers College, Columbia University. She was formerly Dean of the Nursing School at the University of Virginia. Both newly-appointed Deans bring academic experience and practical experience to their very important posts at Hunter.

President Wexler also offered a "progress report" of the search committee for Provost and suggested that the deliberations of the committee might soon be completed. In making these announcements, the President praised the cooperation and hard work of the committee members and the great contribution of the Senate Administrative Committee which enlisted many of the members of those groups. She soberly reported that the present gloomy budget situation has made it necessary to table the appointment of a Dean/Assistant Vice-President for the School of Health Sciences, but promised that a committee for this search would be reinstigated at such time as the budget picture looked brighter.

On the budget situation, Mrs. Wexler was awaiting more detailed word on the extent of Mayor Beame's suggested cuts which were announced that morning. The Deans have received their first regionalized budgets with two sets of contigencies. The administration has been working closely with the Budget Committees of the Senate and the F.D.A. so that we can meet whatever comes in the best possible way. In this way, the central administration will not have to assume the total authority and/or responsibility for dealing with the final issue when it comes in during the Summer.

President Wexler acknowledged the receipt of a "checklist" of Senate resolutions and promised a full report on administrative implementation at the May meeting. On one item, the resolution concerning the bathrooms, she announced that a solution had been achieved and that only the wording of signs indicating the rest rooms had yet to be decided upon.

President Wexler concluded her remarks by reiterating her personal stance on the basic prescription. Intellectual rigor without rigidity was her keystone. Emphasizing that Hunter College has always been a liberal arts institution, Mrs. Wexler underlined the fact that we are trying to protect a respect for general, distributive education and a respect for this institution which continues to prepare people for graduate work and for professions, for work and for living. We are all trying to live with the dilemma of what quality is in a nation where opportunity has been extended to the greater number of citizens. That great challenge to this is not unlike the challenge which faces Hunter. For the rest of this century, President Wexler stated, quality will have to be displayed by what a college does for a student while the student is there, not simply by what kind of student is admitted. Hunter College offers the citizens of New York the liberal arts tradition. Other institutions can offer them other opportunities. Repeating her belief in intellectual rigor but not rigidity President Wexler called for rational and caring deliberation in moving the agenda as soon as possible.
