MINUTES

Regular Meeting of The Hunter College Senate

24 September 1974 The forty-third meeting of The Hunter College Senate was convened at 4:50 p.m. at the Hunter College Playhouse. 3 Charles M. Sherover, Chairman Presiding: The elected members of the Senate with the exception of those 4 Attendance: 5 noted by the Secretary as listed in Appendix I. 6 The Minutes of May 7th and May 21st 1974 were approved as Minutes: 7 distributed. After a brief greeting, President Wexler spoke to the Senate about 8Report by the (1) CUNY and Hunter involvement in the City and State elections this year; (2) the revision of the Governance Charter of the 9 President: 10 Hunter College Senate; and (3) the importance of the academic 11 12 integrity of the College seen as a standard to be kept in view 13 Everyone at CUNY feels it would be desirable to become politically14 active during these months preceding the City and State elections.15 16 President Wexler announced the formation of a Political Steering 17 Committee to aim at (1) full voter registration at Hunter and 18 (2) the stands of the various candidates on issues and legislation that have a direct bearing on the academic life of Hunter 19 20 College and City University. It was noted that the combined 21 students, faculty and alumni and their families of C.U.N.Y. comprise 25% of the population of New York City. We are poten-22 20 tially as big a lobby as any potential lobby in this city could 24 be. This is particularly relevant since most agree that we are 25 now at a steady state, at a point where our enrollments are 26 leveling off or declining, and yet the fiscal responsibility of the institution is constantly rising. There is no projectable 27 FTE increase. Mrs. Wexler pointed out that we must impress upon the candidates the threat to the whole university if the base 28 29 30 budget is in any way cut back. President Wexler pointed out the important work accomplished by 31 32 the committee for revising the Governance Charter. She noted that Hunter is one of few institutions with a Senate of faculty 33 34 and students that is not simply advisory but a real, legislative In her position as "possible persuader," the President 35 36 emphasized (1) consolidation of the gains we've made; (2) con-27 tinued protection of the academic integrity of the institution; 28 and (3) favor of a combination of at-large and departmental elections to the Senate. 29 30 Finally, Mrs. Wexler maintained that academic integrity and 31 standards ought to continue to be the norm which guides all our 32 future work. The degree has to be worth it, in substance and in image, to those within the College and to those outside. 33 Ombudsman Louis Massa informed the Senate that the Charter Review 34 Report by the 35 Committee now has a first draft of a revised Governance Charter. Ombudsman: 36 Aspects of the first draft have recently been circulated among 37 portions of the community. Negative reactions on two particular issues have halted progress on the revision process in producing an entirely acceptable Charter. These two issues are: (1) the 39 apportionment percentages among students, faculty, and administra-40 tion, and (2) the proposed method of election of students to the

Senate. Specifically, the student percentage has been raised by two percent, the faculty percentage has been reduced by one percent4

and the administration representation has been lowered by one

percent. It has been proposed that student elections be run on on an at-large basis rather than by representation by department

as is presently the case. The rationale for this change is based 46 on the fact that student participation on a departmental basis is 47

APPENDIX II

STATEMENT ON THE RIGHTS OF STUDENTS

Preamble

"Academic institutions exist for the transmission of knowledge, the pursuit of truth, the development of students, and the general well-being of society. Free inquiry and free expression are indispensable to the attainment of these goals... Freedom to teach and freedom to learn are inseparable facets of academic $^{\rm f} \, {\rm reedom} \, .^{\rm m}$

Students "have a distinctive role ... which qualifies them to share in the responsible authority on campus; the exercise of the authority is part of their education...Joint efforts among all groups in the institution---students, faculty, administration, and governing board--is a prerequisite of sound academic government...Joint effort, to be effective, must be rooted in the concept of shared authority. The exercise of shared authority in college and university government, like the protection of /student and faculty/ academic freedom, requires tolerance, respect, and a sense of community."

"The responsibility to secure and to respect general conditions conducive to the freedom to learn is shared by all members of the academic community."

Students' rights are not limited by what is enumerated in this statement The purpose of this statement is to outline some basic principles and guidelines, many of which are now met. Specific implementation will have to be continuously adjusted as conditions in the college change.

Academic and Personal Files

- 1) Improper disclosure, even within the college, of academic, personal, and disciplinary records is a serious invasion of privacy. To minimize risk of improper disclosure, academic, personal and disciplinary records should be kept in separate files.
- 2) All files may be made available only to specially authorized college staff. Express consent of the student involved is otherwise required.
- 3) Academic records and transcripts should contain only information about scholastic achievement.
- 4) No records should be kept which reflect the political and off-campus activities or beliefs of students.
- 5) Non-current medical and disciplinary records should be periodically destroyed.
- 6) Students have the right to periodically review their academic, medical and disciplinary records and to appeal for removal of items inproperly included. If the appeal fails the student has the right to include a written rebuttal in his file. to his record.

- II. Classroom, Grades, Etc.

 1) Students have the right, within the limits of available facilities, to pursue any course of study for which they are eligible according to college standards.
- 2) In order to permit eligible students unhindered access to courses, the costs of required materials should be kept within reasonable limits.
- 3) Students have the right to know, at the start of each course of study, the basis to be used by the instructor in determining grades.
- 4) Students' grades should be based solely on academic criteria, not on opinions or conduct in matters unrelated to academic standards.
- 5) Students should have the opportunity to take reasoned exception to facts or points of view offered in any course of study, but they are responsible for meeting the academic standards of any course of study for which they are enrolled.

6) Students should have the protection through formally established procedures against prejudiced or capricious academic standards and evaluations.

Participation in Academic Affairs

- Students have the right, individually and collectively, to express their views on matters of general interest to the student body, including institutional policy, curriculum and personnel decisions.
- Students have the right to participate in the formulation and application of institutional policy affecting academic and student affairs.
- 3) Students should share in the formation of policies regarding degree requirements, courses and curriculum, academic grading systems, standards of academic standing, and calendar arrangements.
- 4) Students should have the opportunity, individually and collectively, to assess the value of a course and to express their views on the form and conduct of a class which they have taken.
- 5) The results of an institutional mechanism used for students to assess courses and faculty, such as evaluation questionnaires, should be accessible to all members of the college community, and should be weighed in all decisions affecting faculty status and curriculum.

Extra-Curricular Activities

- 1) Students should be free to form and join associations to promote their common interests.
- 2) Students have the right to express their opinions, individually and collectively, and to support causes in a manner that does not disrupt the orderly operation of the college.

- V. Standards of Conduct1) Students should participate in the formulation of standards of behavior which are considered essential to the educational mission and community responsibilities of the college.
- 2) The code of conduct, as a set of regulations and procedures should be clearly stated and published in a handbook or other generally available set of institutional regulations.
- 3) In all cases, disciplinary procedures should protect the student from capricious and prejudical application of the rules of conduct. Such procedures should also satisfy the requirements of procedural due process, including written notice with details of charges, sufficient time to prepare a defense, right to assistance in the defense, right to cross-examine witnesses and to present evidence, and the right to appeal the decision.
