The 432nd meeting of the Hunter College Senate was convened at 4:15 PM in Room W714.
Presiding: Joan Tronto, Chair

Report by the A summary statement of President Raab's report is as follows:
President:

The following is a summary statement of President Raab's report to the Senate. She said:
"Vice President Zinnanti has circulated an important email to faculty about technology opportunities for faculty. There are ongoing grant funds for which faculty can apply. Please check the new website for technology applications available for faculty.

I am very happy today to introduce two new members of our community. Erica Rios comes to us as our new Alumni Relations Director from the University of Florida, Gainesville. She has incredible qualifications for this job, and I am really happy to introduce her and let her tell you a little bit about some of the things she is planning for us."

President Raab yielded the floor to Erica Rios who said:
"It is truly an honor to be at Hunter College serving our alumni. One of the main aspects of my job is to find ways to help students, and to connect them to alumni. I will also try to engage alumni back into the life of Hunter College. They need to remember what it was like to be a student and support those coming up in the ranks behind them. This is very important since many students here are first generation college students or the first going to college from their families. Having somebody out there who can help them, give them advice, and encourage them, will help. During the interview process, the question of why I want to come to Hunter College came up. I replied, because it is the crown jewel of the CUNY system with a fantastic student body and fantastic professors. It is a great campus at a great location, and it is in New York City. Who wouldn't want to come here? Thank you very much."

The President yielded the floor to Meredith Halpern who said:
"I am thrilled to be here. I have a graduate degree from another school in New York City, which will remain nameless. So, I know what it is like to go to school in New York City and I know that it is much more than the subway stop. I am excited to be a part of the community and part of a wonderful team. Hunter has a fabulous reputation, and I would like to continue to raise its profile. I will do anything I can to that end. It is going to require your help, and I want to ask all of you to please contact me when you are out there with the press. Feel free to email me at Meredith.Halpern@hunter.cuny.edu. Thank you. I look forward to working with you."

She yielded the floor to President Raab. The President yielded the floor to Vice President Ayravainen who said:
"I want to thank the faculty for helping us with the web attendance this semester. I also want to tell you that web grading went very well. For the first time this year students will be able to access their grades and their transcripts on the web. As you know, we are using the e-mail

system to communicate with students, and we are getting a lot of feedback from them. Please encourage all your students to use the Hunter e-mail. It is a wonderful tool for information. One final comment, Linda Carlson from my office has started to meet with individual departments about their advising procedures and policies, and she is making liaison connections with advisors in student services. These meetings have been quite successful."

She yielded the floor to President Raab. The President yielded the floor to Provost Pizer who said:
"I have a couple of public service announcements that I think you should be aware of. Over the past year we have worked with the Task Force on Outcomes Assessment, and we have issued a draft report for Hunter College. Upon adoption by the campus this report will be forwarded to 80th Street, and it is a requirement of Middle States as well. We are now soliciting comments from the community. Today, as you entered, you received a copy of the draft report. We will have open hearings on the campus in November, so that we can get your reactions. The draft was distributed to the FDA, department chairs, and deans, and there will be copies on reserve at the Library. It is also being distributed to both the Undergraduate and Graduate student governments. You can e-mail your suggestions to us. We hope to have a plan adopted by the campus in December. Within the report there is a timeframe of some additional outcomes assessments activities on campus during the spring semester. Your attention to this document would be much appreciated.

The second initiative from our office, also mandated by Middle States, is the periodic review report. The periodic review report will describe what has happened at Hunter College over the last six years, and how we have responded to the recommendations by Middle States. We also want to talk about the initiatives that have been developed on this campus independent of the suggestions of Middle States. To do this, I have assigned parts of the document to the various Deans, Vice Presidents, and other members of the administration who are responsible for the various areas discussed in the Middle States Report. In turn, they are putting together groups in their areas of responsibility that will deal with the various aspects of the report. We would like the widest possible response from the campus to this document. We are putting together task forces involving faculty, administration, and students to address the various questions. If you would like to participate in putting together the draft of the periodic review report, please contact my office and we will refer you to the appropriate people. We hope to have the periodic review report done early in the Spring semester. It is due at Middle States in June. We would like to hold hearings on this campus in April or May at the latest. The major part of the writing will be done in January by a coordinating committee and my office. So, if you would like to participate in this during November and December, please let us know."
