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Re: EPA Audit

On the issue of the EPA audit I am pleased to inform you that Hunter has set an extraordinary record for CUNY. Many of the schools are getting large fines, but we got through this audit with almost no problems, and I want to thank Len Zinnanti, Ricardo Franco, and Andrew Silver for an amazing job. I also want to thank Ellen Sternberg in Health Sciences, Phil Williamston in our Art Department, Tim Laun at 41st Street, Richard Jaeger in Biology, Shirzab Jenab in Psychology, and Ann Henderson in Arts and Sciences. The Campus Schools were audited as well. Finally, I want to thank Danny Velez who worked very hard with Andrew Silver to make all this possible. This is really an extraordinary triumph. We have been told by CUNY that we have set the bar so high for them that they don't know how the other schools can reach it. We are very proud of that.

We are hoping to see all of you here on December 1st at the Open Forum for the presentation of

the physical plan for Roosevelt House. The architect will be here with a model and will be talking

about the restoration work that should start in June. As we are getting closer to the construction,

we are having many discussions throughout the campus with different faculty groups about

Many of you saw in the newspaper that the CUNY Capital Campaign kicked off last Tuesday. We

are very proud that the one faculty member representing the CUNY faculty was from our Biology Department. Marie Filbin, did a wonderful job talking about faculty research efforts here at

Hunter and at CUNY, and we are very happy that she was selected to represent all the great

research that goes on at CUNY. We will have ongoing discussions about programmatic needs

throughout the college, but I want to make a happy announcement now about the need to support faculty in their research and development efforts. In the next few months we will be

implementing a program that will be administered by each of the deans to help support faculty that

do not have sufficient funds to go to conferences or to travel for research programs. This is clearly a pressing need and we are happy to use some of the money that we are raising to support this

On the issue of searches I want to say that we are moving ahead on the Dean of Education search.

The committee has been meeting, and it is also meeting with a search consultant who has spoken

to many of you about getting other campus perspectives and thoughts on this position. That ad is

out and resumes are coming in. I am very happy to announce that we have sent out letters to the

members of the Search Committee for Vice President for Student Affairs, and that committee

should start to meet soon. We have also retained a search consultant to start working on that

search. We are now beginning to look toward the Dean of Arts and Sciences search, and are

beginning to interview search firms that would be available for that search and have that expertise.

As a final note, I have asked Len to make a short announcement regarding plans for the security

system. As many of you remember, we had a two-year discussion with open forums jointly

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how we should address them. I am pleased to say that now that the Capital Budget has been approved we are able to access some funds that we requested from CUNY to focus on this very important initiative. Len is working with a faculty and staff committee. We are moving forward and I want everyone to remain involved since there are still issues that need to be resolved on how to do it. Discussions will continue as we are beginning to move towards implementation."

President Raab yielded the floor to Vice President Zinnanti, who said:

"Good afternoon. I want to preface these comments by saying that an individual who is not a Hunter person was arrested by our security this afternoon in the East Building for having stolen a faculty member's cell phone. He is being processed and put through the system.

I want to take a few minutes to provide a context for the security initiative. After 9-11 CUNY had contracted with Kroll Associates, a security-consulting firm who came in and assessed this campus. Their report came out in spring of 2002, enumerating a number of shortcomings in terms of security for the 68th Street campus. Some of these were administrative failures, such as the radio and communications systems that we have since worked to fix. Some of the emergency exits were re-wired so that so people could enjoy cigarettes and not set off alarms. That has now been fixed, but some of the items enumerated were beyond our resources and control, involving a security ID system at this campus. We have one in place at the other fours campus. We did an analysis of how we would deploy our security guards to put into effect a 24-hour security ID system here at 68th Street and went to 80th Street with a request to hire 90 new security officers. We were promptly discouraged from pursuing that avenue and were asked to reconsider a technological solution. So, we went back to the drawing boards and came up with a plan to implement a swipe system and cameras to supplement the swipe system turnstiles. We drafted a plan and went back to CUNY informally and received approval for it. If you recall, SUNY and CUNY did not have a capital budget in the fiscal year 2003-04 and we were unable to access any funding. Now that we are in the new budget year, and despite the Governor's vetoes, we have been told that we can access the \$2M that was ear marked for Hunter for this purpose. We now enter a new realm of bureaucracy where we will have to contract with an architect because this will require building code explanations and so on. But we are on our way to implanting this system. We are planning to take the \$2M million that the Capital Budget will provide for security and take some resources from the technology fee to create what we are calling a one-card system which would allow students to also use the ID card that will swipe them into this campus for services in the cafeteria, bookstore, for printing and copying, and for other services as well. There is a small committee to discuss these implementation issues and we are getting some very good feed back, particularly from the various centers. We will be convening members of the various centers to talk about their particular issues with respect to such a system, and we are looking forward to developing this kind of streamlined approach."

Vice President Zinnanti concluded his report by answering questions from the floor.

He then yielded the floor to President Raab, who concluded her report by answering questions from the floor.

The motion carried and the meeting adjourned at 4:40 PM.
