Report by the Evening Session Council The motion on the floor was approval of the Evening Session Council's proposed resolution, as carried over from the last meeting:			
"RESOLVED, that the President is requested to continue in formal communication and consultation with the Evening Session Council and the Senate about all planning for Evening Session and for Returning Adults."	64 65 66 67		
At this point President Shalala presented her report to the Senate, which focused on the Senate's concerns about Evening Session. The following is a summary statement of the Report and discussion:			
The President said that she would repeat the report she had previously given to the Evening Session Council concerning her reaction to the various studies, consultations and recommendations she had received regarding adult students at Hunter, as well as the evening session.	71 72 73 74 75		
She informed the Senate that she accepts the recommendation from the Adult Services Committee that a reallocation of resources in relation ship to increased counseling and other student support services should be paired and retargeted for adult services, recognizing the existence of adult students in the morning, the afternoon, and the evening.	76 -77 78 79 80 81		
The second recommendation, the recommendation that the administration increase the services for counseling as well as other kinds of service available for evening students, was also accepted by the President. However, President Shalala pointed out that both recommendations regarding reallocation of services from day to evening were given to her without analysis as to budgetary, programmatic or contract implications. Over the period of next year the President plans to take time to look at those implications in terms of reallocating or	es83 84 85 86 87 88 89		
restructuring the way in which we provide services of different kinds to adult students as well as evening students. In a proposal to the Ford Foundation under the new Urban Education grant program, President Shalala has requested financing for our efforts to take a careful look at the nature of the student body in the evening, the kinds of services we think we need, and what is required in terms of our own budget for reallocating existing services or asking the State	90 91 92 93		

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> for evening students as well as adult students which are more sensitive to their needs. Our catalogs, brochures and the information packets which we have for day and evening students need to be redone. If we get the money from Ford Foundation, it would cover the cost for the preparation of these materials as well.

A third area, in which the President has not yet made a decision, is 105 the area of administration in relationship to the evening session. The President informed the Senate that, although she is prepared to discuss the issue, she is not at this point prepared to make a final decision on this question. It is her desire not to appoint administrators unless actual resources over which they have some control can be provided. For the time being the President would continue to place responsibility for policy-making regarding the evening program in the hands of the Provost. Associate Provost, Tilden LeMelle, will take leadership responsibility for making certain that we do the kinds of analysis we need in order to make decisions about how resources are to be allocated. Since the allocation for the academic budget is in the hands of the Provost and the Deans, and since we have merged budgets for day and evening sessions, she feels that we should leave those responsibilities in the Provost's Office. The issue of student services continues to be under the Dean of Students, and it is the Dean of Students' budget that is allocated throughout the day and evening. This leaves somewhat ambiguous the role of the current Associate Dean for the School of General Studies. The President said that Dean Dorothy Helly will play a serious role in advising us as we take a very careful look at the budget allocations, as well as continuing in relationship to the Provost's Office and the Dean of Students Office.

While we take a very careful look at the issues over the course of the next year, awaiting the completion of the new buildings, we have to have recommendations in place for the Fall of 1982. timing is good because we will then have more space and will be able to do scheduling with more flexibility than we have now.

The final point the President made in her report was that anyone looking at numbers in terms of the nature of the student body at Hunter, or anyone who teaches, knows that we have a very diverse student body. While in the process of looking at the kinds of services that we provide, we will look at adult students, evening students, as well as non-traditional students.

President Shalala then answered questions from the floor; the following is a summary statement:

In reply to a question concerning the Center for Lifelong Learning, President Shalala said that the Center as a unit will go out of existence this Fall. Any parts of it which can be put under the supervision of departments will be transferred to departments. It is her view that, given a limit of space, the college's first responsibility is to its regular students for credit-bearing courses 147 and that, if we desire to do some non-credit experimental courses or 148 short-term courses, those should be initiated within the divisions or departments as part of the regular offerings of the college. This 150 decision may be interpreted as being out of step with what other institutions in this country are doing. There are a number of colleges in the City that believe large amounts of money can be made by offering non-credit courses. But when we look hard at numbers that is difficult to establish. It is the President's view that we first have a responsibility to our regular students, whether they go to school in the morning or in the evening: it must be our priority to settle whether we have enough space for our existing courses and our existing students.

Whatever we do, we should look at it with an eye towards the new 160 161 buildings, rather than making a set of temporary decisions that will have to be changed later. Using the strategy money from Ford 162 Foundation, and the target date of 1982 would allow us to adequately 163 plan and evaluate. 164

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> The President feels that what she needs to do now is to take a look at what the budgetary implications are regarding the various recommendations; and then come back to the appropriate administrative and governance bodies and suggest what direction should be taken at that time. She feels that there is no need for additional committees at this point. There seems to be an enormous consensus among the committees and individuals about what we should be doing for evening adult students and support services. What we need now is an operational plan based on the kind of information we need to make decisions.

The President said that she is committed to a full active evening session of the College, but is not at this time prepared to suggest 176 that we need a separate budget and separate administration process to do that properly. There should be no question in our minds about 178 our future, and that is running from very early in the morning until 179 as late at night as we think appropriate. There seem to be almost three colleges operating here. One in the morning, one in the 181 afternoon, one in the evening. While she states the recommendations 182 in terms of more adult services for the evening program, we are really moving into a much more complicated era, and should not make rigid structural or administration recommendations without very carefully taking a look at our overall needs. The issues are complicated-some are under the President's direct authority and some are not. For instance, it is within the Provost's purview to take a look at how we are allocating teaching resources in terms of full-time and part-time faculty. If we are dead serious about running a college from 8 in the morning until 10 at night, we should 191 look at the nature of the student body and at what we are now doing in terms of counseling services, support services, and academic services. And then we should take a look at what our options are in terms of providing a high quality education at 8 in the morning or at 8 at night. The President is willing to ask the State for additional resources once our strategy is determined, but says that we will need sound analysis.

The question on the motion (lines 64-67 above) was called and carried.

The resolution carried by hand vote with 44 in favor, none opposed, and l abstention.

A motion to adjourn carried, and the meeting was adjourned at 6:15 p.m.
