Report by the President:

Attendance:

President Raab said the following:

"Thank you and good afternoon. I just had a longer meeting with the Senate Administrative Committee and updated them on the State budget negotiations that are ongoing. The proposal for this year was one of the healthiest for funding of CUNY. One of the proposals in the budget was for a 5-year \$250 tuition increase. As I said at the time, this is never an easy proposal to support, but in term of the operation needs of the institution, the funding is critical to fixing the quality of our operation. It is questionable if this will end up in either of the one-house bills of the legislature or senate. We are watching the proceedings closely in Albany and will update everyone when we have more information on what is finally approved.

"I would like to cover something that some faculty have spoken to me about, and we are keeping our eye on and come back to talk more about is the issue is the availability through the new CUNYfirst system on the citizenship status of our students. Over the years as the systems have changed a number of people who work with our students have access to this information has increased. CUNY itself has become more vigilant and has started to reduce the number of screens that this information is on. We are talking about how we serve our students in keeping their information private. I would like you to know we are working with Student Services and are being judicious on how information is shared.

"One a final note, on March 14th, we are having the official opening of the 6th and 7th floor of the library and hope that you all will be able to join us. We are moving ahead with the planning of the 5th-floor renovation which we hope to begin over the summer."

The report is attached as Appendix II. 82 83 **Committee on General Education** 84 Professor Manu Bhagavan, Co-Chair of the Committee on General Education, said the 85 following in regards to Institutional Learning Outcomes: 86 "I am here to update you on the college process on the institutional learning outcomes which 87 are tied to our Middle States Reaccreditation process. As part of Middle States, the college is 88 89 required to come up with learning outcomes that have to be assessable and are meant to keep 90 us accountable. What we have done so far was that the GER committee got the conversation 91 going and working with the administration, we held a series of workshops on ILO. The Middle 92 States gave us suggestions that we built into categories. We held six workshops with different 93 institutional stakeholders. After holding the workshop the information collect was complied, 94 and a broad Institutional Learning Outcomes Committee is going through the list to formalize 95 the information and create a draft report by the end of April with recommendations." 96 97 98 99 100 101

Report by the Committee on By-Laws for the School of Arts & Sciences

Professor Laura Keating, Chair of the Committee on By-laws for the School of Arts & Sciences said the following:

"In this report I just want to update the Senate on the progress of the School of Arts and Sciences Bylaws drafting process since I reported last fall, on October 5. Around a week after that report, on October 13, the first draft of the bylaws was distributed to school faculty, program directors, student government leaders, the administration, and the executive committees of the FDA and the HEO Forum. Between then and mid-December, the committee gathered feedback on the preliminary draft in a number of ways. We held three open-meetings, and I and other committee members attended several other meetings, including that of the SAS Council of Chairs in October, a meeting of the FDA in November, and two meetings of the SAS Advisory Committee – once before and once after the November and December department meetings were held. In the fall, I also met with the Senate Departmental Governance Committee and with Lara Miranda and Tom DeGloma in the Senate and I brought the suggested revisions back to the committee for consideration. We also received revision requests and comments from several individuals and departments via e-mail and from an on-line comment form. The drafting committee then met in mid-December and late January to make revisions that incorporated most, if not all, of the changes suggested. We distributed the revised draft on January 31 for the second feedback period."

"As part of that, in February, we held two more open meetings, and I and other members of the committee participated in discussions of the revised draft at a SAS Advisory Committee meeting and a meeting of the FDA. As of today, we have received feedback and suggested changes from several other individuals, departments, the administration, the legal office at Hunter, and the union. The drafting committee has met three times in the past three weeks to make subsequent revisions and to finalize a proposed set of bylaws to submit to the Senate Departmental Governance Committee for its approval. As occurs with the review of departmental bylaws, we plan to work with them to make the changes needed so that the school bylaws are consistent with CUNY and Hunter governance documents."

"Once the proposed bylaws have been given the okay from that committee, the voting process in the school will begin. That process will involve paper secret ballots distributed to faculty through their departments and then counted by the Senate staff and Administrative Committee (with myself recused). There will also be a mechanism for e-mail and regular mail voting for those who will not be on campus during the voting period. During voting, there will be a department collection period in which ballots are collected back by the department and then delivered together, unopened, to the Senate Office. A Senate collection period will follow in which people who still have not voted may submit ballots directly to the Senate. Once that period ends and the votes are tallied, if the bylaws are approved by a majority of the voting faculty, then the bylaws will come here to be ratified as is the case with departmental bylaws and as occurred with the School of Nursing bylaws. As the Senate Chair stated back in October, Senate ratification will focus solely on affirming or challenging the integrity of the process, not on changing the rules that the School has approved for its own operations and procedures. With regard to this matter, the Senate is acting in its capacity as an oversight body, not as the governance unit whose bylaws are being considered."



VIII.21	There shall be a Committee on Food Services and Facilities, consisting of three faculty members, three students, and the College Business Manager to serve as a Chairperson ex-officio, all Committee members to have a vote. The Committee shall be responsible for advising the administration concerning all food services at the College, including the quality, variety, prices, and presentation of the food, as well as dining facilities. An annual review of all contracted food services shall be part of the Committee's responsibility.	There shall be a Committee on Food Services and Facilities, consisting of three faculty members, three students, and the College Business Manager to serve as a Chairperson ex-officio, all Committee members to have a vote. The Committee will meet at least once per semester, and report to the Senate at least once per year. The Committee shall be responsible for advising the administration concerning all food services at the College, including the quality, variety, prices, and presentation of the food, as well as dining facilities. An annual review of all contracted food services shall be part of the Committee's responsibility. The Committee shall also be responsible for making recommendations to the Administration on the COLLEGE FACILITIES, INCLUDING BUT NOT LIMITED TO THE state of classrooms and other teaching facilities, common areas, and access (including but not limited to corridors, doorways, elevators, and escalators), particularly in regard to the teaching/learning activities of the College.

(ii) The remaining 5 Senate seats shall be reserved for Full time Freshmen and Sophomores who have not as yet declared their major. Candidacy at large shall be declared by filing a petition meeting the requirements established by the Senate. From the pool of such candidates, the Full time Freshmen and non major Sophomores will elect the required number of representatives by an at large election.

D. The 11 Senate seats reserved for Part time undergraduate students shall be filled as follows:

Candidacy at large shall be declared by filing a petition meeting the requirements established by the Senate. From the pool of such candidates, the Parttime undergraduate students will elect the required number of representatives by an atlarge election.

C. All undergraduate student positions shall be filled by the Undergraduate Student Government of Hunter College (USG) in cooperation with the Senate Vice Chair according to the representational requirements outlined below and in Article III.1 and Article IV.4.B.

The 25 Senate seats reserved for undergraduate students shall be filled as follows:

- i. 5 seats shall be filled by undergraduate student government representatives who have been elected to the USG.
- ii. There shall be 15 seats reserved for the undergraduate student body at large. The undergraduate student body shall be made aware of these seats through the resources of the USG. Undergraduates may then apply and nominations will be submitted to the Hunter Senate upon the recommendation of the USG.
- 5 seats shall be reserved for fulliii. time department majors. Toward their election, each department will elect, from nominations made within its own ranks, 1 nominee for these seats. All Full-time Seniors, Juniors, and Sophomores who have declared their major will elect, under the auspices of the **Undergraduate Student** Government, the required number of representatives by an atlarge vote among these nominees.
